

charge an additional premium for 15 MPH. policies issued to motorcycle policemen? If so, approximately what is the extra cost? A. While underwriting prac-

tices vary from company to company, many life insurance companies charge an extra premium of about \$2.00 per \$1.000 of insurance on motorcycle policemen, due to the extra hazards of their occupation. Motorcycle policemen also generally have to pay extra for a waiver of premium clause covering permanent, total disability. Some companies will not issue motorcycle policemen double indemnity insurance or other extra protection covering accidental death,

EXTRA HAZARDS INVOLVED

Policemen, detectives and other law enforcement officers who do not ride motorcycles can generally get life insurance at standard premium rates, . . .

Q. What are the advantages in taking out a 20-year endowment life insurance policy, rather than one carrying a lower premium?

A. The main reason for buying a 20-year endowment policy is to set up a systematic savings program to meet a long-range goal and at the same time to guargoal and at the same time to guar-antee that the goal will be achieved even if the policyholder should die in the interim. For example, such a policy is a good way to build an educational fund for very young children. Another important use is to build a re-tirement fund combined with pro-tection for the policyholder's fam-ily in case he should die before reaching retirement age. Howreaching retirement age. However, because of the high premiums involved and since the insurance protection expires when the endowment matures, most families (especially younger families with limited resources and heavy responsibilities) should not purchase endowment policies un-less they already have plenty of whole life protection under lower premium policies.

Perfect Partner for Steak

Families in the rice producing states (Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas) like big, thick, juicy steaks just as much as families in other parts of the country. But what they like to eat with their steak may differ from the steak accompaniments served elsewhere.

served elsewhere. As you may have guessed, rice is a frequent partner for steak in the southern states which produce most of the rice used in this country. For example, Mushroom-Almond Rice, a favorite recipe from the files of a Texas homemaker, is often served with steak, and with roast beef, too. It is a savory mixture of rice cooked in beef bouillon with onion then mixed with sauteed almonds and mushrooms, and it takes lots less time to prepare than it does to broil a thick beef steak. Indeed, families of the men who produce rice in this country like to eat rice in every conceivable way and rice is kept on hand at all times, uncooked and cooked — the latter stored in their refrigerators and home freezers. They know how easy it is to cook rice and how simple it is to reheat refrigerated and frozen rice. All sorts of cross currents have been at work affecting the mix of consumer spending. Since 1929 an increasing pro-portion of after-tax income has been spent for physician's services ,about the same proportion for dentists, and a smaller proportion for burial and fun eral expenses. Much more, re-latively is spent for interest on personal debt and much less on shoe cleaning and repair. Surprisingly a smaller part of after-tax income now goes for foreign travel than was the case in 1929.

Apparently over the past 35 years things have pretty well balanced out and the two broad catagories—"goods" and "ser-vices"—have taken unchanged fractions of our family incomes. There is no evidence here that we are getting fed up with either goods or services or that consumers are likely to change radically the way they divide their spending between the two.
