Federal excise taxes - including the World War II "nuisance taxes" levied at retail on cosmettics, luggage, jewelry and other articles in universal use - produce some \$5 billion a year for the Treasury. The President has approved reductions and repeals in this area of taxation totaling \$1.75 billion at this time, with more to follow in the future. All of the "nuisance taxes," which are responsible for \$550 million of the revenue, would be removed from the books.

That move is long overdue — they were purely war emergency measures and should have ended with the conflict. They impose an unfair burden on consumer and retailer alike. And, as more and more observers are saying, repeal should now be accomplished with all possi-

The reason why speed is needed is obvious. That these taxes are on the way out is considered a certainty. So, many potential buyers of the affected wares will put off their purchases in order to save the amount of the tax. In other words, something resembling a buyer's strike could occur, with all the depressing effects on the economy that would result.

Passage of a constructive excise tax bill should take a small amount of time and debate - just about everyone is for it. There's no good reason for further delay.

RIGHT-TO-WORK AND UNION MEMBERSHIP

The drive is under way to cause Congress to repeal section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act, which permits the family in case of death, if one's states to pass Right-to-Work laws prohibiting compul- estate is not clearly alocated. sory unionism as a condition of employment. In the 19 Death-whether we like it or states which have done so, every worker voluntarily decides whether to join or not, and is protected from coercion by either union or the employer.

The unions argue that Right-to-Work is, in effect, a union busting tactic and is designed to play havoc with union membership and the effectiveness of the unions in obtaining benefits for labor.

In the light of that, some information provided by James R. Wason, Specialist in Labor Relations, Legislative Reference Service, Library of Congress, is extremely significant. He says: "For the period 1958 to 1962, at least, the trend in (AFL-CIO) membership in major union states without Rights-to-Work laws is more unfavorable than in Right-toWork states." Specifically, union kept in an easily available place membership went up in 40 per cent of the Right-to-Work states, as against 30 per cent in the non-Right-to-Work

One reason for this, perhaps, is that the unions must do a better job where membership is voluntary rather than compulsory. They must sell themselves on the basis of service and make joining up a more attractive proposi- raise the provision for your tion to the worker. And they must be far more responsive to the wishes of the rank-and-file.

Finally, if a man can't hold a job without joining and paying dues to an organization, irrespective of his wishes in the matter, an absolutely basic freedom is denied him. There is no room for that kind of coercion in a truly free

FURTHER ADVICE ON MAKING WILLS AND CODICILS

As we pointed out last week in this column, it is thoughtless and unfair for any person, whether of moderate or extensive means, to put off making a will. Much pain and confu ion can beset one's heirs and not-is one of the inevitable facts of life. And in this day of 70 mph speed limits on the highway and the feverish pace of every day existence, sudden and unexpected death strikes too often.

Review Your Will Regularly

Have your lawyer draw up your will with one carbon. The original should be signed, sealed and placed in your safe deposit box for safe keeping. Your duplicate copy may best be so that you may review its contents periodically. It should, of course, not be signed. Most people should read ov-

er their wills at least once a year. If your holdings increase, you will undoubtedly wish to church and perhaps some of your favorite charities. Also, you may find there are surprisingly changes in estate assets; and too, you may wish to make changes in potential beneficiaries. This is another important reason why you should make periodic revision of your will a significant part of your estate planning.

Amend Via Codicils

Choose your own executor, rather than have some judge appoint an executor who will almost certainly have less genuine interest in your affairs. He may be chosen in the original will or in the last codicil. But even your executor need not know what is in your will until it becomes his business after your death.







To give the illusion that your house is occupied, leave shades up and venetian blinds partly open. Use an automatic timing device which turns lights on at dusk and off at bedtime. Use sturdy Yale pin-tumbler cylinder locks on all exterior doors. For glass doors, use double cylinder locks which require keys on each side.




