

# C-C Group City Manager

Jess Whatley, City Manager, spoke to the Chamber of Commerce luncheon Monday noon in Town Hall. It was a question and answer session concerning the City's water supply.

In 1953 the City had 50 water wells on pump. In 1964 the number had grown to 72. One day last year town. Total for the year was 356,000,000 gallons.

According to Mr. Whatley one knows just how long the wells will stand up at full production, but it is felt generally that other sources of water must be found, or wells drilled which have a much greater producing capacity than those now in

Two prospective sources are foresceable now. Wichita Falls may be able to supply area towns with additional water when they build a new lake. That this Chamber of Comthrough manufacturing, and the loss of this railroad would cause a large segment of our territory to become unwanted by a majority of our manufacturing prospects.

That the abandonment if allowed would eliminate railroad service from this city to all points north.

That we further state that public convenience and necessity demand the continuation of this line of track and operation of this railroad. And further state that the continuation of said railroad finality is not the fault of the protestants but is brought about by the deteriation of tracks and roadbed whose responsibility is said. that of said railroad.

Wherefore, protestant prays that the matter be set for public hearing at a convenient place for those located along the protested route of abandonment and that the application be denied unless applicant pro-vides clear, cogent and definite proof that the public convenience and necessity no longer require the operation of trains and tracks along the route proposed to be abandoned.

The question of how a railroad can continue service if it is financially impossible is a good question. We are in a position to answer this, However. we certainly feel we would like to be shown it is definitely impossible and that the reason for this financial crises is from lack of usage of the railroad rather and 4 losses. than poor management during

the past years.
Your Chamber of Commerce has protested this on behalf of our City and with users of this railroad and an association called the Southwest Users Association, it is our hope that we can obtain a hearing in the field by the Interstate Com-merce Commission, so that the full program can be determined and a practical solution be ob-tained. Telephone rate reductions which will save Texas telephone users \$5,600.000 a year were announced in Dallas today by W. L. Lindholm, vice pres., South-western Bell Tel Co. A long distance rate reduction will become effective on interstate calls on Feb. 1st and on calls within Texas on April 1st as follows:

Special long distance rates, now effective from 9:00 p. m. to 4:30 a. m. will be effective from 8:00 p. m. to 4:30 a. m. In addition since many of our customers find it convenient to make family calls on Sunday, Mr. Deuschle said, these lower rates will be effective all day Sunday, extending the time within which these calls can be made from 8 p. m. Saturday to 4:30 a. m. Monday. These rates apply on station to station calls, with a maximum of \$1.00 for a 3 minute call within the continental United States.

The present evening rate will be in effect from 6 p. m. to 8 m. each day and also will apply all day Saturday on station to station calls.

In addition, the charge for color telephones will be reduced from \$10.00 to \$7.50 effective Feb. 1st.

Reductions in interstate rates were worked out recently between Bell System and FCC.

Reduction in intra state rates. and lower charge for color telephones were made voluntarily, Mr. Deuschle said. The cut in intra state long distances rates will be the 7th by Southwestern Bell since 1940.

These economies to our customers have been made possible by the greater volume of long distance calls and by our continuing program of mechanization, Mr. Deuschle said. Customers also are contributing to the more economical operation

20 percent of long distance calls in Texas now are being dialed by customers. Fore calls are being made station to station, requiring less operator time per call. Furnishing of area code and number of the called telephone also makes it possible to complete calls more quickly and more economically The reduction in one time charge of color telephones has come about as a result of pop ularity of color sets since their introduction in Texas in 1956.

Since that time, colored telephones in Texas have climbed to 36 percent of total telephones. This reduction of \$5,600,000 annually is a good example of how savings resulting in improvement in technology and efficiency are passed along to Texas consumers, Mr. Deuschle



The gross inequity of the NLRB split decision was pointed up by one of the five board members. In his dissent from it, he held that in order for collective bargaining to be free both parties must, with a minimum of exceptions, be able to resort to such tactics or take positions that they believe necessary and desirable.

It is ironic that the deprivation of a management right has come at a time when civil liberties are being legally expanded. The Supreme Court, therefore, should lose no time in rectifying NLRB's grotesque mistake.



ience and small firms throughout the country should both be interested in an unusual program sponsored by the Small Business Administration. The gist of the sceme is to line up retired executives with special know-how who would be interested in helping out small manufacturing or service establish-

ments that cannot yet afford top echelon personnel.

How The Plan Works Out
Economic observers have long working-at least part time a nationwide scale.


Last October the system was set up in 69 cities across the country. This involved, of course, the process of finding those equipped and willing to help as well as those little firms that needed assistance, —and bringing the two together. Retired managerial men were recruited for the most part hru newspaper ads and via business associations. A gratifying-even surprising-number of leisured men expressed interest in lending a helping hand. Some 2,000 have already offered their services, and the search for more will certainly be step ped up as the usefulness of the plan is proven.

Plants That Are Eligible

To be eligible for participa-tion in the scheme, companies must have no more than 25 employees. Most of the concerns taking part became aware of the plan when they applied for loans either from the small Business Administration itself or under the government's antipoverty program. Owners were informed of the possibilities of help from former managerial officials, and many expressed immediate interest in the venture. It is stressed, also, that all small companies (with 25 or fewer workers) may take advantage of this opportunity, whether or not they have ap-

two parties may develop their own agreement to pay for forth coming services rendered. The contributing executives must pledge not to give simultaneous assistance to rival clients. Nor are they permitted to receive commissions from companies a scout and have a picture of recommended to their clients yourself in uniform, will you as sources of services or sup-

So far, the greatest value of the SCORE setup seems to come from the contacts that past ex-ecutives often have at their fingertips. Big-scale suppliers as well as buyers are frequently cautious about dealing with "starter" or "little" manufacturers. It is here that an established offic.al who knows the ropes can open doors. Contact with one or two big customers often means the difference between success and failure for a small firm too busy with its own operations to expand its horizons and give adequate at-tention to the problems of distribution.
