### Expressway From Red River To Wichita Falls Is Now Open Holiday Traffic Moving Fast

Burkburnett residents are happy that the North 6 1/3 segment of the Red River Expressway was open this week.

The Southern portion of the Expressway from the Park Road to Bacon Branch has been open for several months.

The opening of this last segment in Texas now clears the way from Wichita Falls, Oklahoma City, connecting with the H. E. Bailey Turnpike at Red River. The opening of the Turnpike from the river to a point west of Randlett, Oklahoma, is a toll road to Oklahoma. The portion from Red River South in Texas is a toll road.

A new bridge across Red River connecting with south side traffic was completed many months ago.

Winter Strain Constructors Co. of San Angelo was contractor on the north segment near Burkburnett.

E. B. Dean, district engineer for the Texas Highway Department, said the department is "hoping to extend the expressway leg extending south of Wichita Falls to the Clay County line in February."

For the 14th consecutive year, a Burkburnett man — with his wife's aid — is preparing to assume his traditional role as jolly Saint Nick for the boys and girls of this community. This volunteer emissary of Christmas cheer and good will is Russell Duvall, who, since 1950, has been making Christmas a more meaningful experience for youngsters of this area.

Duvall, a civilian employee at Sheppard Air Force Base, admits that he enjoys acting the part of Santa for the simple pleasure of bringing joy to children, especially to those who may not realize many of the good things at Christmas time. With warmth and conviction, Duvall says that "A child is a child, regardless of race, color or creed." He tries to bring joy to all.

has many invitations to appear at Christmas programs in the community. Church groups and Boy Scouts often call on him to fulfill the role of Santa at Christmas parties. Duvall has also included another age group for his performances. He says many elderly people are often forgotten and he makes an effort to visit them in rest homes and in their own homes.

Senior citizens often tell Duvall that it is "so good to be remembered."

Duvall and his wife repair and recondition toys donated by people of Burkburnett and the area. Many civic organizations, women's clubs, church groups and Scouts collect new and used toys, along with personnel from SAFB and public officials.

The Duvalls are members of the Church of Christ and have made their home for 25 years at 612 1/2 East Second Street, where Mrs. Duvall maintains an office as a tax consultant. Duvall has been a painter connected with the 3750th Engineering Group at SAFB for 16 years.

Come Christmas Eve, next

Thursday, Duvall will be setting up his portable workshop gaily decorated, on Main Street. He will have his sleigh ready to offer rides to the children.

The sleigh is powered with realistic-looking reindeer, including the famous Rudolph.

On Christmas Eve, Santa passes out bags of goodies to the children. The fruit, nuts and candy are furnished by the Burkburnett merchants and chamber of commerce members and their wives helping with the packaging.

After offering rides to the youngsters and distributing Christmas candies, Duvall will be ready to pay visits to children.

The Duvalls say that the kind and generous people who still believe in the meaning of Christmas and maintain faith in the good make the program possible.

The Burkburnett Chamber of Commerce has presented Mr. and Mrs. Duvall with a special community award for meritorious service to the community.

## Right-to-Work Laws Should Stand

Although organized labor professes to be dedicated to the winning of new privileges for its members, it has adamantly refused to grant them one of the most fundamental rights—the freedom from being forced to join a union in order to hold a job.

In furtherance of this blind policy of compulsion, officials of the AFL-CIO have launched a campaign to get the Congress to kill the laws in 20 states that now protect their residents from compulsory unionism.

The target of the drive is the provision in the Taft-Hartley Act which permits states to enact and administer right-to-work statutes which guarantee the rights of workers to refuse to join a union, without sacrificing their jobs.

Union leaders are resorting to Congressional help because, despite heavy-handed campaigns in the 20 right-to-work states, they have failed to win repeal of the individual laws.

It is obvious that the residents of the states in question greatly cherish the free choice privilege and do not want to relinquish it. Just as obvious is the motivation of union leaders. They want employers to be required to enroll their employees in unions with no effort on the union's part.

