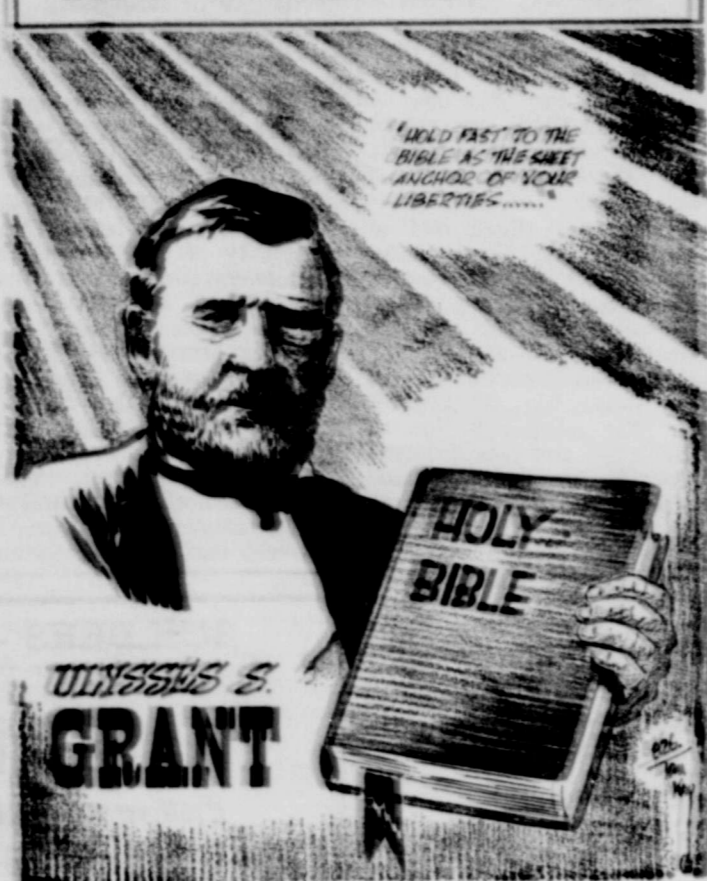

## Jim Ady Retired August 31 From Texas Electric



The Retirement of Jim Ady on August 31st, formerly Burk Burnett manager for 23 years until being named consultant last year, climaxed a 38 year career with Texas Electric Service Co. Ady made the manager's post despite an inauspicious beginning as a truck driver in the distribution department at Wichita Falls. On the first day of his job he got his truck stuck in mud so deep he was afraid it was going to disappear from sight. Roads, during the oil boom days in Wichita Falls, were mostly just tracks left by other vehicles. He remembers when oil derricks were so thick that electrical cross strung power lines from them instead of putting up a pole line. He later spent eight years in Nowtown in the middle of the oil fields, living in a company house at the substation and performing jobs from meter reading to trouble-shooting. In 1935 Ady was transferred back to Wichita Falls and five years later moved to Burk Burnett. A member of the Masonic Lodge, Odd Fellows and Lions Club, he has been active in the civic affairs of Burk Burnett for many years. He is also a deacon in the First Baptist church. The Adys have four children and eight grandchildren. He plans to spend his leisure hours fishing and working around the house.

**Barry Goldwater Mental And Physical Health Is Questioned**

Three top Texas GOP leaders recently accepted the challenge of the Johnson-Humphrey forces to make health of the candidates a campaign issue.

In a joint statement the Republicans warned that "ADA-Humphrey will be an uncertain heartbeat from the Presidency if Johnson wins in November."

Signing the statement were GOP State Chairman Peter O'Donnell, Jr. of Dallas, National Committeeman Albert B. Fay of Houston and Tad Smith of El Paso, state campaign coordinator for Goldwater-Miller.

Their statement said the Johnson-Humphrey forces had raised a question about the mental and physical qualifications of Senator Barry Goldwater for the Presidency.

"This was done as part of another bitter, personal attack on Senator Goldwater. They have raised this question and we accept their challenge.

"These are the same smear tactics that Lyndon Johnson employed against the late John Kennedy in 1960 when Johnson sought and lost the presidential nomination."

The GOP leaders said Senator Goldwater "is in perfect health. Their charge has been discredited by the doctors who have examined the Senator."

They pointed out that Goldwater, a major general in the Air Force Reserve, continues to fly advanced jet airplanes. "No pilot with mental or physical deficiencies is permitted to fly these complex aircraft."

In reporting on Johnson's health the Saturday Evening Post said that he "suffered a massive heart attack—as bad as a man can have and still live—is the way he (Johnson) describes it."

The New York Daily News commented Sept. 25, 1964 that Johnson had a severe heart attack in 1955 and the statistics show that a repetition is often the case."

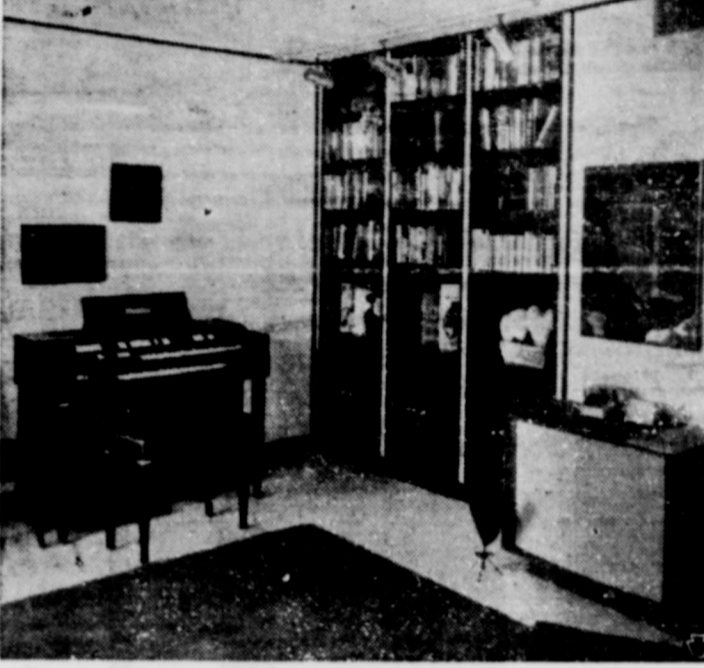
