ECONOMICS PROSPECTS — 1966

The gross output of the American economy will be \$672 billion in 1965 — about \$43 billion higher than 1964. The National Association of Manufacturers' report on economic prospects for next year states that "comparable growth is attainable in 1966, which would raise the gross national product for the year to close to \$715 billion."

The NAM statement cautions that these are not unconditional forecasts. "Non-inflationary economic growth is not a gift of the gods, simply to be accepted and enjoyed. It is to be won or lost, depending on the degree of wisdom presented by the national policies we pursue."

The NAM report points out that we have emerged from an "under utilized" economy to a "fully utilized" economy.

Our national policies must be oriented to assure the accumulation of capital and know-how necessary to make added manpower more productive at a steadily accelerated pace, the report asserted. To insure non-inflationary economic growth for 1966 and beyond we should:

- Make sure that the federal government refrains from attempts to replace the marketplace as the instrument for controlling prices and wages.
- Remove some of the special privileges and exemptions which by law have been conferred on labor unions.
- Use future opportunities or tax reduction in ways which free funds for additional savings rather than for additional consumption.
- Allow interest rates to find their own level, given a national policy which permits the supply of money and credit to grow only in proportion to the growth in the economy.

The program for growth will effectively serve both our national and international interest, the report concluded.

IN A FREE SOCIETY

During the second session of Congress, an all-out drive will be made to repeal section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act—the section which authorized the states to pass right-to-work laws. These laws say, in effect, that it is up to each individual worker to decide for himself whether he wishes to join a union or not, and that he cannot be compelled to do so on pain of losing his job.

The House voted to repeal 14(b) during the first session. But a determined group of Senators, representing both the parties, prevented action in the Senate.

We will soon know whether union political power is sufficient to obrogate a right which would seem absolutely basic in a free society. Strict laws forbid discrimination against workers on such grounds as race, creed, color and sex. But without right-to-work, the law supports, and to all intents and purposes enforces, discrimination of the most absolute kind against workers who for their own good reasons do not wish to become union members.

A Congress which turns its back on the right-to-work principle has small regard for human freedom. It is not antiunion to support freedom of choice.

REPORT FROM RHODESIA

Salisbury, Rhodesia — The world press has stated that any foreigner who enters Rhodesia without a British visa and later comes to Britain might find himself in trouble for dealing with an enemy. Well, here I am in Rhodesia without a British visa. Next stop, Britain. And I DO accuse Britain of dealing with an enemy of the United States—Viet Nam. Britain will trade with anybody, for a profit. If nobody were looking, Britain would sell to Rhodesia, while urging others not to, for a profit. Britannia waives the rules. Rhodesia's northern neighbor,

Zambia, is a racially integrated nation of 80,000 whites and millions of blacks. On the Zambian-Rhodesian border is the fabulous Karida dam, completed only five years ago, which flooded about 2,000 square miles of Rhodesian bush country and created the largest man-made lake in the world — 175 miles long and up to 20 miles wide. If anybody ever did blow up the dam, it would be one of the most sensational sights and dastardly deeds in history, for the dam connecting Rhodesia and



Zambia holds back 41 million gallons of water! Ten thousand men worked four years to complete the dam. Two hundred of them died from the steaming heat and accidents at the remote site, which required millions of gallons of fuel, cement, machinery and food to be carried in along elephant trails.

The Kariba dam is vital to the economy of Rhodesia as well as Zambia. It is ridiculous to speculate that the Smith government might destroy the dam. It is her only source of power. Rhodesia wants and needs Zambia's friendship, since Zambia is her best export market.

Zambia's government is black. But more than 50,000 whites are the brains, the cement, and the nervous system of Zambia's economy, which rests mainly on its indispensable and strategic copper mines. Many of the whites working in Zambia are Rhodesians and South Africans. Their loyalty lies with Rhodesia.

Ninety percent of the officer corps in Zambia's 2,500 strong army are white. They have close friends and even brothers in the Rhodesian officer corps.

Informed sources here believe Zambia will not allow military action from Zambia against Rhodesia for the following reasons: 1. Enmity between black and white in Zambia is a greater threat to the mines and to the state than "white supremacy" in Rhodesia. 2. Zambia wouldn't trust black troops from other nations on Zambian soil. 3. Having watched "international crimes" in the Congo, Zambia has no desire to be saved by the U.N.

