



The sculptured lines of folding wood panel doors grace what might otherwise have been an awkwardly large corner doorway. Because the doors fold back against themselves, they take minimal floor clearance space and allow more flexible furniture arrangement while adding decorative interest to the reem. The folding panel doors are stock units of ponderosa pine, obtainable at lumber dealers.

Folding doors, which are often used for closets, can also turn an awkwardly located. doorway into a graceful passage.

Because these doors fold back against themselves, they require a minimum of floor clearance. Where standard single or double doors would be unwieldy or impractical, folding doors leave floor and wall areas free for more flexible furniture arrangement.

Modern folding panel doors of ponderosa pine also add & decorative touch to a doorway. Available in stock sizes and in a variety of elegant designs, they can be installed as single or double units for doorways, or hung in a series to form an entire closet wall.

Folding doors can be used to good advantage in corner entrances and hallways where floor space is restricted, to close off studio-type kitchens, and as connecting doors between kitchens and dining rooms or dressing rooms and bathrooms.

In addition to being decorative, panel doors reduce the passage of sound. In areas where ventilation is important, folding louvered doors are often used because they provide free circulation of air as well as privacy.

Have you ever considered how difficult it would be to conduct everyday business transactions without money?

This was virtually the situation confronting early American colonists, points out Ken Bressett, numismatic editor at Whitman Publishing Company

Racine, Wis.
Faced with a shortage of money in the early 1600's, our settlers resorted to barter as, a medium of exchange, and used Indian wampum when trading with the redskins. Monetary scarcity was caused by reluc-tance of the British to ship coins over here.

Colonists finally took matters into their own hands in 1652. issuing crude pieces of money known as New England shill

"The standard shifting was supplemented by two other coins, the threepence and six-pence," notes Bressett. "All were flat discs of silver with the emblem 'NE' (for New England) punched on one side, and denomination on the reverse side." However, simplicity of the de-

sign soon invited counterfeiting. so the coins were replaced by the Willow, Oak and Pine Tree series. When the King of England

learned that colonists were minting their own coins, a stop order was issued, says Bressett. To avoid conflict, our early settlers adroitly went on making these coins for the next 30 years, using the original date of 1652. The earliest American coins private issues, and in 1787 the first federally authorized U.S. money appeared — the Fagic cent. After 1792, our present monetary system based on a dollar divided into 10 parts went into effect. were succeeded by a variety of





### SCIENTISTS MAKING OWN 'EARTHQUAKES'

Coronado, Calif. — (HK) — Scientists are making their own "earthquakes."

The reason: to obtain new in-formation on the behavior of steel-framed buildings subjected to earthquake forces and to aid in the design of safer, earthquake-resistant buildings. The results were reported here re-cently to engineers attending the annual convention of the Structural Engineers Association of California.

No area is immune to quakes, say scientists. Damaging shocks have hit 40 states at one time

#### ONE OF SEVERAL

Research through man-made "earthquakes" - one type conducted in miniature and the other staged at actual high-rise buildings — is one of several university studies being sponsored by the Committee of Structural Steel Producers and the Committee of Steel Plate Producers of American Iron and Steel Institute.

Professor Egor Popov of the Department of Civil Engineer-ing. University of California, Berkeley, described his labora-

tory tests of steel beam-to-column connections. These tests are important because connections have been found to be a critical element in buildings during an earthquake.

#### SIMULATED FORCES

Popov concluded that steel beams and their connections can withstand a large number of earthquake-like forces. In his tests, he simulated these pow-erful forces with a double-acting hydraulic jack that bends the free end of short steel beams as much as 10 inches.

In another report, J. G. Bouwkamp, an associate pro-fessor in the Department of Civil Engineering at the University of California, described simulated earthquakes created in buildings at the Medical Center of the University of California at San Francisco.

The buildings were subjected to earthquake-like shocks pro-duced by two machines called were attached to the steel building frames. Motions of the buildings were measured by sensitive recorders.

ernment regulations on labeling of wool merchandise that affect purchasers of these fabrics have just gone into effect. An amendment to the Wool Labeling Act regulations state that the "Imported Fabric" label will no longer be displayed wool merchandise shown in the United States. The Federal Trade Commission now requires all imported fabric labels show the country of origin.

It has been determined that the fabric label is more important to most shoppers than any other information regarding the earment, according to a national trade association, Woolers and Worsteds of America. A recent survey of some 2,000 was indicated that some 1,973 stated the fabric label strongly fluenced them in their apparel purchasing.


