We must improve our methods... set impossible goals before neighbors start fighting over food... brothers over land.

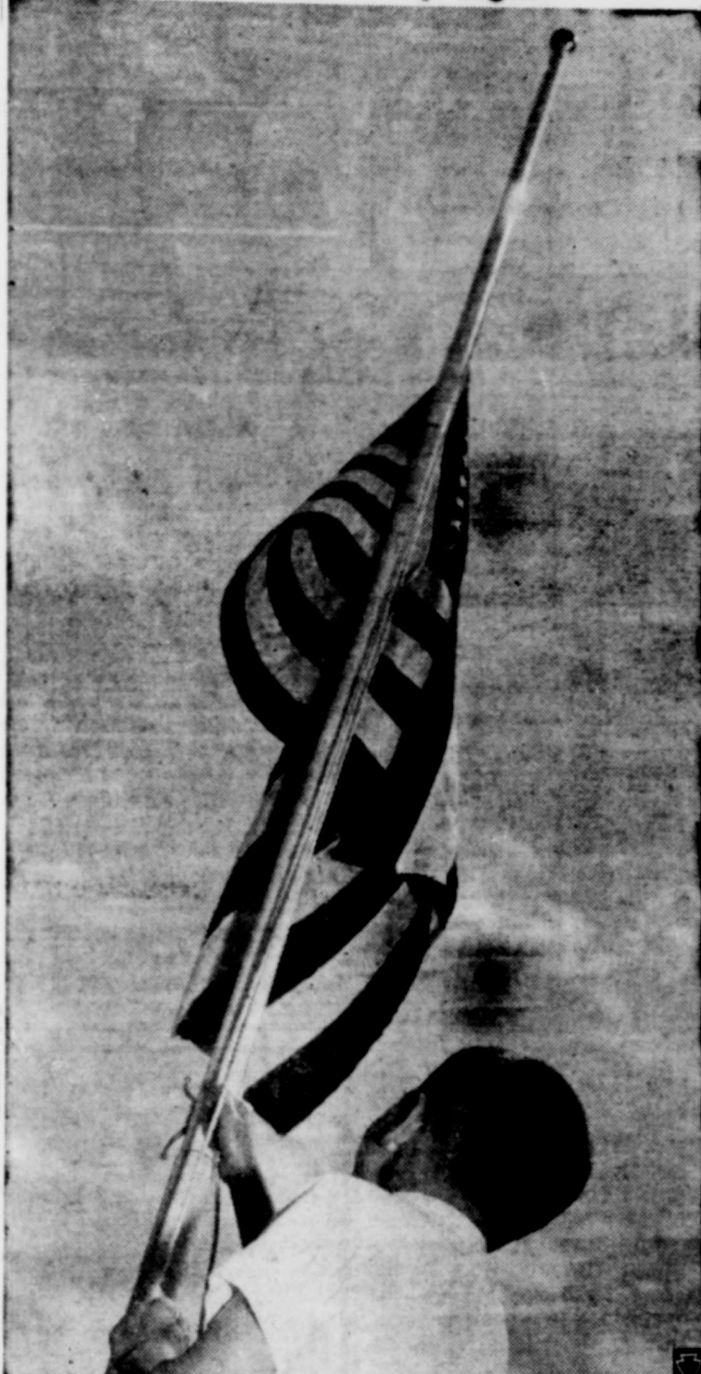
This is a great nation. It has been since 1776.

### Librarian Maps Plan For Burk

The next step to establish a library in Burkburnett was outlined Thursday night by Miss Elizabeth Karle, field consultant of the Texas State Library, in the Town Hall. A building has been donated to the city for the library.

Clubs supporting the Community Improvement Program are now seeking ways to finance the library and to organize it within the requirements of eligibility for federal and state grants.

Miss Karle said good library planning includes an adequate budget, a strong board of library trustees, good professionally trained librarians, carefully selected assortment of books, central location and use of city and county appropriations to support the library.

She advocated not to rely too strongly on donations; however she emphasized that public support is essential. Miss Karle says a good library should have two books per capita. A community the size of Burkburnett, she said, should have 7,000 square feet to put approximately 20,000 books.

During a question and answer period, Miss Karle recommended cooperation within the county among existing libraries. One professional librarian could be assigned to go to branch libraries in communities.

Miss Karle also outlined sources of federal and state funds to supplement that raised by citizens of Burkburnett.

## The People Vote For Eldercare

There is impressive evidence that the medicare bill—which is now in the Senate after having been hastily pushed through the house—is not wanted by a majority of the American people.

Take, for instance, a nation survey conducted by the Opinion Research Corporation of Princeton, New Jersey, which is one of the highly regarded organizations of its kind. It was so worded as to give respondents a choice of features they wanted in a health program for the elderly. In each case, the people overwhelmingly chose the features provided in the American Medical Association's Eldercare proposal, as against those of medicare. Under Eldercare, the elderly population would be entitled to buy private medical insurance, providing wide benefits and public funds would be used to pay all or part of the cost for those whose incomes are below certain levels to be stipulated by the state. In other words those who could afford to pay nothing would be given this protection for nothing.

