GAINS OR LOSSES?

The AFL-CIO Executive Council has announced a legislative program for the coming year. It includes repeal of that provision of the Taft-Hartley Law which permits the states to adopt right-to-work laws banning compulsory union membership; an increase in the minimum wage to \$2 an hour, and reduction of the work week to 35 hours.

The Council has a perfect right to advocate these moves. But it is essential that the other side be heard too. There is nothing "antilabor" or "antiunion" about right-to-work. It simply gives each worker the privilege of deciding for himself whether or not he wants to join. Neither the union nor management can coerce him either way on pain of losing his livelihood. And there is every reason to believe that this makes for better unions — because they must gain their membership and their income on the basis of service rendered, not on the basis of compulsion.

The large proposed increase in the minimum wage would in all probability hurt those it is supposed to aid. Unskilled people, whose productivity would not justify the pay, would find it more and more difficult to obtain employment. And they thus would be denied the opportunity to gain experience and to learn skills that would justify more responsible, better-paying work.

The cut in the work week would in its turn, greatly increase the cost of doing business. The result would be higher prices — that is, more inflation. And everyone, the low-income groups most of all, would be the sufferers.

Labor can be justifiably proud of the great gains it has made. Its leaders should take care that demands for compulsion and artificially crowded gains do not turn into losses.

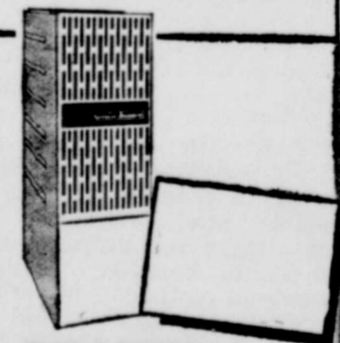

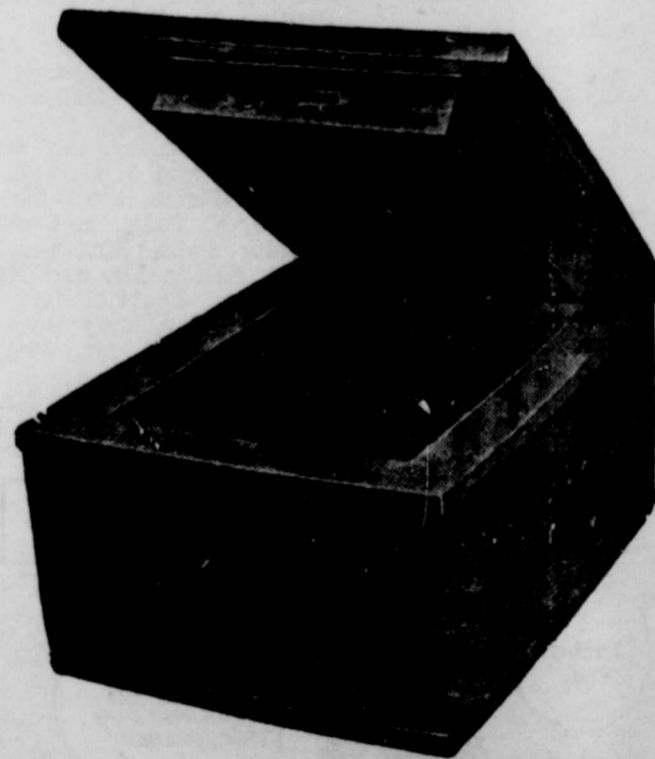

"Oh, said the teacher with a sigh of relief. "That's all right, I was afraid you were engaged in prayer."

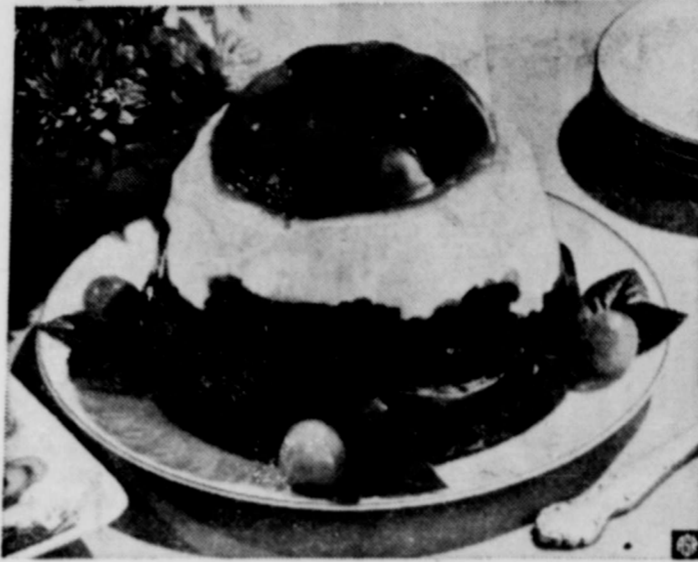

High and Handsome Cherry Mold Layered with Sour Cream Dressing



Canned sweet cherries, plump and pretty, shine from this orange-wine gelatin salad. Frozen raspberries and their juice add color and flavor, too. The center layer is a blend of sour cream and melted marshmallow, a delicious dressing with each serving. A shimmering jewel-like salad to crown a luncheon or buffet meal.