It seems to us that if the Congress takes any action in the matter at all, it should be to strengthen the rights

of states to shield their residents from involuntary union membership, rather than to remove the last vestige of free choice from all the nation's workers.

#### Carlight In Camp

If you find yourself in the predicament of setting up camp after nightfall, don't fumble around doing the job by lantern light. Use your car's headlights to illuminate the area.

#### Check and Double Check

Before casting off, a wise skipper makes a careful inspection of his rig. He should make sure there is ample gas aboard as well as life preservers and emergency gear. Also he should check to be doubly certain that steering controls and fuel lines are properly connected—points often overlooked.





### It's Too Late To Mail

"It's too late to mail early, so please mail now," Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman said today. "The biggest mail explosion in history is upon us and we need the cooperation of everyone to make sure that the holiday mail is all delivered before Christmas," the Burkburnett Postmaster said.  
He suggested the use of air mail and special delivery to guarantee pre-Christmas delivery, especially for out of town mail.  
In all instances, the use of ZIP Codes will be helpful. The codes generally mean that mail moves in a more direct route and is handled fewer times. Parcels with ZIPED addresses may be delivered 24 hours or more before others going to the same destination which do not include the five digit code.  
Postmaster Zimmerman announced that all postal operations will be on a holiday schedule Christmas Day. Only special delivery mail will be delivered on Dec. 25th.  
The postal employees thank all the citizens of Burkburnett who cooperated in the "Shop and Mail Early" campaign. "It now appears that we passed the peak for outgoing mail on Dec. 21, 1964. However, there still is a small mountain of holiday mail which must be delivered," he said.

In America, the favorite Christmas dish is turkey and dressing with traditional cranberry sauce. Other countries have their favorite foods. In Austria, for example, raisins, currants, chopped figs and dates are made into a cake called Fruchtbrot and served hot.

Czechoslovaks serve baked carp with spicy sauce on Christmas Eve. In Denmark, the Christmas meat is goose. Plum pudding and mincemeat have long been favorites with the English. In Sweden, the main dish at dinner is roast pig served with bright red apple in its mouth. Goose is also a favorite Christmas meat. Instead of turkey, the Norwegians serve such meat dishes as roast ribs of pork, pickled pork or barbecued and young pig.

Popular in Poland is chopped meat rolled in cabbage served with vegetables and sour cream. It is called golumpi.

Hungarian families serve cakes in the shape of horseshoes and filled with poppy seeds or walnuts. Flat hard cakes in the shape of beasts, birds or fish are traditional in Holland.

Germany has many traditional Christmas foods, not the least popular of which is the Christmas cake called Pfefferkuche. Characteristic of France is the truffled turkey and black pudding. The first course of the Finnish Christmas dinner is dried codfish served with boiled potato and cream sauce.

Regardless of the foods served or the tradition back of various dishes, Christmas dinners everywhere abound with good cheer and good fellowship.

# HINTS

for a Happy Holiday



Plants received as Christmas gifts will last longer with proper care. Foliage plants should be watered when top of soil is barely moist to touch, then only enough so that soil is moist. Feed plants about once a month and do not overheat them. Glossy leaved plants need an occasional sponging off with lukewarm water. Keep sun-loving plants in a sunny spot and out of drafts.

To make an attractive "last minute" Holiday table decoration, fill one or two hurricane lamps with ornaments, place evergreen twigs or holly leaves around them and add a few ornaments to the greens. Or use a candle and a piece of plastic foam. Stick twigs of evergreens, holly, etc., into the foam and wire cones, clusters of berries into the greens.

If you buy a "living" Christmas tree this year for transplanting later, do not keep it indoors more than a week, or the tree will dry out in the warm, dry air of the house. The tree should not be loaded with too many heated bulbs. Deal with a reliable nursery and purchase freshly dug tree with large root ball. Follow their directions carefully to transplant.

