Mrs. Bob Stewart, program chairman, presented the speaker who spoke on Heating and Air Conditioning, whether for the home, apartment, business or church. The heat needs to circulate properly, and temperature as a rule, is comfortable at 72 to 76 degrees.

Miss Wirges stressed the location of thermostats and said to place same in the room you live in the most and about four feet up on the wall, be sure the thermostat is away from outside air, never in a room with a fireplace, or over a television, stove or range. She pointed out the use of an exhaust fan in the bathroom and kitchen; also the use of awnings, vented attic, pitched roof, and told the effect the landscape can have as far as air conditioning is concerned.

Fifty Junior students at Burkburnett High School plan to take the 1965 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT). M. D. Groenewold, Counselor, announced today.

The test will be administered at the school at 8 a. m. in the Cafeteria Tuesday, March 9th. All students who wish to be considered for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1966 should take the test at that time.

The NMSQT is a three-hour examination of educational development. 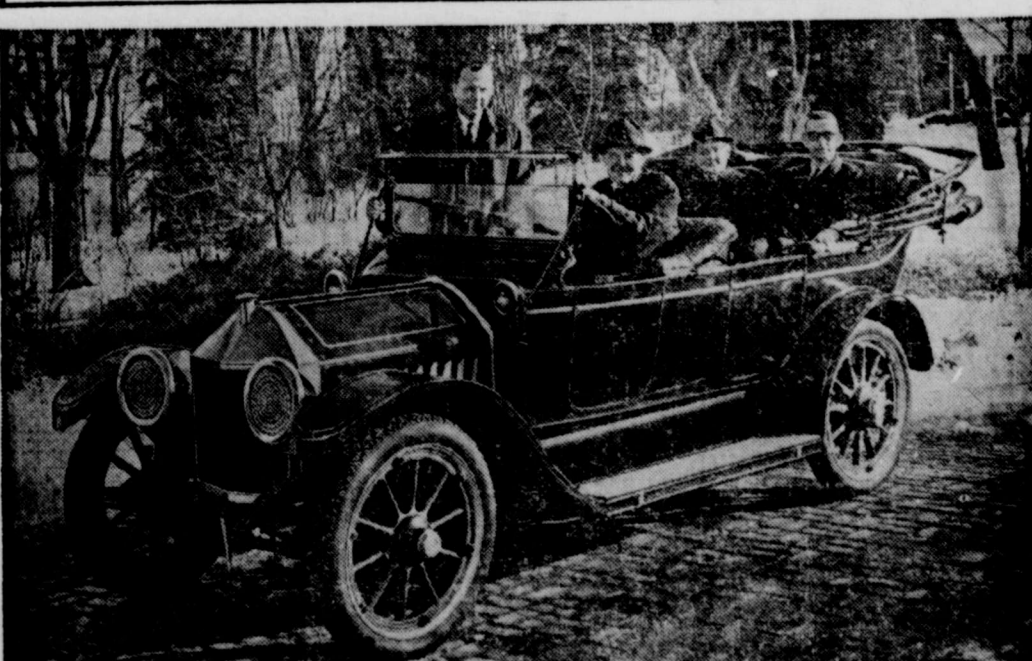
A member of the 3750th Maintenance and Supply Group, Airman Oliphant came to Sheppard in May 1962 from King Salmon Air Force Station in Alaska.

### Navy Offers Two-Year Tour Reserve Training

## HOW TO GET FAT

"Growing numbers of rural electric cooperatives are getting fat."

Nation's Business tells how: 'In May 1962, the government made a \$6.6 million loan at two per cent interest for generating facilities to a cooperative whose general funds — cash plus investments — amounted to \$14.9 million.

"The cooperative's financial forecast was predicting a cash margin — net cash from operations less debt repayments to the government — of \$55 million over the period of 1961-1970.

"But here's the rub: The same forecast provided for placing \$43.8 million of the \$55 million cash margin in investments yielding 3.5 per cent; the plant expansion would be financed by \$45 million in two per cent government loans."

Who wouldn't get fat if he could borrow money from the government at a mere two per cent — which is around half the rate the Treasury must pay on its own long-term borrowings — and then invest his cash on hand at 3.5 per cent? This, truly, is a way of getting something for nothing so far as the co-ops are concerned. But it's mighty costly to the taxpayers.

