THE OILMEN'S WORLD

Few things are more dramatic than the sight and sound of an oil gusher exploding high into the air and drenching everything around it with "black gold." This has been a climatic moment in outstanding films, and it has been celebrated in fact and story. The days of worry and axiety are over - the agonized waiting until it can be known for certain whether the driller is to achieve success or face catastrophic failure. The oil-soaked crew shouts for joy - it's just a matter of time until untold sums of money will roll in.

Well, it has happened. But it is a much, much rarer event than most readers of fiction and viewers of the films realize. Nowadays, advanced technology usually is able to control the underground pressures and prevent the waste that a rare gusher represents. The profits from oil discoveries - if there are to be any profits at all come slowly and arduously, and only after the taking of

Look at Alaska. Oil companies have invested about \$430 million in the search for petroleum in Alaska and plan to spend \$130 million more in 1966. But their total income from sales since the first major discovery in 1957 has been about \$126 million. The state, meanwhile, has collected about \$125 million in rentals, royalties and other

So it goes in the oilmen's world. They must take great risks. And few indeed would accept those risks unless they could see, glimmering in the distance, the chance of profit, if luck, combined with courage and determination, smile on them.

CONGRESS HAS THE POWER

The strike of transit workers which virtually paralyzed New York, a city which is absolutely dependent on its public transportation system, was an example of union arrogance and disregard of the public interest to an almost unbelievable degree. Now the nation has suffered from a railroad strike.

The question is not whether the transit or railroad workers had just grievances. If they did, there are estab- Slater lished ways for bringing about correction. The question is whether the country can continue to allow a few labor leaders, wielding enormous and arbitrary powers, to bring havoc if and when they choose.

Long ago, Congress acted to provent the use and abuse of comparable powers by finance and industry. And there can be small question that sooner or later the sheer, unstoppable force of massed public opinion will force Congress to take similar steps affecting monopolistic labor. As David Lawrence wrote, "Congress has the power to regulate labor_management relations. During the last 18 years virtually no important amendments to existing laws have been enacted to cut down the abuses in the conduct of labor relations." The public can't wait another 18 years for protection.

WATCH YOUR HIDE

Taxes have been described as the price we pay for civilization. By the looks of things, we may be getting too civilized for our own good.

The editor of the Belton, Texas, Journal and Demo-crat, observes that: "More taxes seem to be coming. Something ought to give . . . and many of us hope the Great Society will be curtailed, while we are still alive to enjoy the society we already have. Some government economists look upon us taxpayers as sheep, figuring we can be sheared and sheared again. True, but you can skin a sheep only once."

If any of the voters are worrying about this, they might look in the mirror to find the cause of their concern. When we ask for federal handouts we get them for votes - but we pay for them in taxes, and then some. When we send a tax dollar to Washington, the "free lunch" we get back may only be worth fifty cents, with political overhead, carrying charges and inflation taken out. If we want to give our wool for civilization, but keep our hides for ourselves, we can make our wishes known in the voting booth at every opportunity.

About 140 million Americans are not getting the same kind of postal service enjoyed by rural residents. Without taking away one bit of service presently given rural residents, legislation before Congress would give better service to the seven out of 10 Americans that live in communities with first class post offices.

Carl Beck, Vice President of National Small Business Association (NSBA), points out that present parcel post regulations not only discriminate but also cause confusion. "Take a person in Chicago that wants to mail two packages, both weighing 30 pounds, to people served by first class post offices. He may be able to mail one parcel but not the other." "This may

Beck says. "The consumer must choose between using a shipping service which costs much more or splitting his package into smaller parcels.
