





Right-to-Work Laws Should Stand

Although organized labor professes to be dedicated to the winning of new privileges for its members, it has of states to shield their residents from involuntary union mental rights-the freedom from being forced to join a free choice from all the nation's workers. union in order to hold a job.

In furtherance of this blind policy of compulsion, officials of the AFL-CIO have launched a campaign to get the Congress to kill the laws in 20 states that now protect their residents from compulsory unionism.

The target of the drive is the provision in the Taft-Hartley Act which permits states to enact and administer right-to-work statues which guarantee the rights of workers to refuse to join a union, without sacrificing their jobs.

Union leaders are resorting to Congressional help because, despite heavy-handed campaigns in the 20 rightto-work states, they have failed to win repeal of the individual laws.

It is obvious that the residents of the states in question greatly cherish the free choice privilege and do not want to relinquish it. Just as obvious is the motivation of union leaders. They want employers to be required to enroll their employees in unions with no effort on the union's part.

The biggest mail explosion in history is upon us and we need the cooperation of everyone to make sure that the holiday mail is all delivered before Christmas," the Burkburnett Postmaster said.

He suggested the use of air mail and special delivery to guarantee pre-Christmas delivery, especially for out of town mail

codes generally mean that mail moves i a more direct route and is handled fewer times. Parcels with ZIPPED addresses may be delivered 24 hours or more before others going to the same destination which do not include the five digit code.

Postmaster Zimmerman announced that all postal operations will be on a holiday schedule Christmas Day. Only special delivery mail will be delivered on Dec. 25th.

The postal employees thank all the citizens of Burkburnett who cooperated in the "Shop and Mail Early" campaign. "It now appears that we passed the peak for outgoing mail on Dec. 21, 1964. However, there still is a small mountain of holiday mail which must be delivered, he said.

Goose is also a favorite Christmas meat. Instead of turkey, the Norwegians serve such meat dishes as roast ribs of pork, pictled pork or barbecued young pig. Popular in Poland is chopped meat rolled in cabbage served with vege-tables and sour cream. It is called

golumpi. Hungarian families serve cakes in the shape of horseshoes and filled with poppy seeds or walnuts. Flat hard cakes in the shape of beasts, birds or fish ere traditional in Holland.

Germany has many traditional Christmas foods, not the least popular of which is the Christmas cake called Pfeffernüsse. Characteristic of France Is the truffled turkey and black pud-ding. The first course of the Finnish Christmas dinner is dried codfish served with boiled potato and cream

Regardless of the foods served or the tradition back of various dishes. Christmas dinners everywhere abound

HINTS

Plants received as Christmas gifts will last longer with proper care. Foliage plants should be watered when top of soil is barely moist to touch, then only enough so that soil is moist. Feed plants about once a month and do not overheat them. Glossy leaved plants need an occasional sponging off with lukewarm water. Keep sun-loving plants in a sunny spot and out of drafts.

To make an attractive "last minute" Holiday table decoration, fill one or two hurricane lamps with orna-ments, place evergreen twigs or holly leaves around them and add a few ornaments to the greens. Or use a candle and a piece of plastic foam. Stick twigs of everygreens, holly, etc., into the foam and wire cones, clusters of berries into the greens.

If you buy a "living" Christmas tree this year for transplanting later, do not keep it indoors more than a week, or the tree will dry out in the warm, dry air of the house. The tree should not be loaded with too many heated bulbs. Deal with a reliable nursery and purchase freshly dug tree with large root ball. Follow their directions carefully to transplant.

For an extra festive touch to your Holiday punch bowl try adding decorative tce instead of regular tce cubes. Freeze water tinted with red or green food color; freeze for at least 24 hours, whole fruits such as lemons, grape bunches, etc.; fill tce cube tray % with cooled boiled water. Freeze, then top each cube with red and green cherry halves, or fresh cranberry and mint sprig, then add more water and refreeze.

For prettily wrapped packages that can be enjoyed the year round, wrap lids and bottoms separately, so the tops can be removed without destroying the effect. Use bright remnants of satin, calico, chintz, mitering the corners, and securing the edges inside lid and box with glue. Tim with lace, braid, ribbons, fake flowers, other scraps from the sewing box.

