PERSONAL INCOME -WILL IT KEEP CLIMBING?

The personal income of the people of this country has been skyrocketing over the last few years. Records have been shattered time after time, and there are no signs as yet of a reversal in direction. Recent figures reveal how spectacular the increase has been over just the past twelve months.

#### Income Gains Broadening Steadily

#### Corporate Dividends Steadily Widening

Broadening the base of ownership to such a degree means that the American people have undoubtedly a greater interest than ever before in the manageconsummer optimism along a wide front. This is a contributive reason for what may well hikes and better job opportun-

Naturally, the big question is whether the upward pressures will persist in personal income. Even with the population rising rapidly, employment could continue as it is. At least for the next few years there will be, if anything, too few skilled workers available rather than too many. Built-in wage and fringe concessions might hoist pay rates still higher. Even if war escalation should now bring controls, it is unlikely that personal income would stop edging upward. A solid backlog is assured from interest, dividend payments, var-ious government benefits, and well sustained salary rates.

The President's speech of last week should be a help rather than a hinderance to business. He showed the strain of his enormous burden, but he should certainly not feel discouraged; he is doing an excellent job at the helm. We must remember, however, that an unexpected event could always

Tires are about to be used on restaurants as well as automobiles. A revolving restaurant that turns on 75 U. S. Royal passenger car tires is being built on top of a new office building in Memphis, Tenn.

"We believe this is the only restaurant in existence that will ride on automobile tires," said builder Kemmons Wilson, president of Kemmons Wilson Construction Co. of Memphis. "Our engineers decided on passenger tires instead of solid rubber rollers because tires ride smoother and will cushion any rough spots in the floor." One of the tires, driven by a ½ horsepower electric engine, will turn the restaurant floor. Two other U. S. Royals, at the side of the revolving unit, will provide stability.

The restaurant will revolve once every 80 minutes, turning a mile every 24 hours. At that leisurely pace the tires should last almost until the middle of the 21st century — unless they fall victim to old age first. Crawl space under the floor provides access to the tires which are mounted on regular car wheels.
