## Post Office Helps Count Livestock

Rural mail carriers from the Burk Burnett Post Office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning Nov. 13th.

Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms. Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Mr. Zimmerman said. "For this reason it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are Mr. J. T. Brady, Rural Route No. 1.

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio and television.

We were entertained by a quartet, who sang several songs and then every one gathered around the piano and sang together.

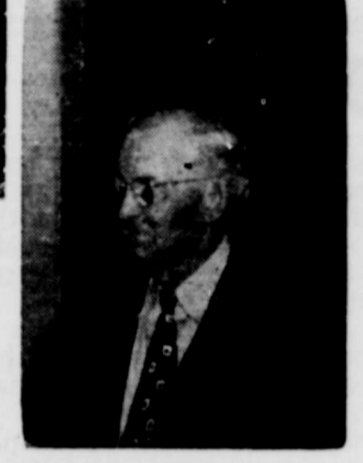

John Sloan Mills, 89, a pioneer resident of Burk Burnett died at 4 p. m. Tuesday in a Wichita Falls convalescent home following a lengthy illness.

Mills, who moved to Burk Burnett in 1919, coming here from Miles, Tex., lived here until he became ill about a year ago. He was born March 15, 1875, in Linden, Texas.

During his active years here, he was manager of the Cicero Smith Lumber Co. He was a charter member of the Burk Burnett Lions Club and maintained a perfect attendance record for 40 years. He was former president of the Lions club. Mills was a member of the First Methodist Church here.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Mary Spell, Wichita Falls; and a grandson, Kenneth Spell Jr., and a great grandson, Kenny Spell, both of Fort Worth.

Services were held at 10:30 a. m. Thursday in the First Methodist church in Burk Burnett with Rev. Carroll Copeland, pastor and Dr. T. Lee Miller, pastor of the Floral Heights Methodist Church in Wichita Falls officiating.

## PLENTY OF ROOM

An airline must obtain the permission of a federal agency before it can inaugurate new routes and expand its services. This is a long-established policy, based on the proposition that wide-open, unregulated competition would prove disastrous to numbers of lines and that each is entitled to protection of its service areas.

The policy is generally approved. But there is a danger that regulation can become too rigid and, in this time of vastly increased international travel by jet, may not adequately serve the needs and wants of travelers.

Some years ago, for instance, this country's principal overseas air carrier, a Pan American sought permission to fly passengers to Japan via Alaska. But nothing happened—the application was blocked by presidential order. Now it has renewed the request in a petition to the Civil Aeronautic Board. It wants permission to offer service to Japan from a number of major American cities, ranging from New York to Portland, Oregon, by way of Fairbanks, Alaska.

This certainly seems a reasonable proposal, particularly in view of Japan's amazing economic development in recent years in which we played and continue to play a leading role both as a customer and a supplier. And Japan is attracting tourists in great numbers. There appears to be plenty of room and need for the new and improved service Pan American wants to provide.

## LESSONS IN CAPITALISM

Recently a prominent economist rose up to say that too many Americans knew very little about our capitalistic form of free enterprise. His observation was right on target. In a country whose bounty depends on capitalism, many people simply are not aware of how the system works.

One of the main reasons for this knowledge gap is the fact that school systems generally provide only a once-over-lightly view of economics. The situation appears to be improving some, but we still have a long way to go.

In the view of the New York Stock Exchange, a highly effective way of teaching young Americans the ABC's of free enterprise is to give them a share or two of stock for themselves. As shareowners, teen-aged capitalists can receive annual reports and financial statements, follow the price of their stock in the newspaper market tables and even receive regular dividend checks.

Parents can make stock gifts to children now without red tape thanks to special legislation enacted in all 50 states in the past ten years. An adult merely has the security registered in the name of the child's custodian, usually one of the parents. Any security can be given, and there is no limit on the amount.

Stock gifts for minors is a good idea. Certainly a teen-ager who happens to be a shareowner himself will be inclined to learn the ABC's of our capitalistic economy—if only to find out why his stock isn't going up as fast as he wished it would.

