Monday morning City Manager Jess Whatley announced all the engineering work has been completed on College Street in preparation for widening, curbing and paving. A sidewalk on the South side of the street is also included.

This street is the main thoroughfare for school children who live on the west side of town. It is narrow, rough and has no sidewalk. It is a plain hazard to the children.

The City worked up a program whereby each property owner would pay for the curbing and the City would pay for the paving, a mighty good arrangement in favor of the property owner.

Mr. Whatley stated actual work on the project would begin just as soon as the weather would permit. It is highly desirable that all the property owners in a given block be signed up before the work starts, for skips would be too expensive and time consuming to be considered.

Any property owner who hasn't already signed up is urged to please call the City Hall and a representative will call on them. The project is so vital and important that not one hour's delay should hamper the work.

BEYOND DISPUTE

The Daily Olympian of Olympia, Washington, makes a very big point in a small number of words: "... government policy works to prevent the railroads from getting business. And the public pays by being denied the benefit of competitive shipping costs. There are many aspects of the railroad problem ... about which there is plenty of room for different opinions. But that the railroads should be free to compete on an equal basis with other forms of transportation is beyond dispute — except of course, by those who profit from preferential treatment."

In this, the Olympian is in complete agreement with all the unprejudiced authorities who have studied the transportation situation. High level group after high level group has presented long and highly detailed statements of policy — and the substance of them all is that the greatest need is a relaxation of regulation.

This, for example, was the position of the late President Kennedy. In a request for congressional action on transportation legislation, he said: "There must be equality of opportunity for all modes and for all passengers and shippers. . . . There should be maximum reliance on the forces of competition . . ."

The necessary bills will be presented to the next Congress as they have to Congresses of the past. Will action which is so vital to the public interest be taken at last?

We need thinking men and women with broad vision who dare to do what they know needs to be done. Willing to pull the load not just ride on the top.

