Accepts Rate Reduction Proposal On City Residences From Texas Electric Ser. Co.

February 15, 1965 Mayor and Commissioners Burkburnett, Texas

For your approval which includes both a reduction in electric rates in the City of Burkburnett and an increase in alley rental payments Electric Service Company of Burkburnett, principal changes being a reduction in rates for residential customers, additional features to be included in the winter months and the of a new rate for all homes. All residential using more than 65 hours in a month will be reduced in excess in the annual report on residential rates.

The adjustment made by the company in 1963 was proportionally larger to residential user. Under the new rate, residential users, such as those with air conditioning, will pay more.

Proposed changes in the rate will reduce the minimum rate and bills for some schools. The proposed changes in all our bills changing the date in clause from January 1, 1965, to January 1, 1966, and the 20 cents in the rate to 21 cents.

Electric service bills will be increased by the revised rates. The proposed rate reduction continuation of the long term policy of Texas Electric Service Company to reduce electric rates to time as conditions

We propose to reduce this 2 percent to 3 percent which will result in an annual payment for 1965 of approximately \$4,740, bringing the 1965 street and alley rental to approximately \$20.

News Of Your Chamber of Commerce

Most every town in the United States is seeking industries to locate in their community. Only 1500 were successful in accomplishing this in 1964. For every one new industry there were 1000 industrial teams unsuccessful in bringing it to their community.

The Burkburnett Chamber of Commerce has organized an industrial team to represent Burkburnett in the industrial field. The main objectives of this team is to:

1. Determine what kind of industry the community can support.

2. Prepare an industrial survey which will provide prospective business and industrial firms with complete information about the community.

3. Contact the prospective industries.

Even though an industrial team is looked to by most of the citizens of a town to bring new industry in, very seldom is it done by the team alone. When an industry moves in, most every one in the community can say they had something to do with it.

There are no set rules that industry follows when looking for new locations. One of the things that is very important to all types of industry, however, is community attitude. Even when all the economic factors are present in a town, a potential industrial prospect has been known to reject it because of negative community attitudes. Just as you judge a person's attitude and thinking by the appearance of their home and personal habits, industry judges a town's attitude by its attractiveness and facilities.

After an affirmative posture has been established in a community, there are several other qualities industry looks for. In the living area they evaluate the schools, houses for sale or rent, taxes, churches, recreation and cultural activities, local government, hospitals, doctors, dentists, etc. When considering the building site for their plant, they look for total cost of land and construction, initial and future neighbors, transportation, availability of services, taxes utility rates, publicity (prestige value), labor supply and future expansion possibilities. In reality, industry looks for the same qualities in a community before investing in it, as an individual would.

Every person in town should consider himself a member of the industrial team. Without the co-operation of all citizens the ultimate goal of securing new industry cannot be reached. Burkburnett is a progressive town, it is evidenced by the many community projects that have been accomplished in the past and the projects now in progress.

It is impossible for nine men to accomplish as much as 5509 civic minded people. However, with the industrial team and the entire community working together much can be accomplished. If you are proud of your home town, and think it offers benefits to others to live, work and invest here, then tell them. They may never know it unless you tell them personally.

But, the local club does not get one cent of that money. The club is promised a certain number of cookbooks, in proportion to the amount of money raised. In order to realize anything out of the venture the club must sell the cookbooks. Very clever and very profitable for the out of town smoothies.

Here is an example: The out of towners raise \$500.00. They send 100 books to a local club. IF the books can be sold for \$1.00 each, that is six hundred dollars spent by Burkburnett people to help a local club \$100 worth. Any business man had rather contribute \$5.00 to a local club than 5c to any out of town group.

To all clubs: If your cause is worthy, you can get local support. But please don't take local business men for suckers.

A GLORIOUS LEGACY

The fact that no man in all history accomplished more for his country than did George Washington for America hardly needs reiteration.

Yet, the importance of one of the many beneficial legacies he bestowed on this country cannot be overemphasized. That is the extremely high moral standards he set for the Presidency while serving as our first Chief Executive.

An infrequently told episode of his first term in office speaks volumes for the sacredness he attached to the trust placed in him by the people. In an effort to aid the economy of the struggling nation by improving transportation facilities and thus help to expand trade among the states, Washington put his surveying knowledge to good stead by supervising the survey of rivers in the South.

One of the projects he directed resulted in the James River of Virginia being declared navigable by Congress and opened to industrial shipping. A commercial company that benefited from this sought to show its gratitude

Strengthening the Backbone

The 41,000-mile National System of Interstate and Defense Highway will be, when completed, the new "backbone" of our national highway network. Although it will comprise only about 1.2 percent of our total highway mileage, it will carry at least 20 percent of the total traffic.

