What is a credit bureau? What role does it play in the competitive world we live in today?

The credit bureau is truly unique — yet as American as apple pie. There is much confusion about what a gradit burfusion about what a credit bureau does, even more so, what an association of credit bureaus

The credit bureau is one of North America's least known businesses, mainly because it does not directly serve the public. Instead it serves credit granters and employers.

Some people think credit bureaus are here to give advice on all kinds of problems, and certainly we do try to help when we can. One woman recently asked a credit bureau what kind of husband to look for. While this isn't the usual type problem tackled by a credit bureau, the bureau did give sound advice by suggesting that she look for a single man and leave husbands alone.

As we stated before, our industry is unique. We are the only organization that gets its raw material from the same source where we sell the finished product. Why is this so? Why is it that the credit bureau can call for, and get, informa-tion free and yet, when a credit granter calls for information, he is charged for it? Good question. Simple answer. A credit bureau does not sell information—the only thing we sell is service. The charge that is made covers the salaries that were spent in gathering the information, correlating it, putting it into proper form, filing it, and then having it ready to deliver when called upon.

When a credit granter calls for information, he gives only the references that have been furnished by the individual seeking credit. Usually these though references are good, there are sometimes glaring exceptions, due I suppose to the fact that they do not really believe they are going to be checked. Even if the references given are very good the credit bureau frequently al information that reflects an entirely different picture. The heart of the credit report is the record of paying habits as it is secured from cooperating credit granters. This can be a time consuming operation but once a record has been establishedit has been established. The individual may move or he may have moved here from some other city, or country, either way, his record can be obtained from member bureaus. It is this over the years checking and re-checking that eventually reflects a fairly accurate picture of how good, or bad, a credit risk the applicant might be. If the going gets rough, as it does for all of us at times, will he be likely to plug away at his debts until they are cleared, or is he a chronic non-payer. This is what the credit bureau attempts to help the credit granter determine.
