

## HOW TO GET FAT

"Growing numbers of rural electric cooperatives are getting fat.'

Nation's Business tells how: 'In May 1962, the government made a \$6.6 million loan at two per cent interest for generating facilities to a cooperative whose general funds - cash plus investments - amounted to

"The cooperative's financial forecast was predicting a cash margain - net cash from operations less debt repayments to the government - of \$55 million over the period of 1961-1970.

'But here's the rub: The same forecast provided for placing \$43.8 million of the \$55 million cash margin in balances will be found." investments yielding 3.5 per cent; the plant expansion would be financed by \$45 million in two per cent government loans."

Who wouldn't get fat if he could borrow money from the government at a mere two per cent - which is around half the rate the Treasury must pay on its own long-term borrowings - and then invest his cash on hand at 3.5 per cent? This, truly, is a way of getting something for nothing so far as the co-ops are concerned. But it's mighty costly to the taxpayers.

It is reported that the Internal Revenue Service is looking ino the affairs of one co-op to determine if it really is a cooperative or, instead, a business earning a handsome profit from government loans. High time!

## License Plates **On Sale Monday** For New Year

Monday was the day to start lining up for license plates again. Sales started Monday and end April 1st throughout the

Texas Highway Department Officials say that a good many people rush to buy plates the first week of sales, but the biggest flurry falls during the last week of March.

Current registration receipt, certificate of title-and money enough to pay for the platesare needed to complete the transaction.

Lost receipts or ownership papers may be replaced easily enough by sending 25 cents for each duplicate desired to the Department's Motor Vehicle Division in Austin (40th and Jackson streets). But rememberto issue a duplicate the Department needs your license number, make and vehicle identification number. Receipts may also be obtained from the county in which the vehicle was registered, by the way.

Texas license plates have a 'new look" this year. Each passenger plate has a three letterer prefix followed by two or three numerals. Commercial and miscellaneous vehicles retain their own special registration system.) The new passenger registration system enables the Department to cope with

Texas tags this year have black lett! s on white. Convinced that black and white provide the most readable combination under both day and night conditions, the Highway Department alternates the color pattern. In add years, plates have

Speaking of economy, plates provide a revenue source for building and maintaining roads. They also have another primary purpose: identification. Because of the latter, the Department strives for simplicity in plate design. Therefore, plates in Texas contain only the necessary information: license number, state and year.

The simplicity in design is of great value to the Texas police. The Texas Police Association has announced that an automobile is involved in 90 per cent of major crimes committed in the state. It is more important that plates be readable from a reasonable distance.

## Far Out for Fish



FUTURE CATCH—Trout such as those held aloft by Chilean boy will soon be produced in ponds constructed by former slum dwellers who have formed a fishing cooperative in a desert town with the help of U.S. churches.

It sounds like a fish story, but he's true. In one of the driest, hottest of deserts—near the town of Calama, Chile—40 men once resigned to life as slum dwellers have set up a fishing cooperative with the aim of producing and marketing 100,000 rainbow trout a year.

They have built and stocked

They have built and stocked 100 ponds each accommodating 1,000 trout. Cement for building the simple spring-fed ponds, and technical advisor for the project, were provided through funds furnished in part by Protestant churches in the United States.

The effort of these men to become self-sufficient through their fish business will also benefit Calama's many underprivileged. It will provide a cheap source of protein to fill the dietary void created by the obsence of the meat they cannot afford. The co-op will sell trout for about oneo-op will sell trout for about one-

fourth the price of meat.

This project is one of many efforts aided by One Great Hour Sharing, an annual appeal

ous Protestant churches throughout America on March 28.

A many faceted program to help the Calama community com-bat hunger, malnutrition, unemployment, illiteracy and other af-flictions is supported by thirty denominations through Church

World Service, their cooperative agency for overseas relief and rehabilitation. Included in the program, to which churches in other countries contribute through the World Council of Churches, are literacy classes, craft training, a day nurs-ery, a primary school and health clinics.

Some of Calama's deprived are victims of a nitrate industry slump which made ghost towns of their once-prosperous commu-nities. Others came from great distances seeking employment they did not find in a large cop-

per mine nearby.

An air of hope has begun to pervade their despair as projects such as the fish co-op are taking form, and they are able to help themselves achieve the dignity that comes with self-suffici

## Average Highway Speed Reduced

Texas drivers "flirted" with excessive speeds after the speed limit was raised to 70 mph late in 1963.

But the affair went pffft, according to a speed survey made by the Texas Highway Depart ment a year later, and Texans for the most part are now observing the speed limit.

Take passenger cars, for in-stance. The Highway Department radar checked speeds of at least 25,000 of them in 30 loca-

in 1963, a fraction more than 11 percent of the motorists were clocked at more than 70 mph. A year later-under the same highway conditions. and

in the same places—the figure had dropped to just 5.1 percent. And it was the same pattern across the board, with pickups, trucks, and buses logging dramatically reduced speeds.

Why were speeds up so high after the legislature hiked speed limits by 10 mph?

"We're engineers, not psy-chiatrists," said one Highway Department official, "but it seems that it was just a flirta-

The Highway Department designs, builds and maintains Texas highways. It determines safe speeds, zones and signs highways, but does not have police or enforcing

authority. Last October and November the Highway Department surveyed vehicle driving practices of more tran 25,000 motorists. Concealed radar units were set up at 30 locations on key highways during an eight hour per-

Average speed of all vehicles surveyed last autumn was 56.6 miles an hour. A year before, just after the new speed average was 59.3. And just before the new speeds were posted, the average had been 56.5 mph.

In all vehicle categories, speeds seem to be leveling off from highs recorded during the period of "flirtation."

Of all vehicles surveyed only 3.6 percent were exceeding the 70 mph speed limit last fall. A year earlier, 8 percent of vehicles of all kinds were breaking 70.