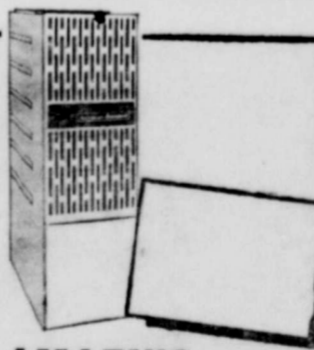

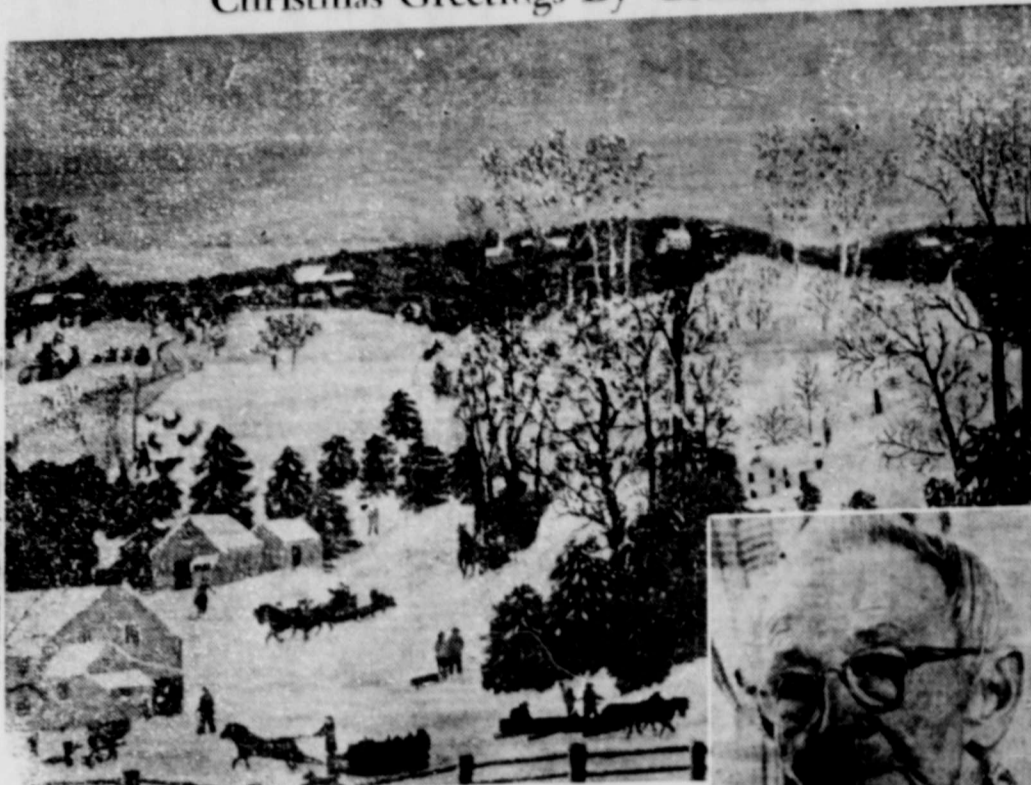

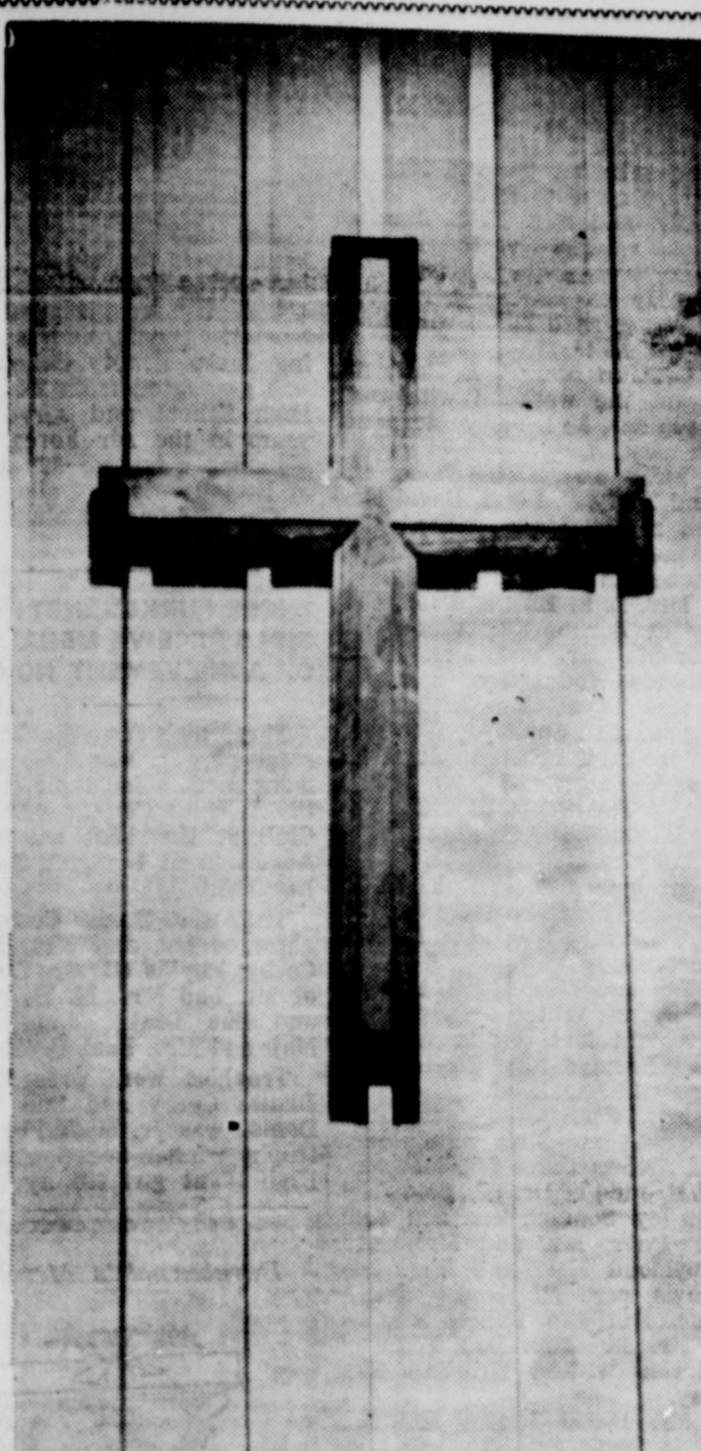

Jesse W. Osteen In Operation Steel Pike

Marine Private Jesse W. Osteen, son of Mrs. Rachael Osteen of 208 Ninth St., Burkburnett, is visiting ports in the European area following participation in the largest amphibious combat training exercise in the Atlantic since World War II.