It is reported that the Internal Revenue Service is looking into the affairs of one co-op to determine if it really is a cooperative or, instead, a business earning a handsome profit from government loans. High time!

## License Plates On Sale Monday For New Year

Monday was the day to start lining up for license plates again. Sales started Monday and end April 1st throughout the state.

Texas Highway Department Officials say that a good many people rush to buy plates the first week of sales, but the biggest flurry falls during the last week of March.

Current registration receipt, certificate of title—and money enough to pay for the plates—are needed to complete the transaction.

Lost receipts or ownership papers may be replaced easily enough by sending 25 cents for each duplicate desired to the Department's Motor Vehicle Division in Austin (40th and Jackson streets). But remember—to issue a duplicate the Department needs your license number, make and vehicle identification number. Receipts may also be obtained from the county in which the vehicle was registered, by the way.

Texas license plates have a "new look" this year. Each passenger plate has a three letter prefix followed by two or three numerals. Commercial and miscellaneous vehicles retain their own special registration system.) The new passenger registration system enables the Department to cope with the increasing registration.

Since World War II, approximately a quarter million more vehicles have been registered yearly in the state. This trend should continue, but the new system should provide sufficient numbers for at least the next ten years.

Texas tags this year have black letters on white. Convinced that black and white provide the most readable combination under both day and night conditions, the Highway Department alternates the color pattern. In add years, plates have

black lettering on white; in even years, it's just the opposite. It's also more economical to stay with two basic colors, the Department has decided.

Speaking of economy, plates provide a revenue source for building and maintaining roads. They also have another primary purpose: identification. Because of the latter, the Department strives for simplicity in plate design. Therefore, plates in Texas contain only the necessary information: license number, state and year.

The simplicity in design is of great value to the Texas police. The Texas Police Association has announced that an automobile is involved in 90 per cent of major crimes committed in the state. It is more important that plates be readable from a reasonable distance.

When you buy yours, incidentally, you might want to order your 1965 Official State Highway Map of Texas. The map is now available for free worldwide distribution. To make it easy on the public, the Highway Department has given each Texas county tax assessor-collector's office a supply of free postcards for convenient ordering.