Northwest canned sweet cherries, either the dark delicious Bings or the lovely light Royal Annes, make all fruit salads extra special. Available any time of year at the market, these canned cherries are a cook's delight. They lend themselves well to use in cakes, cobblers and pastries as well as salads. It's fun to have a can of each on hand, but light and dark canned sweet cherries can be used interchangeably.

Cherry Jubilee Salad

- 1 (1 lb.) can dark or light sweet cherries
- 1 (10 oz.) package frozen raspberries
- 2 cups cherry syrup and water
- 2 (3 oz.) packages orange-flavored gelatin
- 1/2 cup sherry wine
- 1/2 cup lemon juice

Drain cherries and raspberries, reserving syrups. Add water to cherry syrup to make 2 cups. Heat cherry syrup and add gelatin. Stir to dissolve. Remove from heat, add sherry, lemon juice and raspberry syrup. Chill till partially set. Fold raspberries and cherries into gelatin. Pour one-fourth of gelatin mixture into mold. Chill until almost set. Add a middle layer of:

- 1 cup miniature marshmallows, melted
- 1 cup dairy sour cream

Blend together in double boiler. Cool before pouring into mold. Chill until set. Add remaining gelatin mixture. Allow to set several hours or overnight before serving. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

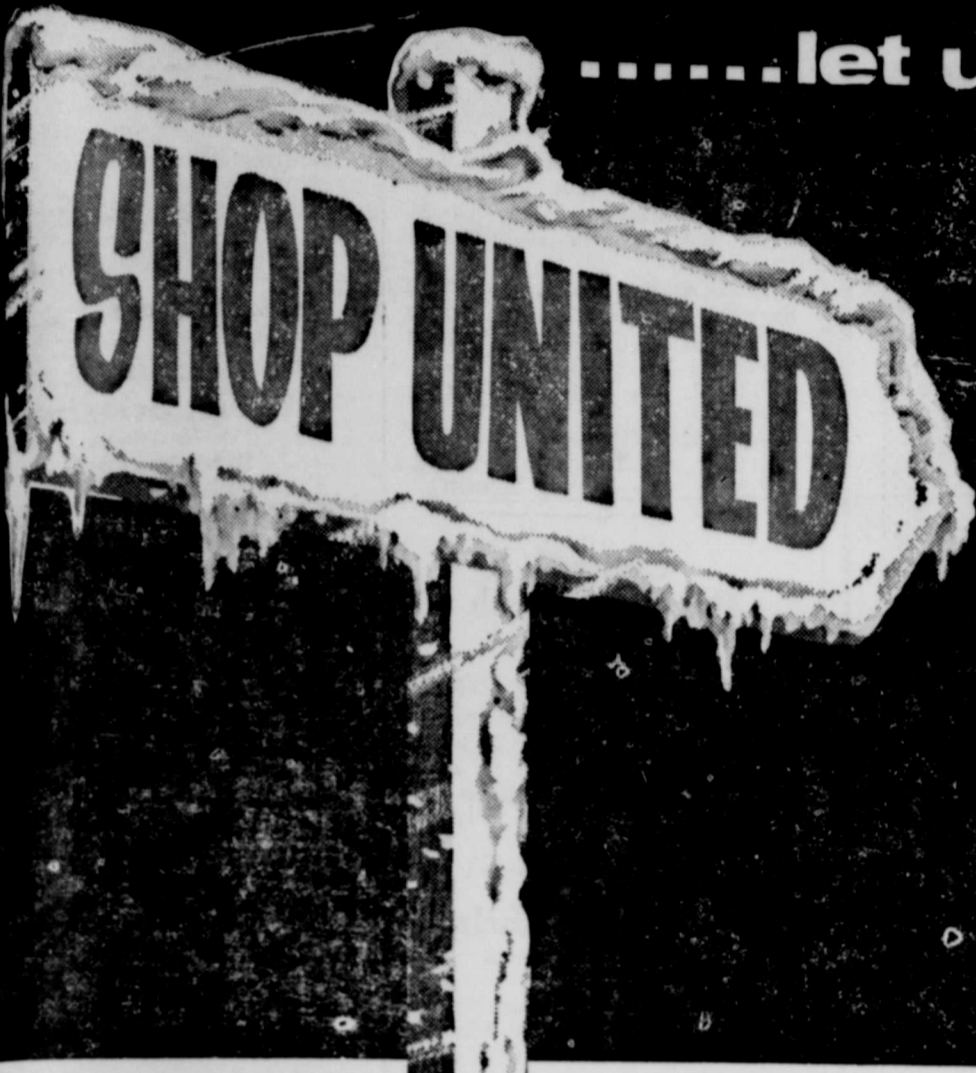

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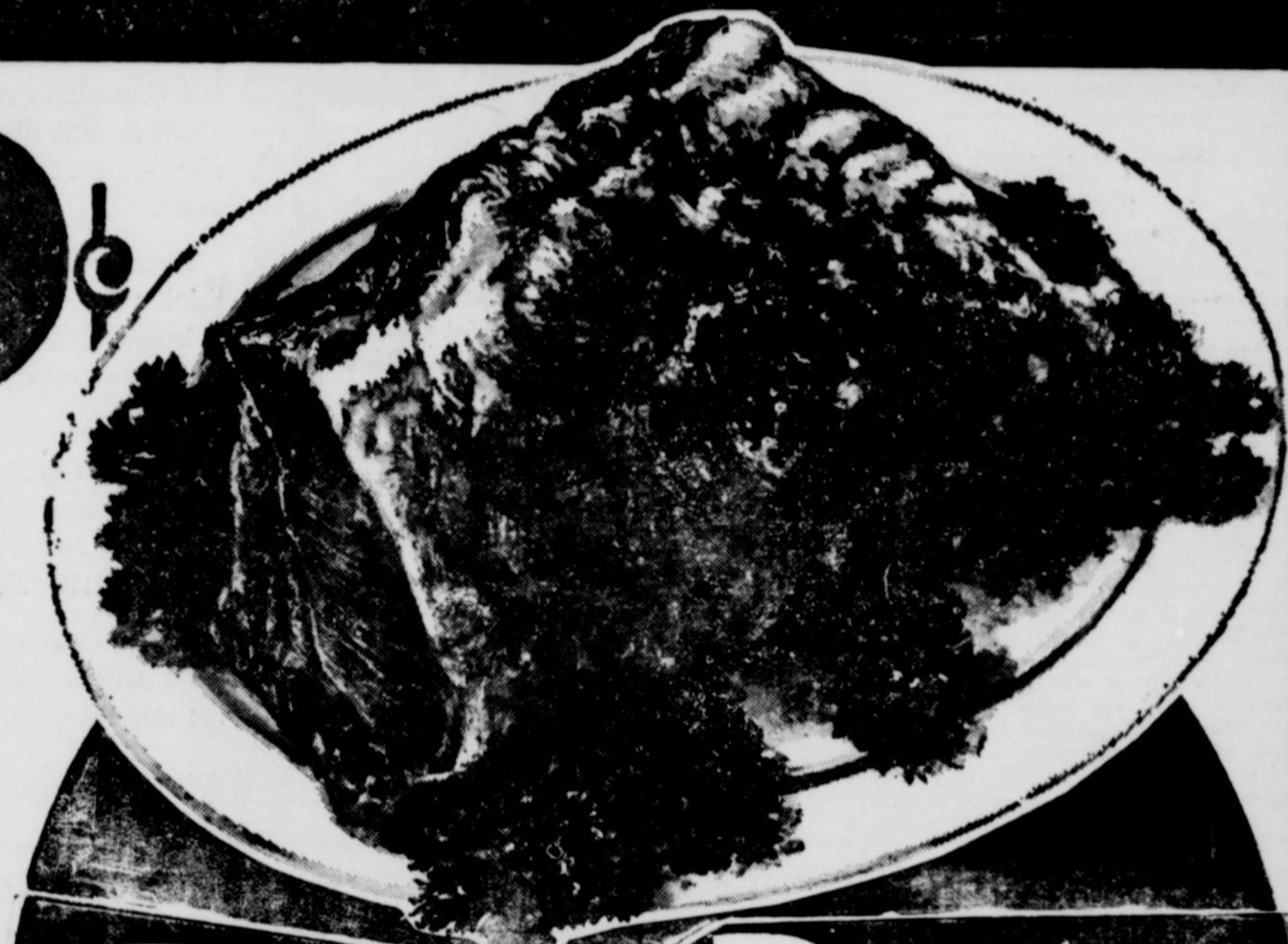