In designing and constructing such a system, it makes sense to look into the future and make allowance for traffic growth. From the beginning of the Interstate construction program, highway engineers have been particularly careful to give thought to tomorrow's traffic in the design of each segment of the system. These route locations will probably be main highway locations for many decades to come.

The design concepts worked out in the 1950's have proved to be sound. Now about half completed, the Interstate System is proving to be even more essential than was originally anticipated. The benefits to highway users and the economic and social benefits which affect users and non-users alike are exceeding the early estimates. For example, we now see that the Interstate System will save 8,000 lives per year—double the original estimate.

Before 1955, there were relatively few miles of highway in existence built to Interstate type standards. As this kind of

highway has come into general use, engineers have been able to learn a great deal about the design of controlled-access highways built to accommodate high traffic volumes. The highways being designed now are going to be even better than the highways that were designed early in the program.

These refinements, which will provide longer highway life and increased service and safety, cost a little more. The new revised estimate of the total cost of the Interstate System is \$46.8 billion—about 14 percent higher than the earlier \$41 billion estimate. But unit construction costs rose only 4.7 percent. More than \$3.6 billion of the increase is accounted for by improvements brought about by knowledge of better highway design, the provision of additional interchanges and lanes for convenience and safety, changes in traffic data and a change in the law which directed engineers to design for the traffic anticipated 20 years in the future.

It would be false economy to try to save money by cutting back on the standards. This would merely force us to go back and rebuild sections of the Interstate System within a few years time—at substantially higher cost.

Returning \$4 in benefits for every \$1 invested, the Interstate System remains one of the great public works bargains of all time.

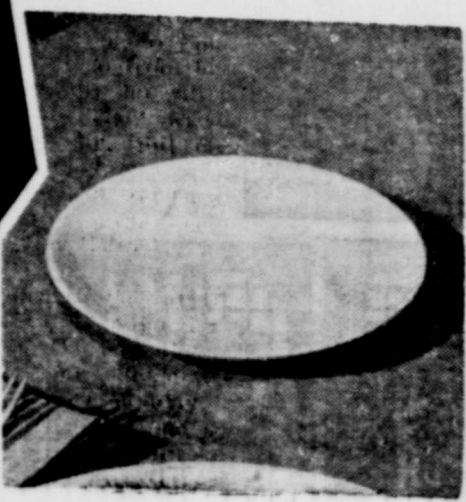

EDUCATED FISH?

Do game fish really "wise up" to fishermen?

You can get a lot of opinions — pro and con — on a fish's ability to outfox the angler. And there's considerable evidence to support both views.

Generally, however, it's conceded by experts that a bass, despite its pea-sized brain, has the discrimination to deliberately shun a fisherman's artificial offerings. And, according to the folks at Mercury outboards, proof of "educated" fish is readily available.

Take waters subject to heavy fishing pressures, for instance. These contain the smartest fish. Though worked hard, results are poor, and the common complaint is: "fished out." Yet draining invariably reveals a healthy population with a surprising number of lunkers.

The fish are there; they simply smarten up to ordinary lures and methods.

Contrast this situation with wilderness waters which harbor about the same number of fish per acre. These fish respond as if lures were going out of style. They're not any hungrier than their urban cousins — just more naive.

Even hatchery trout — those surviving the first few hours after being dumped from a truck — learn to avoid phony foods with hidden bars. In "put and take" waters it is not uncommon for large fish, six to eight years old, to show up in early season catches.

Incidentally, this indicates fish may suffer from lapse of memory over the winter months. Forgetting the previous year's lessons, they are easier to catch when spring fishing resumes.

You can bet your bait bucket that by the time a trout or bass graduates into the grandpa category he's learned plenty about fishing and fishermen. And you'll have to do your homework well to catch up.