For an extra festive touch to your Holiday punch bowl try adding decorative ice instead of regular ice cubes. Freeze water tinted with red or green food color; freeze for at least 24 hours, whole fruits such as lemons, grape bunches, etc.; fill ice cube tray 3/4 with cooled boiled water. Freeze, then top each cube with red and green cherry halves, or fresh cranberry and mint sprig, then add more water and refresh.

For prettily wrapped packages that can be enjoyed the year round, wrap lids and bottoms separately, so the tops can be removed without destroying the effect. Use bright remnants of satin, calico, chintz, mitering the corners, and securing the edges inside lid and box with glue. Trim with lace, braid, ribbons, fake flowers, other scraps from the sewing box.

For the children when you serve the traditional egg nog to grow-up: A bowl of Fruit Nog, made with milk, eggs and vanilla ice cream, topped with scoops of orange sherbet and served with short colored straws. Festive, delicious, and good for the youngsters.

For an unusual gift, especially attractive to a girl of almost any age, why not a small Christmas tree decorated with "beauty gifts," such as tiny bottles of perfume, an atomizer, hair spray in purse size, a pretty sleeping cap, eyebrow pencil, eyeshadow, perhaps purse size lipstick, nail polish. Cotton balls in colors, along with small ornaments will help decorate the tree.

Why not create your own special Christmas tree this year? Cut a small, well-shaped tree of almost any variety, with or without leaves. Make up "snow" by blending very small amount of water and Ivory Snow, added a little at a time in your largest mixing bowl and beating until very, very dry. May require several bowls of "snow" depending on the size of your tree. Start at top and apply snow to branches and leaves, mounding up to resemble real snow. When thoroughly dry, drying at least overnight, decorate as any traditional tree. Colored lights or colored spotlights are especially effective with this tree.

For attractive "made at home" gift containers, spray cardboard tubes from wax paper, aluminum foil, rolls of paper toweling, round cereal boxes, with red, green, gold or silver enamel spray paint, purchased at hardware or variety stores. These can be decorated while paint is still wet with small color flecks, sequins, etc., or after drying with the new contact tapes.

Serve something simple the day before or after the Christmas feast. Perhaps mugs of hot soup or oyster stew, small sandwiches and salad. The rich foods of the Holiday feast will be enjoyed more for having eaten the plain foods the day before.

**FOLLOWING THE BIRDS**  
Men, birds and fish have much in common. Take the matter of seasonal temperatures, for example.

With the approach of cold weather, those creatures that are able to do so move south for the winter.

The migration habits of fish, mainly the saltwater varieties, are as well defined as those of waterfowl or human sun-seekers, comment the fishing enthusiasts at Mercury outboards.

This nomadic trait causes fishermen either "feasts" or "famines," depending on the coastal angler's ability and inclination to follow his favorite sport to the temperate feeding grounds.

The "big prizes"—tuna, sailfish, marlin and swordfish—aid drift south, some remaining in waters accessible to winter anglers, others crossing the equator to distant points.

The various and wide-ranging members of the Atlantic mackerel family, which migrate north in the summer, usually take up winter residence along the lower Florida coast. Pacific mackerel seek out the depths in cold weather, nearly disappearing altogether.

Except for a few resident fish which remain in southern Florida, winter sees almost total departure of the esteemed tarpon. Popular bluefish simply seem to vanish. Channel bass follow no regular pattern, moving offshore, inshore or feeding from the scene for the season—depending on the locality. Some striped bass bask in the sun; others await spring under the ice. Sea trout may reverse the general trend by showing up in northern areas during the cold months.

Migratory fish have one trait in common. Prior to embarking for distant shores they feed heavily, providing red-hot flensing for autumn anglers.

#### WHAT STARTED THIS CUSTOM?

Many years ago it was the custom to exchange gifts in January to ensure a lucky New Year. In some manner this custom was transferred to Christmas and the seasonal gift became expected on the day after the feast, or Boxing Day.

Influencing this custom was the earthen savings-box which had to be broken to remove its treasures. It is still used in Holland, usually in the shape of a pig and it is called the "Feast Pig."