He is serving with Headquarters Battery, Tenth Marine Regiment, Second Marine Division, Camp Lejeune, N. C.

The operation, called "Steel Pike", featured U. S. and Spanish Marines landing from landing craft and helicopters of a combined U. S.-Spanish Fleet of 94 vessels which included ships of the United States Military Sea Transport Service and chartered ships of the U. S. Merchant Fleet.

The mock assault on the beaches of Southern Spain was staged by Marines of the Second Marine Division, Second Marine Aircraft Wing and Force Troops Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic, along with a battalion of Spanish Marines.

"Steel Pike" showed the ability of the U. S. and Allied amphibious forces to rapidly transport large numbers of

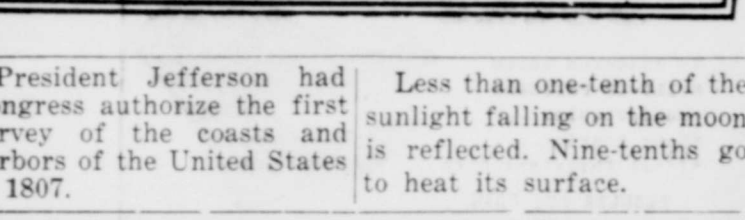

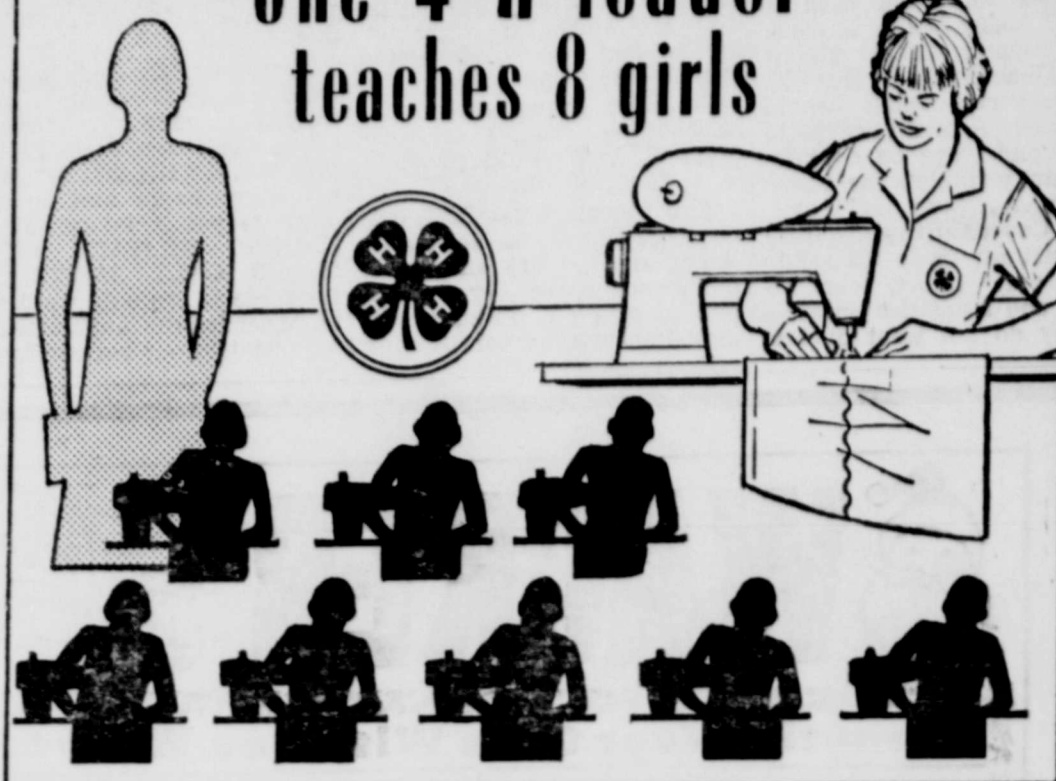