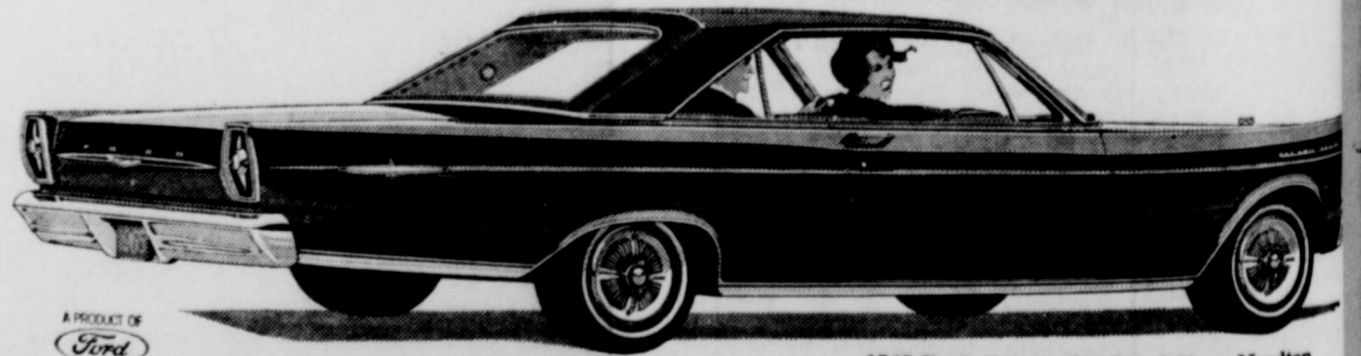

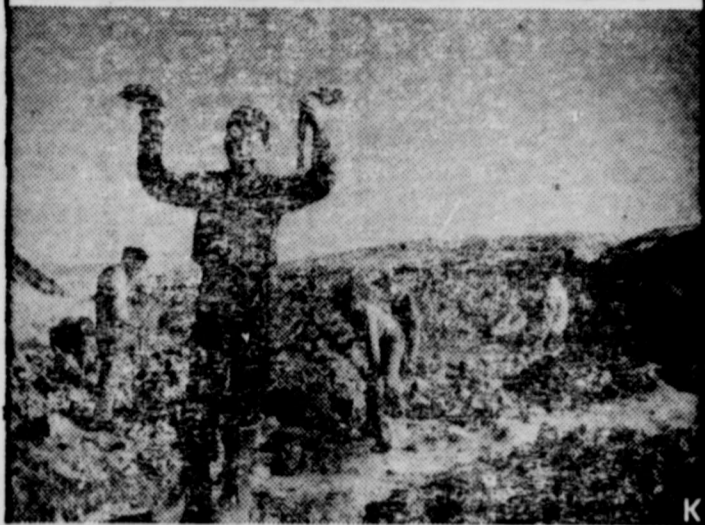

**Far Out for Fish**

It sounds like a fish story, but it's true. In one of the driest, hottest of deserts—near the town of Calama, Chile—40 men once resigned to life as slum dwellers have set up a fishing cooperative with the aim of producing and marketing 100,000 rainbow trout a year.

They have built and stocked 100 ponds each accommodating 1,000 trout. Cement for building the simple spring-fed ponds, and a technical advisor for the project, were provided through funds furnished in part by Protestant churches in the United States.

The effort of these men to become self-sufficient through their fish business will also benefit Calama's many underprivileged. It will provide a cheap source of protein to fill the dietary void created by the absence of the meat they cannot afford. The co-op will sell trout for about one-fourth the price of meat.

This project is one of many efforts aided by One Great Hour of Sharing, an annual appeal which will be observed in numer-

ous Protestant churches throughout America on March 28.

A many faceted program to help the Calama community combat hunger, malnutrition, unemployment, illiteracy and other afflictions is supported by thirty denominations through Church World Service, their cooperative agency for overseas relief and rehabilitation.

Included in the program, to which churches in other countries contribute through the World Council of Churches, are literacy classes, craft training, a day nursery, a primary school and health clinics.

Some of Calama's deprived are victims of a nitrate industry slump which made ghost towns of their once-prosperous communities. Others came from great distances seeking employment they did not find in a large copper mine nearby.

An air of hope has begun to pervade their despair as projects such as the fish co-op are taking form, and they are able to help themselves achieve the dignity that comes with self-sufficiency.

**Average Highway Speed Reduced**

Texas drivers "flirted" with excessive speeds after the speed limit was raised to 70 mph late in 1963.

But the affair went pffft, according to a speed survey made by the Texas Highway Department a year later, and Texans for the most part are now observing the speed limit.

Take passenger cars, for instance. The Highway Department radar checked speeds of at least 25,000 of them in 30 locations scattered over the state.

In 1963, a fraction more than 11 percent of the motorists were clocked at more than 70 mph. A year later—under the same highway conditions and

in the same places—the figure had dropped to just 5.1 percent. And it was the same pattern across the board, with pickups, trucks, and buses logging dramatically reduced speeds.

Why were speeds up so high after the legislature hiked speed limits by 10 mph?

"We're engineers, not psychiatrists," said one Highway Department official, "but it seems that it was just a flirta-

tion. Motorists had a sudden new freedom to go ten miles an hour faster. In exercising that freedom, some of them said 'what the heck' and went for broke."

How come they slowed down a year later, then?

"The novelty wore off. At least that's all we can figure. It's admittedly just a guess."

The Highway Department's annual speed survey is a research study project used by highway engineers to help determine future highway design characteristics and traffic needs. The Highway Department designs, builds and maintains Texas highways. It determines safe speeds, zones and signs highways, but does not have police or enforcing authority.

Last October and November the Highway Department surveyed vehicle driving practices of more than 25,000 motorists. Concealed radar units were set up at 30 locations on key highways during an eight hour period.

Average speed of all vehicles surveyed last autumn was 56.6 miles an hour. A year before, just after the new speed average was 59.3. And just before the new speeds were posted, the average had been 56.5 mph.

In all vehicle categories, speeds seem to be leveling off from highs recorded during the period of "flirtation."