Another explanation is the alms-box of the early church, its contents were kept until the day after Christmas and for that reason it was called Boxing Day.

There are others who say the custom is merely a gratuity, similar to the Arabic backsheesh, it was regarded as the right of all who performed a service for others during the year to look for backsheesh at Christmas.

Christmas boxing among tradesmen continued for many years on Boxing Day. From this old custom, perhaps, comes today's practice of exchanging gifts in beautifully wrapped and decorated gift boxes.

### Denmark First Country to Offer Christmas Seals

Christmas Seal sale is an annual institution and offers at the Christmas season an opportunity for all to aid in the fight against tuberculosis.

The idea was originated in Denmark by a postal clerk named Einar Holball in 1903. It was his idea that a special Christmas stamp could be issued to be placed on mail in addition to regular postage. The funds from this sale were to be used to build a hospital for the children of Copenhagen.

In 1904, with the help of King Christian and other prominent citizens, the first Christmas seals were printed and sold at regular post offices in Denmark. Each had a portrait of the Queen of Denmark, encircled by a wreath of roses. Printed at the top was the word, Jelum, a Danish word for Christmas. The date of issue was printed at the bottom.

Two years later Norway adopted the plan. In 1907 a Danish immigrant to the United States became interested.

As a result of combined efforts of a number of prominent Americans the first stamps were placed on sale December 7, 1907 at the post office at Wilmington, Delaware. The design was simple: a half wreath of holly and a cross with "Merry Christmas" at the center and "Happy New Year" at the bottom. In 1919 the double-barred Cross of Lorraine was selected as the permanent emblem. A new design is selected each year, featuring the cross of Lorraine.

In the early years the American Red Cross sponsored the sale of these seals. In 1920 the National Tuberculosis Association began to carry on the Christmas Seal sale alone, as it has done ever since.

More than 3,000 organizations are affiliated with the National Tuberculosis Association. Since 1907 the disease has dropped from first to seventh as a cause of death in the United States. 45 countries now sell the seals.

### NAMES of Christmas

The likeliest derivation of our own "Christmas" is from the Hebrew "mas" which means tribute.

| 3 tablespoons Bourbon or Rum                  | 1 unbaked pastry shell, 9 inches |
| 1 cup sugar                                   | 3 eggs                           |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt                             | 1/2 cup heavy cream              |
| 2 tablespoons melted butter                   | 1/2 cup dark corn syrup          |
| 2 cups thinly sliced pecans, (two 3-oz. cans) | 1 teaspoon vanilla               |

Line 9-inch pie plate with pastry, flute edge and set aside. Beat eggs well. Stir in remaining ingredients. Pour mixture into unbaked pie shell. Bake in hot oven (400°) about 35 minutes, or until crust is browned and filling is slightly puffy. Cool, on rack, to room temperature before serving. (Filling will flatten a bit and become firm on cooling. If prepared long in advance, wrap in foil and freeze after cooling. When needed, bring out of freezer and let thaw to room temperature before serving.) Yield—8 servings.

### TOPPING

- (optional, but oh so good!)
- 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped
  - Sugar to taste
  - 1/2 teaspoon aromatic bitters (about 4 good dashes)
- Blend whipped cream, sugar and bitters together. Give a good dollop to each wedge of pie. Enuf said.

### Decorating On A Bride's Budget . . .

Decorating on a shoestring as many young marrieds have discovered, can bring results that are as attractive and satisfying as any high-priced decorating consultant could produce. If you have a healthy budget for redoing a room, it's wise to consult an expert who can bring your ideas to fruition quickly or offer dramatic schemes of his own. But if time and imagination are what you have to spend, go ahead and try it on your own.

Lipstick, powder and paint have transformed many a Plain Jane into a Lovely Lady. You can observe a similar metamorphosis in a single room, or a whole house, with knowing application of elbow grease, sandpaper, paint and wallpaper. Inexpensive in comparison to the dramatic effects it can create, wallpaper in the hands of an imaginative decorator has more uses than its name implies.

