West Is Successful Bidder for Garbage Collection Contract

West of Burkburnett successful bidder for the garbage and trash contract, when bids opened at Burkburnett council meeting, Monday March 7.

Contract is substantially as previous ones, except it is for a period of 8 years, instead of four years. It will take effect on June 1, 1967. There will be no increase to consumers, these residents. Single family unit with alley, \$1.50 per month; family unit without alley, \$1.50 per month, where it is necessary

to carry out refuse or garbage for more than 20 feet from property line, \$2.50 per month; Two family units on separate meters per unit, \$1.50 per month; Apartment houses in one building with three or more units, per unit, \$1.50 per month; Housing Developments to be charged per family unit, \$1.50 per month.

Commercial and business establishments, regardless of location to be charged at a rate to be established by the City Manager and by the Supervisor of Garbage collection on the basis of cost of daily service according to actual time required, but no concern shall be less than \$1.50 per month.

The city retains 40 cents from the amount collected from each subscriber. Service is required six days a week for commercial establishments and twice a week for residences.

Mrs. James E. Frye and Jack Aaron were named to the City Planning Board by the City Council, filling vacancies caused by the death of Dr. J. A. Davey and the resignation of Winston Freeman. Other members of the City Planning Board are A. R. Hill, chairman, Jack Mathis and Mrs. Harold Van Loh.

Permian Park was the name given the land donated to the city by the Permian Oil Company. This area adjoins the swimming pool park grounds.

The city council passed a memorial resolution to Dr. Joseph A. Davey, who served as City Health Officer and Board Member of the City Planning Board.

Commemorated also for his work with Boy Scouts, Red Cross Blood Bank and his assistance to the City Police in both their duties and their training.

The resolution stated in part: In his deep consideration for human welfare, he used the past as a guide to the future.

states, Rev. Streicher served as pastor of St. Luke Lutheran, Wauseon, Ohio; of St. Michael Lutheran, Winchester, Texas; and of Immanuel Lutheran, Williamsburg, Iowa.

Health and Safety Tips From AMA

HANDICAPPED ADULTS
Does someone in your household have a physical handicap? Today's Health Guide, the American Medical Association's manual of health information and guidance for the American family, points out that it is understandable and quite normal that you should wish to "do for" the disabled member of your family, but it may be more helpful to allow him to do for himself. To make sure that you are really being helpful, it is wise to check with the patient's physician and have him outline the patient's real capabilities and limitations. It is sometimes possible that the patient is not interested in minimizing his phy-

sical problems. Real psychological problems are best handled with the advice of a physician, but there are several factors that illustrate the type of problems that may be encountered in living in a household with a handicapped person—
— The dependent nature of some people, which their disability tends to accentuate.
— The lack of intellectual ability or educational background.
— Plain laziness.
— The need to let others do the work after having spent a lifetime of "doing for others." (The parents who feel that the children should take care of them).
— The expectation of complete recovery, so that devices are not seen as a necessity.
Once you know realistically expect, know that he is deserving help, then you can prove invaluable. —Offer help, but force it upon someone. —Find out what is most important to the patient and start with that. —Seek the patient's advice. Otherwise you may be inflicting your own desire. —If possible, seek the advice of a consultant. —Keep an open mind to the ideas of the patient. —Keep devices

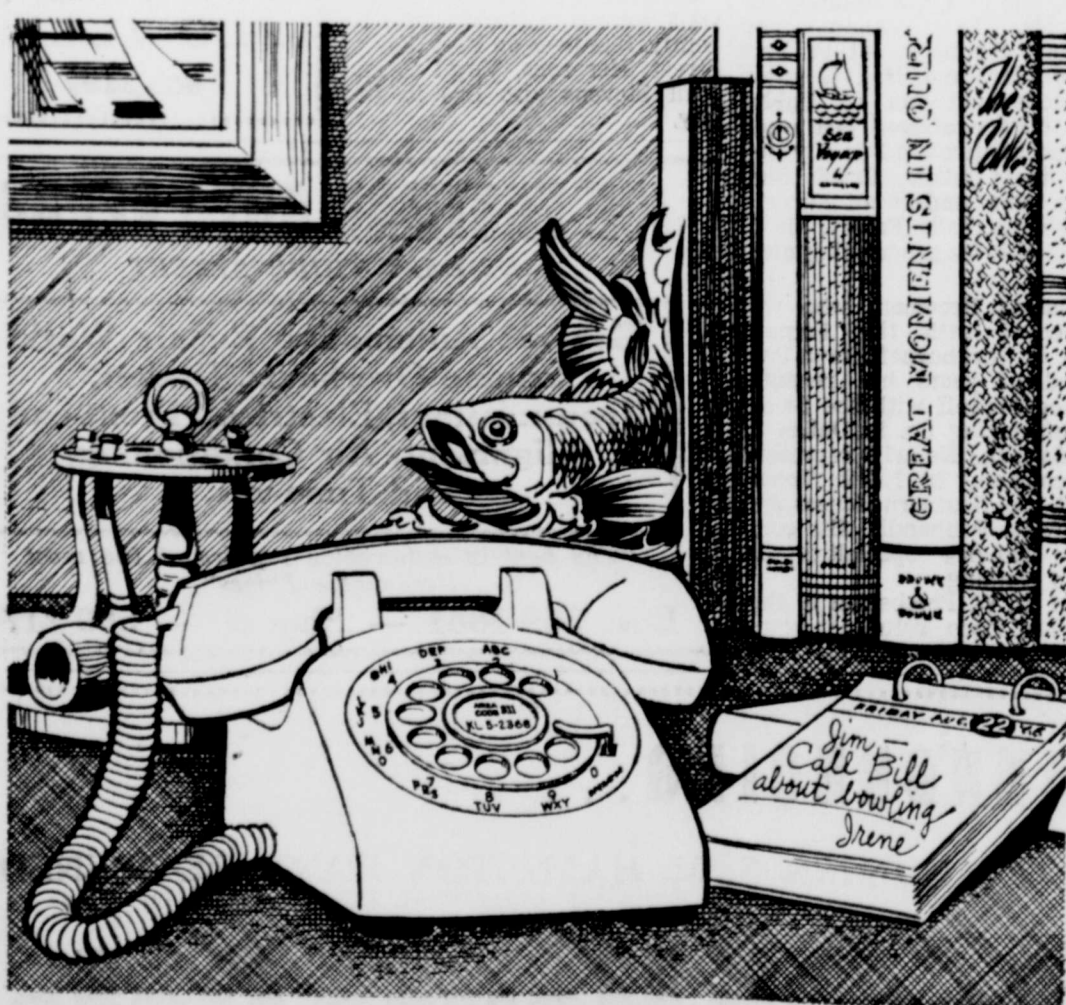
