

The derrick is 151 feet high and has a capacity of nearly a million and a half pounds. As of now, the drilling in search of undersea oil is taking place at 600 feet and still deeper waters may be explored later. Almost incredibly complex controls make the operation possible. Just about every tool and technique used is new and is being tested against the sea.

Sixty men can live aboard in complete comfort. A platform provides a landing place for helicopters that bring men and emergency supplies in a few minutes from shore bases. Heavy supplies are brought by barges and boats, while fast speedboats transfer crews which reserves for the future.



## News From The County Agent

Wichita County stockmen were today advised to be on the lookout for the annual invasion of lice on their livestock. These pests can take a real bite out of profits unless they are controlled, says County Agent B. T. Haws.

He suggests that livestock producers get a copy of Exten-sion publication MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poul-

Haws says the publication is "chuck-full" of information on insecticides formulations and how to use them in controlling flies, lice, mites, ticks, fleas and cattle grubs. It contains a dilution chart for mixing sprays and dips and outlines control programs for beef animals and nonlactating dairy cattle, dairy animals, sheep and goats, swine, horses and poultry. The bulletin also offers suggestions for controlling house and stable flies. To get a head start on lice