Of all vehicles surveyed only 3.6 percent were exceeding the 70 mph speed limit last fall. A year earlier, 8 percent of vehicles of all kinds were breaking 70.

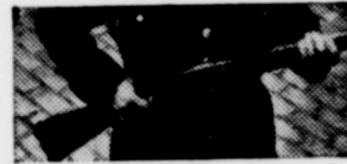

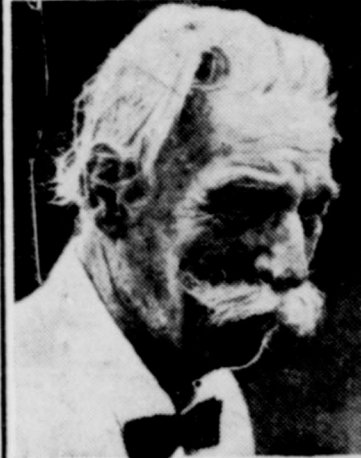

## HOW TO GET MORE FUN OUT OF HOME MOVIES

by Skip Miller

LET YOUR CAMERA'S EYE WORK FOR YOU

There in the living room sat Grandpa, rocking back and forth, as four-year-old Steve burst into the room. "Hi, Gramp," said Steve with his usual burst of enthusiasm. Grandpa stopped rocking, glanced over the top of his spectacles, then made an astute observation. "My, what a big boy you're getting to be, Stevie." Half-hidden behind the drapes during this episode was Mom, clicking away with her aim-and-shoot movie camera.

Applying the same test to a movie camera lens, we discover that the same situation is basically true. . . . Now that we know this, let's apply this knowledge to our picture-taking. If we want a non-distorted relationship between nose, eyes and ears of a person being photographed, we know that we must use a longer focal length lens. That's where the semi-telephoto setting of a zoom lens becomes especially valuable. It permits us to stand far enough away from the subject to avoid distortion, thus enabling us to get a pleasing "semi-close-up" image. . . . If, on the other hand, we want to emphasize the importance of a nose-to-camera-object (remember the hole in Adlai Stevenson's shoe sole, photographed at the time he was running for the presidency?), the wide-angle lens setting can do the job far more effectively. . . . Do we, therefore, need wide-angle or telephoto lenses, or the equivalent in a zoom lens, on our cameras? Yes, for certain situations. In a small rectangular living room, for instance, with a sofa positioned against the long dimension of the room, a normal lens viewpoint would not permit us to photograph all of the persons seated on the sofa. A wide-angle lens would, what's more, if we did not tilt the lens either upward or downward, we would get a reasonably acceptable picture of the entire group. Tilting the lens (camera, too, of course) would magnify the abnormal effect and capture unwanted distortions of the objects or persons being photographed. . . . The other extreme (telephoto) would have such a narrow field of vision that we would be able to include only one or two persons of the group seated on the sofa. . . . Obviously, the same is true even if we have a zoom lens, which is basically a normal, wide-angle and telephoto lens all rolled into one. That's why we must learn to use a zoom lens wisely. . . . To tell the truth, most of these mysteries about camera optics are not mysteries at all. A little common sense enables us to understand them, and another dash of common sense enables us to do something about them.

The local county farm organization will have a special enrollment drive underway as part of a statewide effort to push Farm Bureau membership in Texas to 100,000 by Oct. 31. An official proclamation signed by County Judge Calvin Ashley called for citizens "to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Wichita County Farm Bureau." . . . Earlier Governor John Connally proclaimed the same period as "Farm Bureau Membership week in Texas." The statewide drive is to be launched with big area rallies Feb. 2nd in San Antonio and Feb. 4th in Lubbock and Dallas. . . . J. W. Tole of Wichita Falls is chairman of the local county Farm Bureau Membership Committee. Other members of his committee working on the drive are: Jim Montgomery, Brack H. Preston, Jr., and Lloyd Bell.

The committee chairman every farmer and rancher in the county is requested to be a member and a leader in Farm Bureau. "Each of us in agriculture has too great an outlay in business not to do all that we can to protect our investment of capital, time and labor declared. . . . 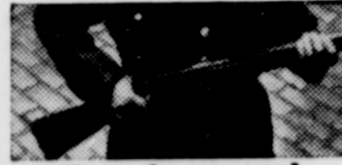
