
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE PLATTING AND REPLATTING OF LAND INTO SUBDIVISIONS SITUATED WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT AND WITHIN ONE MILE THEREOF; SET-TING FORTH THE TITLE AND PURPOSE OF THE ORDIN-ANCE; DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS; PROHIBITING NON-CONTROL OF THE PROPERTY OF THE PRO CONFORMING SUBDIVISIONS; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCE-MENT; ESTABLISHING PRO-CEDURE AND SPECIFICA-TIONS FOR PLATS; PROVID-ING FOR FILING FEES; ESTABLISHING MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR PRELIMI-NARY PLATS AND FINAL PLATS; REQUIRING CERTAIN IMPROVEMENTS PRIOR TO ACCEPTANCE OF FINAL PLAT OR GUARANTEES IN LIEU THEREOF: ESTABLISHING GENERAL SUBDIVISION DE-SIGN PROVISIONS FOR STREETS, STREET SIGNS, SIDEWALKS, BLOCKS, LOTS, PARK, AND SCHOOL SITES; PROVIDING FOR APPROVAL OF FINAL PLAT BY SEC-TIONS; REQUIRING A TWO YEAR MAINTENANCE BOND FOR FACILITIES; ESTABLISH-REQUIREMENTS FOR REPLATTING; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICT-ING ORDINANCES; ALLOW-CERTAIN VARIANCES; SETTING FORTH PROCEDURE FOR RECORDING FINAL PLAT: PROVIDING SEPARA-BILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY OF A FINE NOT TO EXCEED \$200.00 FOR EACH VIOLATION; DECLAR-ING AN EMERGENCY; EFFEC-TIVE DATE AND ADOPTION.

## SEED NECKLACES



Chris is making a seed necklace like the one around her neck. She is using sunflower and red kidney bean seeds which make a red and black and white necklace for her white blouse.

There are many different kinds of seeds that can be strung into necklaces. Watermelon seeds make a pretty black necklace and pumpkin seeds a cream colored one.

But Chris is using sunflower seeds and kidney beans because it is winter time and both of these are easy to buy from a store. The only trouble is that they are so dry they have to be soaked in water to soften them in order to stick a needle through them. This soaking isn't needed when seeds are freshly gathered from the garden. Chris soaks a few at a time of each kind of seed in a saucer and meanwhile strings those already soaked. She is using ordinary sewing thread, such as you'll find in Mother's work basket, and has doubled it for greater strength after threading it through her needle.

First Chris threads on 20 sunflower seeds, sticking the needle through the middle of a flat side of each seed. Then she threads on one red kidney bean seed, but with this seed she pushes the needle through from one end to the other.

You'll see a completed necklace using the same two kinds of seeds around Chris' neek. The malecials for these necklaces are easy to find — just needle (not too fine, but very sharp), thread, scissors and seeds. If YOU wear one of these necklaces to school, every one of your friends will want one too.

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
