### News From The County Agent

Container-grown rose plants can be planted any time of the year, but many are set out during the winter and early spring months. To insure proper growth, several things should be considered.

Cut the container down to the bottom on both sides if the nurseryman has not already done so. Then dig a hole about six inches larger than the diameter and equal to the depth of the container. Remove the plant from the slit container and place it in the hole so that the bud union is about even with the soil surface.

Hybrid tea roses should be planted 24 to 30 inches apart, and floribundas should be set 16 to 24 inches apart. Newly planted roses, whether bareroot or from containers, should be watered often enough to keep the soil moist.

Using a two to three inch mulch over rose beds is highly recommended. Such a mulch will reduce the frequency of watering, keep the soil cooler to reduce both winter injury and summer drying and tend to keep down weed growth during the growing season. In applying mulches, keep the material about four inches from the bud union.

Good healthy roses, planted properly, will thrive with minimum care. The most important consideration is to keep them from drying out during the growing season

One precautionary measure contrary to many old time recommendations and the beliefs of many gardeners is this: Never put fertilizer on roses at the time of planting. This means no fertilizer of any type should be placed below or around the roots or on top of the soil surface. Any excess of fertilizer around a newly planted rose bush may do more to prevent or retard root growth than to

With the fall season well underway, dairymen should begin make sure they are ready for the colder weather that lies ahead.

Cow comfort is a major point to check for the coming months, explained B. T. Haws, county Croutettes, 2-7 Oz. Pkgs. 69c agent. A dissatisfied, uncomfortable cow is not going to perform at her best. Special attenmember, contented cows usually make a more contented dairyman.

> The county agent advises de horning now that the norma fly and screwworm season is about over. This practice will save space at the feed rack and in the shelter barn. It will also prevent injuries to cows and heartaches to the owner. There is no place for horns in the modern dairy herd, asserts Haws.

Any herd can be improved by culling lowest producers, hard breeders and least desirable cows. Feed being consumed by unproductive cows can be saved and supplied to those that will utilize it more efficiently and productively for added profits. Now is a good time to cull those cows that will not carry their part of the load during the coming w months. Carrying "dead weight" through the winter can only mean a reduction in profits

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

**Christmas Cut-Ups** 



A spreading seasonal hobby is making Christmas medallions from tin-can tops. All you need are needle-nosed pliers, an ice pick and a pair of small tin snips. Cut tin-can lid into six even divisions, leaving a dime-size uncut area in the center. Then cut each section into thin strips, taking care to cut first from the right, then from the left of the section, leaving an uncut strip down the center of section. Snips will cause thin strips on left to curl up automatically; on right, to curl down. Using pliers, you can twist these curls into any other pattern desired. The ice pick is for punching a hole to string medallion on tree.

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