For the children when you serve the traditional egg nog to grown-ups: A bowl of Fruit Nog, made with milk, eggs, and vanilla ice cream, topped with scoops of orange sherbet and served with short colored straws. Festive, delicious, and good for the youngsters.

For an unusual gift, especially attractive to a girl of almost any age, why not a small Christmas tree decorated with "beauty gifts," such as tiny bottles of perfume, an atomizer, hair spray in purse size, a pretty sleeping cap, eyebrow pencil, eyeshadow, per-haps purse size lipsticks, nail polish. Cotton balls in colors, along with small ornaments will help decorate the tree. the tree.

Why not create your own special Christmas tree this year? Cut a small, well-shaped tree of almost any watety, with or without leaves. Make up "soap" snow by blending very small amount of water and kerry Snow, added a little at a time in your largest mixing bowl and beating until very, very dry. May require several bowls of "snow" depending on the size of your tree. Start at top and apply snow to branches and leaves, mounding up to resemble real snow. When thoroughly dry, drying at least over-night, decorate as any traditional tree. Colored lights or colored spotlights are especially effective with this tree. tree.

For attractive "made at home" gift containers, spray cardboard tubes from wax paper, aluminum foil, rolls of paper toweling, round cereal boxes, with red, green, gold or silver enamel spray paint, purchased at hard-ware or variety stores. These can be decorated while paint is still wet with small color flecks, sequins, etc., or after drying with the new contact tapes.

Serve something simple the day before or after the Christmas feast. Perhaps mugs of hot soup or oyster stew, small sandwiches and salad. The rich foods of the Holiday feast will be enjoyed more for having eaten the plain foods the day before.



FOLLOWING THE BIRDS Men, birds and fish have much in common. Take the matter of seasonal temperatures, for example.

With the approach of cold weather, those creatures that are able to do so move south for the winter.

The migration habits of fish, mainly the saltwater varieties, are as well defined as those of waterfowl or human sun-seekers, comment the fishing enthusiasts at Mercury outboards.

This nomadic trait causes fishermen either "feasts" or "famine," depending on the coastal angler's ability and in-clination to follow his favorite sport to the temperate feeding grounds.

The "big prizes"-tuna, sailfish, marlin and swordfish-all drift south, some remaining in waters accessible to winter anglers, others crossing the equator to distant points.

The various and wide-ranging members of the Atlantic mackerel family, which migrate north in the summer, usually take up winter residence along the lower Florida coast. Pacific mackerel seek out the depths in cold weather, nearly disappearing altogether.

Except for a few resident fish which remain in southern Florida, winter sees almost total departure of the esteemed tarpon. Popular bluefish simply seem to vanish. Channel bass follow no regular pattern, moving off-shore, inshore or fading from the scene for the acason-de-pending on the locality. Some striped base bask in the sun; others await spring under the ice. Sea trout may reverse the general trend by showing up in northern areas during the cold months.-

Migratory fish bave one trait in common. Prior to embarking for distant shores they feed heavily, providing red-hot fighing for autumn anglers.



WHAT STARTED THIS CUSTOM?

Many years ago it was the custom to exchange gifts in January to ensure a lucky New Year. In some manner this custom was trans-ferred to Christmas and the seasonable gift became expected on the day after the feast, or Boxing Day.

Influencing this custom was the earthen savings-box which had to be broken to remove its treasures. It is still used in Holland, usually in the shape of a pig and it is called the "Feast Pig." Another explanation is the alms-box of the early church. Its con-tents were kept until the day after Christmas and for that reason it was called Boxies Day.

It was called Boxing Day. There are others who say the custom is merely a gratuity, similar to the Arabic backsheesh. It was regarded as the right of all who performed a service for others during the year to look for back-sheesh at Christmas.

Christmas boxing among tradesmen continued for many years on Boxing Day. From this old custom, perhaps, comes today's prac-fice of exchanging gifts is beautifully wrapped and decorated gift bases.

## **ECONOMY OR DISARMAMENT?**

Recent news in regard to dis-mantling of our military bases indicate that the Defense Department is Rapidly carrying out the Disarmament of the United States. We are now in the Second Stage of Disarmament.