Used as a wallcovering it can provide texture, color and pattern in a room. It can serve as neutral background for a multi-hued color scheme or as a contrast in pattern scale. With scenic illustrations or an unusual pattern, it can become the focal point for a room's decor. It can give illusions of height, width or depth to minimize a room's architectural defects.

With remnants of wallpaper from a major decorating job, you can cover kitchen canisters, bedroom or bathroom wastebaskets, create a matched set of desk accessories, camouflage an old chest for a child's room or cut out gay designs and apply them to walls or chests.

In recent years the vast array of patterns, colors and textures in wallpaper designs has been handsomely supplemented by matching fabrics. Today's home decorator can make small rooms seem larger by correla-

ting designs in draperies, upholstery or slip covers, and wallpaper.

The up-to-date wallpaper designers have expanded their realm beyond the flower-sprigged Victorian prints of Grandma's day. If you want to match kitchen tiles or living room accessories or a paint color that's particularly exciting, chances are you'll find the pattern you want in wallpaper. Take a look at the new textured and flocked wallcoverings—more expensive but often worth the price if you want to create a real sensation.

If you have courage to experiment, you'll discover a boldly patterned wallpaper can practically decorate a room for you, and inexpensively since you minimize the need for pictures or other wall hangings. A paper in a formal or scenic design is particularly well suited to increase the importance of a small ill-lit foyer.

A small bedroom will feel light and airy if the proper paper covers the walls. Wallpapers with small all-over patterns can give the effect of expanding a room. Provincial and traditional patterns are handsome in playroom, den, bedroom or an informal living room. All-over patterns are practical because they are less apt to show soil. They're easy to hang because the pattern repeats frequently.

In bathrooms and powder rooms, wallpaper in a bright, gay design can tell a whimsical story or utilize unusual colors that would be unsuitable in larger rooms. Plastic-treated or water-resistant paper comes clean of sticky fingerprints or grease spots with just the swipe of a damp sponge.

The beauty of wallpaper is that it continues to fit, without great expense, into a grand plan for decorating. If your first scheme for a room begins to look bland and unexciting, it's easy to spice up the arrangement with brand new walls.



**Impress Guests with Pecan Pie**



If you want to enjoy pecan pie to the fullest, then serve it after a light meal. It is luscious and rich and one of the most impressive desserts you can set before a guest. Given here is a basic recipe with directions for date and fudge nut variations.

**DELUXE PECAN PIE**

- 1 unbaked 9-inch pastry shell
- 3 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 cup Karo all purpose syrup
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons melted margarine
- 1 cup pecans

Mix eggs, syrup, sugar, vanilla, salt and margarine. Stir in pecans. Pour into pastry shell. Bake in 400 degrees F. (hot) oven 15 minutes; reduce heat to 350 degrees F (moderate) and bake an additional 30 to 35 minutes. (Filling should be slightly less set in center than around edge.)

Deluxe Date Nut Pie: Follow recipe for Deluxe Pecan Pie, substituting 1/2 cup walnut halves for pecans and adding 1 cup finely chopped dates with nuts.

Fudge Nut Pie: Follow recipe for Deluxe Pecan Pie melting 2 squares unsweetened chocolate with margarine and reducing eggs to 2.

If a tiny fraction of the money that is invested in activities that

Final scene? Mom sticks her head out of the window, sees how Dad has maneuvered the youngsters into doing the work . . . and we see Mom heading across the lawn toward the hammock. Our hunch is that Mom is carrying ice water in that pitcher in her hands. We would hate to be that Dad, any second now.

The Christmas card originated from the "school pieces" which were popular in the early nineteenth century. Elaborate presswork, forming scrolls and designs, were usually the basic pattern. School boys carefully prepared them to point out the progress they had made in chirography and composition. The first Christmas card proper is said to have been placed on sale in 1846. It was printed in lithography and colored by hand. Twenty 4,000 were sold. Cards for Christmas really caught the fancy about 1862.

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


