

LET THE CONSUMER DECIDE

With the re-introduction of the Hart Bill for federal regulation of the packaging and labeling of food products the American consumer's right of free choice is once again | NEW STARTING TIME

The restrictive nature of the legislation is readily seen in its provisions. It would:

Establish the weights and quantities for the sale

Eliminate "cents-off" and other bargain promo-

tions.

Limit merchandising practices and what can be shown on the package cover.

Establish standard "serving" sizes, Actually shoppers already have all the federal pro-

tection they need against deceptive practices. The Federal Trade Commission and other agencies and bureaus are extremely diligent in that area and can be expected to continue their operations without any supplementary legislation.

The average housewife is a shrewd buyer and needs no help from a Washington bureaucrat to make her marketing selections. Besides dictating her choice of product sizes and weights, the Hart Bill could very well drive prices upward, since any standardization that required re-packaging would be certain to raise manufacturing production costs.

Thus putting an "unseen federal regulator" in each super-market will only serve to frustrate the shopper and put an added drain on the food budget.

The one-hundred-cent dollar of fiscal 1939 - when the gross public debt and guaranteed obligations of the U. S. A. stood at \$49.89 billion — is now worth 44.8 cents, according to Virginia's Rep. Richard H. Poff while the nation's obligations now total more than \$312.5 billion.

In a revealing tabulation of the nation's fiscal posture from 1930 through 1946, the Old Dominion Congressman presents, year by year, a statistical sermon on the wages of Federal extravagance."