Miss Arndt began her career on the Abilene Daily Reflector and from there she went to the Standard-Star as Society Editor in New Rochelle, N. Y. While here she knew well the great woman suffrage leader, Carrie Chapman Catt, and met many noted artists, musicians and people of the theater.

From here she went to the Washington Post as Society Editor. Then a page devoted to women's organizations was started and for four years she edited this, covering major women's organizations which had national headquarters in the Nation's Capital.

In 1941, Miss Arndt was asked to go to The Christian Science Monitor as Woman's Editor.

This has given her opportunity for contact with leading women all over the world and their distinguished achievements. She has traveled all over the United States, including Alaska and Hawaii, Europe, Australia and parts of Asia. In 1955 she wrote a series on "Uncle Sam's Families," the dependents of our armed forces in Germany, France and England.

Miss Arndt has been doing a series of stories on Community Improvement Programs of the General Federation of Women's Clubs and the Sears-Roebuck Foundation since they began, but this is the first time she has traveled over the country to visit specific projects and write such a series as she is presently doing.

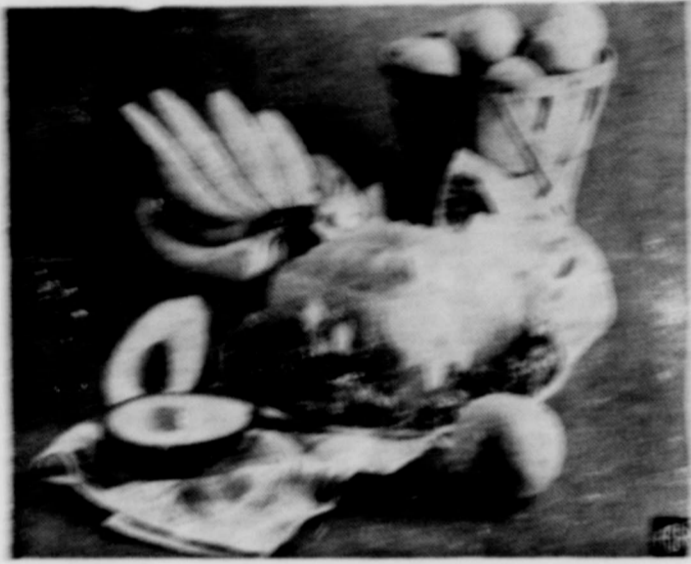

Fee Wee Group: Sandy Jennings and Ricky McClatchy.

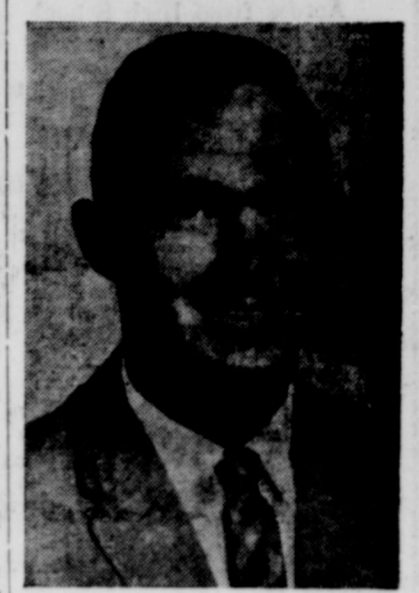

his home be relieved of liability on a VA guaranteed loan?

A—One method is to require the purchaser to pay off the GI loan with his own resources or to obtain a new loan. Another method is to have the purchaser assume all the veteran's liabilities on the home and have the VA approve the assumption agreement and specifically release the veteran from further liability to the VA.

Q—In 1946 my ten per cent disability was reduced to zero per cent. The reduction to zero per cent made reinstatement possible if my disability reoccurred. Does my zero per cent entitle me to reinstate my National Service Life Insurance, which I dropped in 1946?

A—Since it appears that you have a service-connected disability, you may apply for the new insurance which is being sold by the Veterans Administration. Application must be made before May 2, 1966.