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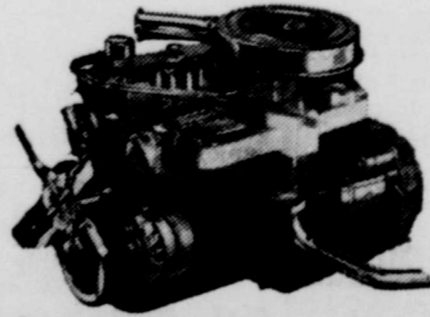

**Let's Go Fishin'**

**FULL SPEED AHEAD**

Timid trollers only taunt trout. Sometimes it's the heavy hand on the throttle that catches 'em.

High speed trolling has almost become a "sure-fire" way of filling the day's limit among anglers in the Rocky Mountain region, report the fishing authorities at Mercury outboards. This "give 'er the gas" technique, while contrary to most ideas about trolling, is particularly effective at sundown when fish move into the shallows to feed on insects.

Commonly, a small spoon with a hammered gold and black finish is used. This is cast 30 to 40 yards astern and fished close to the surface.

Actual speeds depend upon conditions, i.e., wind action, underwater hazards, etc. On a straight run through a feeding area they may reach 30 mph. During turns it is desirable to rev up the engine in order to keep the lure at the same level as the line slackens and doubles back.

Often, trout will follow a spoon for some distance, repeatedly bumping it lightly. When this happens, a quick increase in speed usually provokes a solid strike.

Despite the commotion of boat traffic overhead, fish continue feeding with no apparent concern, observe the Mercury folks. During these moatime sprees lake-dwelling rainbows and browns show little fear of men and equipment.

So don't "spare the horses" the next time conditions are right. Most game fish can handle themselves quite well in an aquatic dash.

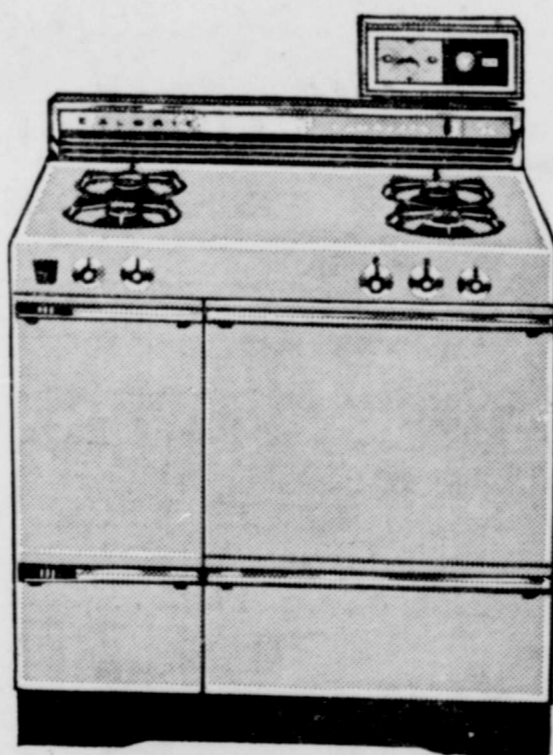

- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/4 teaspoon almond extract
- 1/2 cups golden seedless raisins
- 1/2 cup diced candied pineapple
- 1/4 cup diced candied citron
- 1/4 cup diced candied orange peel
- 1/2 cup pecans

Beat butter until soft; gradually beat in sugar until light. Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each. Resift flour with baking powder into egg mixture; stir only until blended. Stir in flavorings, fruits and nuts. Turn into greased and floured 9x5x3-inch loaf pan. Bake in slow oven (300 degrees F.) 1 1/2 hours, or until cake tests done. Cool on wire rack. Sprinkle with brandy, if desired. Carefully wrap in foil or saran. Store 4 to 6 weeks in cool place before cutting. Makes 1 (9-inch) loaf.

