



# Texas Citizens May Register To Vote 'For Free'

By VERN SANFORD Texas Press Association

AUSTIN, Tex. - Texans who failed to pay their poll tax have another chance to register for a vote in the 1966 elections. This time it's "fer free!"

Registration period extends from March 3 through March 17. Any citizen eligible to vote can sign up with his county tax assessor-collector and his name will be placed on the poll list at no charge.

Then, have your child sit or lie down and insert the thermometer under the tongue, a little to one side. Caution the youngster to keep his lips closed and breathe through his nose. Tell him not to bite down or try to talk.

Leave the thermometer in place for at least three minutes. Read the gauge to the nearest degree and 2/10 of a degree.