Q—My application for insurance under the law which permits service-connected disabled veterans to apply for insurance until May 2, 1966, was ejected because I had a nonservice-connected disability in addition to my service-connected disability, because I had a non service-condition has improved and is no longer disabling. Will the insurance now be granted?

A—You should make another application for the insurance as soon as possible based on your present condition of health.

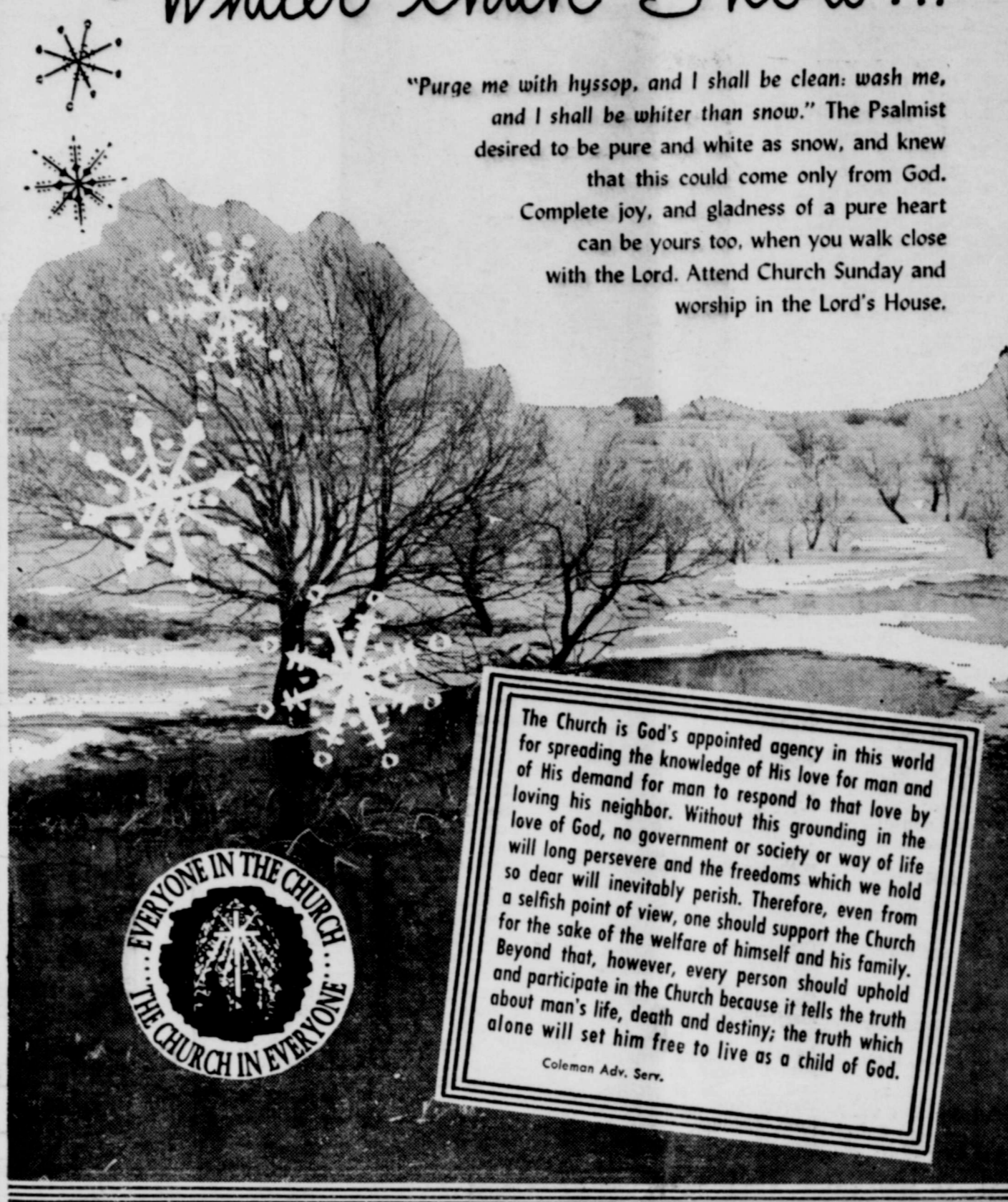