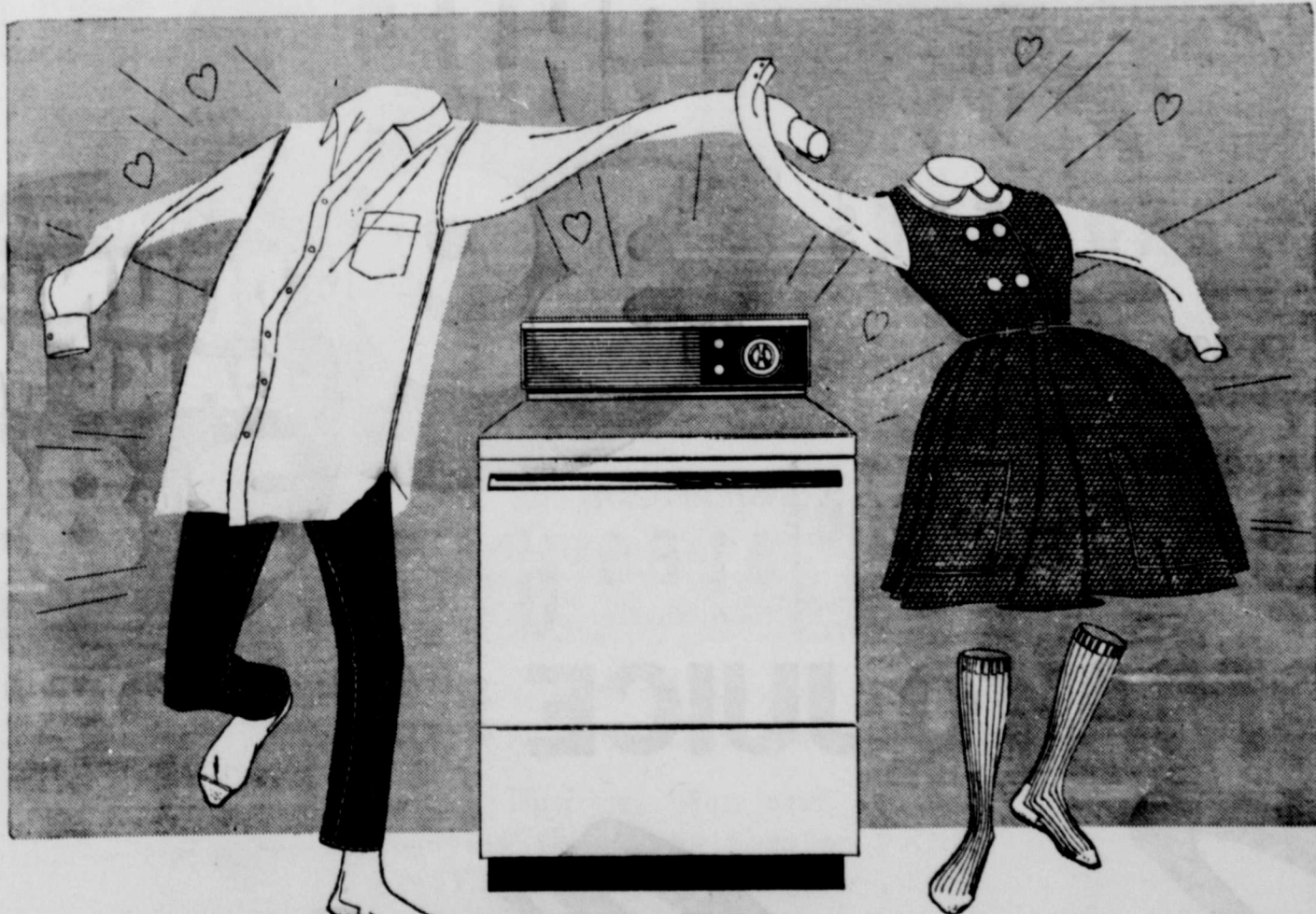