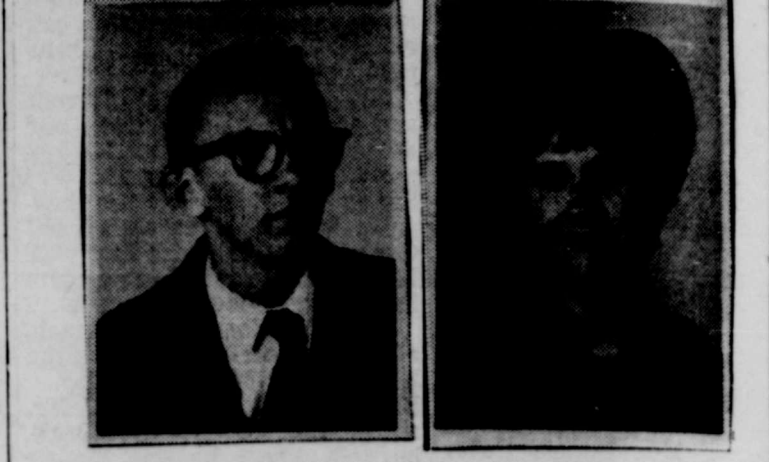
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Properly fertilized lawns and gardens get off to a good start in the spring, and a soil test is just the thing to determine what fertilizer to use.
Soils must be fertile to keep lawn grasses green and growing and to keep gardens producing good quality fresh vegetables. Soil fertility and amount of fertilizer to add can be determined by laboratory tests, with due consideration being given to the plant or crop, soil properties and past treatment.
It's a simple process to take a soil sample for testing, according to B. T. Haws, county agent.
To take a lawn sample, scrape off the surface litter and dig up a small slice of the top two or three inches of soil. Repeat at 10 different places, mix the portions together in a clean bucket and remove about a pint to be used for testing.
Use the same procedure in a garden, says Haws, but remove a slice to plow depth, or about the top six inches of soil. Normally, one sample is enough for each lawn or garden area. However, if a problem exists, separate composite samples from good and bad areas may supply information that will help in the diagnosis.
A soil test will not determine the presence of plant disease, soil insects or causes for poor growth not due to lack of fertility. When samples are taken, however, to help determine if plant growth is poor, a complete description of appearance of the plants and disease symptoms should be included on an information sheet submitted with the samples.
This information sheet, which includes instructions for a sampling, is available along with soil cartons at the County Extension office. It should be completed and sent with the sample to the Soil Testing Laboratory at Texas A and M University, or Soil Testing Laboratory, Seymour, Texas, along with a \$2.00 per sample testing fee. Results from the test will usually be available in about two weeks.

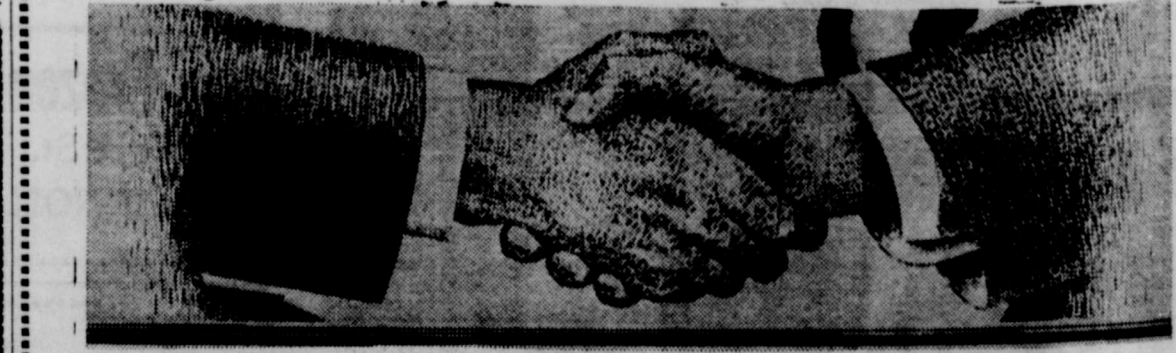

many home owners throw away materials that could be saved for use in improving their soil. Leaves, grass clippings, old tomato plants, bean vines, even weeds can be turned into fertilizer for next summer's gardens.
Such materials, after they have wintered in compost, make excellent organic matter. Compost, spread around trees and shrubs and worked into the soil in flowers and vegetable gardens, makes the earth rich and porous. It loosens the ground so that roots can develop naturally, and air, moisture, and plant food can penetrate easily.
Here's how you go about making a compost pile.
Select a spot at the back of your lot, yet within reach of your garden hose. (That's because the pile should be kept moist.) Use ordinary wire fencing or boards to enclose an area 3 to 8 feet high and 3 to 5 feet square.
Dump leaves, lawn clippings, and garden trash into the bin in layers 6 to 12 inches thick. To each layer add some commercial fertilizer (whatever you use on your lawn) and 1-2 layer of soil.
Moisten the leaves as they are added.
Keep building up the pile as you accumulate material. Top