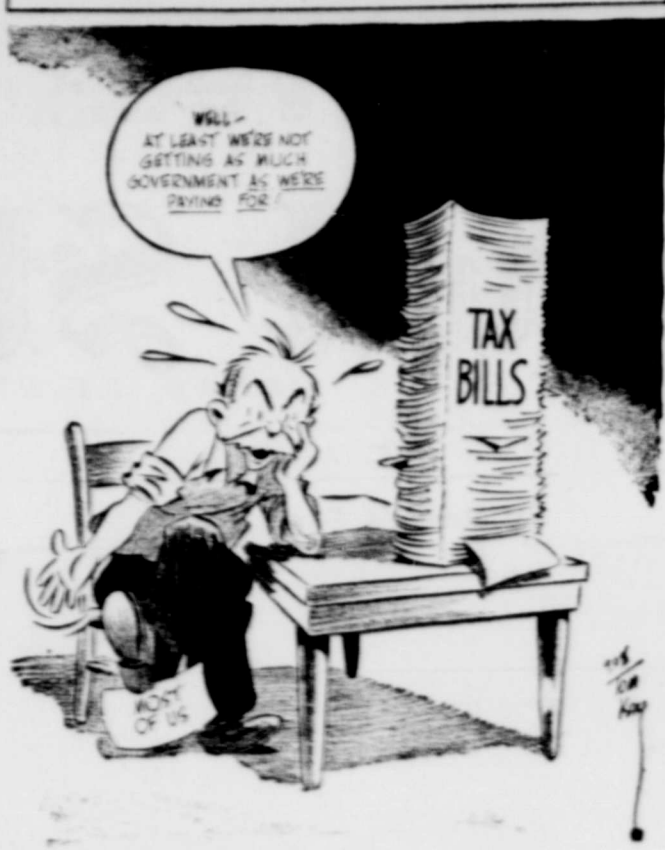
The survey found that the majority prefers a health plan which, first, limits the care to those who need financial help; second, is not tied to the social security system; third, is administered by the state rather than the federal government. Eldercare meets all of these wants; medicare none.

Specifically, 74 percent of all those polled chose the Eldercare features, after comparing the two plans. It is significant that those with incomes under \$3,000 favored Eldercare provisions by the same percentage.

It is certainly the duty of the Senate to examine these alternative proposals with the utmost care and to consider them in a nonpolitical atmosphere of public needs and desires.

INTERNATIONAL FALLS, MINN., JOURNAL: "There were 24 million women employed in this country last year, while 2 million men were without work. These statistics were reported by Mrs. Esther Peterson, assistant Secretary of Labor, to show that womanpower is needed as well as manpower to meet the plans for the Great Society. For that matter, women have been needed from the beginning of time."

### WHAT TO DO ABOUT COMMUNISM — CHAPTER 100

It's time to write that article again—the one about communism. I've written it so many times that I'm sure it must sound like a broken record.

And yet every three months or so a new "crisis" develops and I have to take out the same old article and write it all over again. Why don't I take a fresh approach? Because the answer to the question is unchanging.

The latest communist-created crises, we are told, are in the Dominican Republic and South Vietnam. Writers are falling all over themselves offering advice and counsel on these "grave" matters. But if these are communist-created problems, then the solution is the same one that applied to the Cuban crisis, the Laos problem, the Berlin Blockade, the so-called Sino-Soviet split, etc., etc.

The President says he can not permit another Cuba in Latin America. Fine. But what does he do about it? He sends American soldiers to die—just as in Vietnam.

**Caused Ignored**  
Meanwhile, the problem gets bigger because the causes are not curtailed. And what is the cause of the Communist problem? The wholesale sending of American resources to the Communist leaders.

Example: we subsidized the cost, transportation and credit on last year's wheat sale to the Soviet Union, saving the communists over \$200 million.

The politicians make a regular habit of confiscating our wealth and sending it to the Communist states of Poland and Yugoslavia. Poland, in turn conducts its own foreign aid program—with North Vietnam as a chief beneficiary.

We make up the Soviets' defaulted dues in the UN; our "leaders" allow the UN to send our money to Communist nations as part of various international "pools"; we train Yugoslav pilots and officers in the U. S.

Cuba wealthier before Castro's takeover; our money still supports Laos under a "neutral" government; we allow the Soviet relatively free access to various military discoveries, etc., etc., etc.

**Solution Ignored**  
But you've heard all this before. And it doesn't seem to have any significance. And yet where would the Communists be without our aid? No totalitarian economy could possibly outdo a free economy—militarily or whatever—unless the free society has a program for turning over its resources to the totalitarian state.

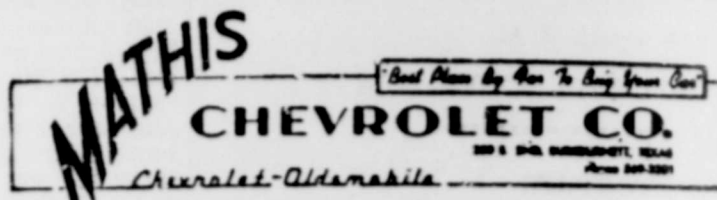
She represented Alpha Sigma Tau Sorority in the contest. The Craft family formerly resided in Burkburnett and Miss Craft attended high school here.

More FHA Title I property improvement loans are granted for "exterior finish" than for any other category that includes only a single kind of work. Exterior finish also ranks first in the amount of money lent.

Under Title I, the Federal Housing Administration is per-

mitted to insure loans up to \$3,500 in amount for periods up to five years. The money actually is lent by savings and loan associations, banks, or other lenders. The government sets a limit on interest rates.

Exterior finish includes painting or re-siding with materials, such as mineral fiber, which is finished during manufacture with a weather-resistant acrylic color coating. In 1963, the average Title I loan for exterior finish was \$1,353.

Other popular uses to which FHA property improvement loans are put include reroofing, insulation, heating, interior finish, and plumbing.