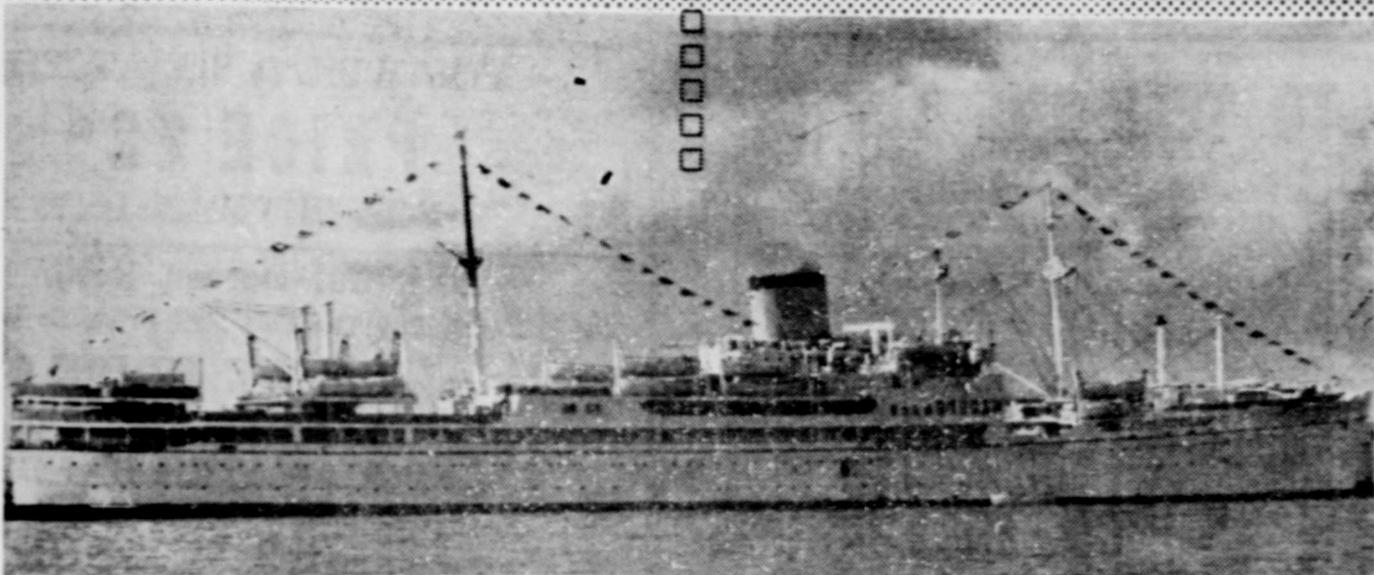
CRUISE IN THE OFF-SEASON

Millions of Americans are becoming home-style handymen for two reasons. Labor costs for minor home repairs are rapidly increasing, and many find relaxation in tinkering around the house.

Sentry Insurance recommends several safety measures to do-it-yourselfers, which may protect an eye, a leg or a life.

- Use the proper tool, and make sure it's in good condition. A screwdriver used as a chisel is as dangerous as a hammer used in place of a screwdriver. Each tool has its own function and works well when used properly. Given the wrong use, the tool will work improperly and cause damage.

- Wear the proper clothes: Flapping sleeves or a necktie, which may be caught in an electric saw or drill, have no place in the work area. Wear rubber-soled shoes when working with electricity, and safety shoes when carrying heavy items that may drop on your feet. Goggles should be worn where sparks or particles may fly. Wear gloves when working with rough edges.

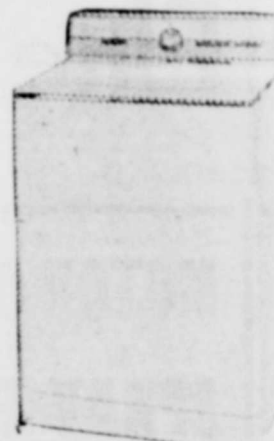

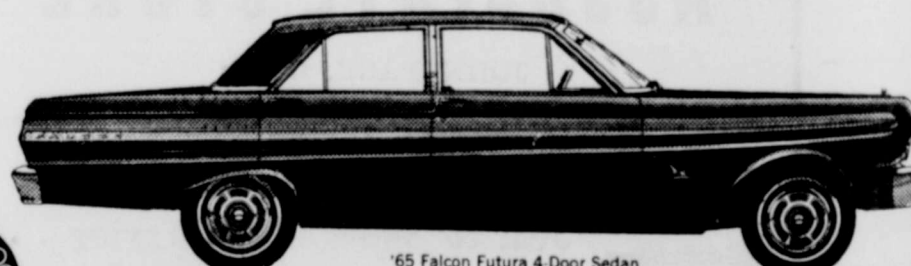

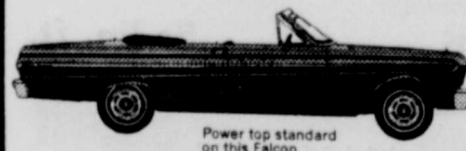

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE PLATTING AND REPLATTING OF LAND INTO SUBDIVISIONS SITUATED WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT AND WITHIN ONE MILE THEREOF; SETTING FORTH THE TITLE AND PURPOSE OF THE ORDINANCE; DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS; PROHIBITING NON-CONFORMING SUBDIVISIONS; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; ESTABLISHING PROCEDURE AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR PLATS; PROVIDING FOR FILING FEES; ESTABLISHING MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR PRELIMINARY PLATS AND FINAL PLATS; REQUIRING CERTAIN IMPROVEMENTS PRIOR TO ACCEPTANCE OF FINAL PLAT OR GUARANTEES IN LIEU THEREOF; ESTABLISHING GENERAL SUBDIVISION DESIGN PROVISIONS FOR STREETS, STREET SIGNS, SIDEWALKS, BLOCKS, LOTS, PARK AND SCHOOL SITES; PROVIDING FOR APPROVAL OF FINAL PLAT BY SECTIONS; REQUIRING A TWO YEAR MAINTENANCE BOND FOR FACILITIES; ESTABLISHING REQUIREMENTS FOR REPLATTING; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; ALLOWING CERTAIN VARIANCES; SETTING FORTH PROCEDURE FOR RECORDING FINAL PLAT; PROVIDING SEPARABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY OF A FINE NOT TO EXCEED \$200.00 FOR EACH VIOLATION; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY; EFFECTIVE DATE AND ADOPTION.

ELIMINATION OF THE POSSIBILITIES OF ALL CONDITIONS WHICH ARE CONDUCTIVE TO OR CREATE BLIGHTED OR SLUM AREAS WITHIN OR NEAR THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF SAID CITY, IN THAT PLATTING OF LAND INTO SUBDIVISIONS OR REPLATTING SUBDIVISIONS IN ACCORD WITH THE RULES AND REGULATIONS HEREIN MADE KNOWN WILL ABATE CONGESTION IN PROPOSED THOROUGHFARES WILL PREVENT OVERCROWDING OF LAND, WILL AID IN PREVENTING THE UNDUE CONCENTRATION OF POPULATION, WILL PROVIDE ADEQUATE LIGHT AND AIR SPACE FOR THE POPULATED AREAS AND WILL GUARANTEE THE SUFFICIENT PROVISIONS OF WATER, POWER, SEWAGE AND OTHER UTILITIES, PARKS, SCHOOL AREAS AND OTHER PUBLIC REQUIREMENTS.

ARTICLE X. EFFECTIVE DATE EMERGENCY CLAUSE. In as much as this is a subdivision ordinance adopted for the purpose of promoting public health, the board of commissioners find and so determines, that the passage of this ordinance is necessary for the immediate health and safety, and shall preservation of the public peace, become effective after the final passage and publication.

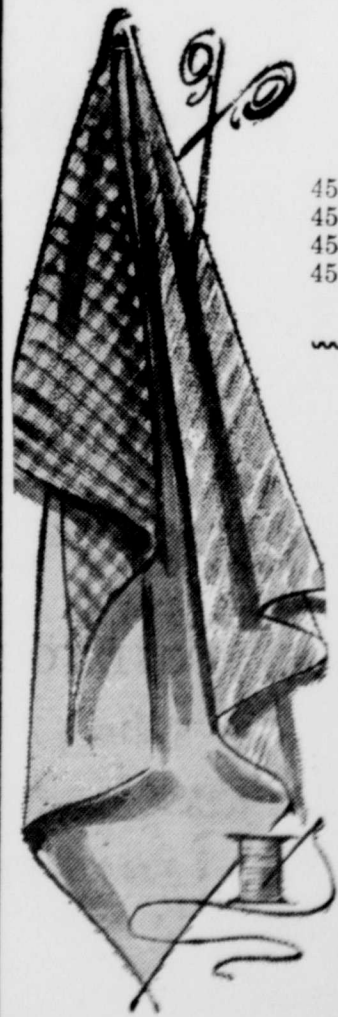

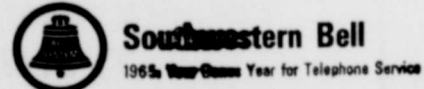

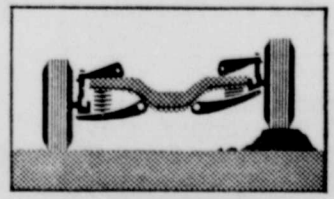

Inspection Team Checking SAFB For Readiness

A team from the Second Air Force Inspector General arrived at the 494th Bombardment Wing (Heavy) (SAC) at Shepard Technical Training Center Monday afternoon to begin an operational inspection readiness test of the Wing's capabilities to fulfill its wartime mission. Arriving at 2 p. m. the team immediately set into motion a recall of all members of the Wing to test the speed with which the SAC personnel could be on hand. During the inspection all elements of the wing will be tested and aircraft will be flown. To test all combat crew members in procedures necessary to launch maximum number of aircraft in the minimum amount of time the Strategic Air Command planners designated the minimum interval take off (MITO). No crew is considered combat ready until it has demonstrated this proficiency. This launch will be employed by the SAC wing sometime this week.

Thundering down the runway 60 seconds apart, bombers and tankers leave behind them clouds of churning exhaust smoke that reduce visibility sharply for the aircraft in the rear. It is a situation that demands maximum alertness on the part of the crew members. Despite the spectacular nature of the MITO exercise, flying safety precautions are never relaxed. A tight system of communication is in effect and all participating aircraft must be functioning perfectly. The inspection of the SAC wing will continue throughout the week and should be completed by this weekend.
