HOW JOBS ARE MADE

Where do the better jobs come from? They come from research and development. This year American industry is expected to increase its research and development investment by \$1.6 billion to a record \$15.2 billion for new processes and products, according to a McGrey-Hill survey.

By 1969, the companies expect that their over-all quest for new technological capabilities will be cost-\$18.2 billion annually.

The main object for 45 per cent of the companies is to develop new products, while 41 per cent concentrate on improving existing products. Finding new processes is the target of the remaining 14 per cent.

To mention one of the many companies, U. S. Steel tripled its expenditures for research over the past ten years. In their Monroeville, Pa., research center and associated laboratories 1,880 scientists, technicians and other people are employed. About 1,300 projects were under study during the past year.

This unit conducts a development program for higher-yield strength, high-toughness weldable steel for use in deep-diving underwater vehicles and armor plate for helicopters. In the past two years alone, over one-hundred new or improved products have been marketed by U. S. Steel.

Yes, R and D stands for progress in America.

THE POWER TO DESTROY

A long time ago, it was said that the power to tax is the power to destroy. The proof of these words is being demonstrated with a vengeance today.

The economic decisions of millions of individuals and businesses are being made with an eye on the impact of taxes. The lawmaker who assumes that the power to tax is synonymous with the power to solve any money problem, in what is popularly called the public sector, is due for disillusionment. When taxes pass the point of reason, revenue sources dry up.

Local governments will do well to note a recent incident in the city of New York. There, the city administration proposed an exorbitant increase in the Stock Transfer Tax that is paid by investors all over the nation who trade on the New York Stock Exchange. In the words of the President of the New York Stock Exchange, the proposal "... cast a shadow over the growth of the city." The Stock Exchange cancelled plans for a magnificent automated new \$80 million home previously scheduled to go up near the foot of Manhattan Island.

The imposition of this increase in the Stock Transfer Tax could mean that the heart of the financial industry would remove itself from New York, taking with it 43,000 jobs and an annual payroll of \$625 million. Here is what can happen when the tax gatherers overreach.

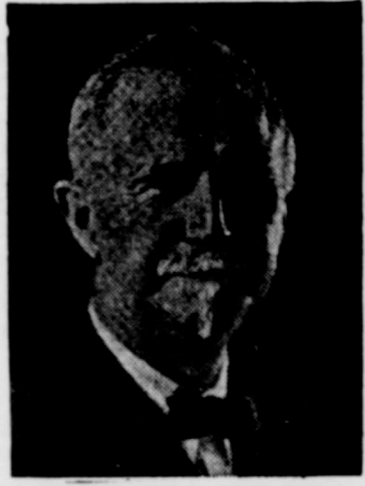

MAKING USE OF PRODUCT GUARANTEES

Babson Park, Mass., June 2—When you buy almost any standard article—from a wrist watch to a yacht—there is an implied guarantee that the product is as represented. That is a basic fact of purchasing overseen by the Federal Trade Commission. But usually a new, or even a more costly second-hand, product brings with it a specific guarantee or warranty not only to help clinch your sale but to specify what you can do about it if anything goes wrong.

Keep Your Guarantee And Sales Slip

Even though the liability of a company or store for any defectiveness in the goods bought may spur a buyer to complete the purchase, he is as likely as not to forget the guarantee almost before he gets home. The certificate may kick around his desk for a while, then be thrown out with the newspapers. Or a housewife may keep her guarantee on the kitchen shelf, intending to hold onto it for the year or whatever its length of duration. But often, if she does need it some time later, it's gone, nobody knows where or when.

So, the first thing to do when you are given a guarantee or warranty on any article is to put it—with the accompanying sales slip—in one spot specifically assigned for such papers. A manila folder in a desk drawer or on an out-of-the-way shelf is probably the safest and best place. Legally, a warranty is considered to be a manufacturer's statement of liability for his product and how far it goes. A guarantee, on the other hand, may be issued by somebody else along the line—such as the assembler, distributor, or retailer—who must answer for any lapse on the part of the maker.

Find Out Just How You Are Covered

If you are completing a purchase of any article supplied with a warranty or guarantee, take the time to go over it with your retailer and find out just how you are covered. Ask questions. Who is responsible in case of failure, the manufacturer or the place of purchase? How long are you protected against product default? If a lifetime proviso is given, does it mean your lifetime, or the usual lifetime of such an article, or specifically what? If a retailer hesitates to answer such ques-

tions, take your business somewhere else. If you are required to send in a filled-in blank at the time of purchase, do so at once, then place the stub with date and other related information in your chosen file. If there is a breakdown or malfunction in

any product that you may have bought relatively recently, check right off whether that particular item is under guarantee, and for how long. To hesitate or put it off may mean that the expiration date will have passed while you wait.

You May Save A Lot of Money

If you build a new home or do a big renovation job on your old one, be sure you add all the warranties and guarantees to your file. New stoves, refrigerators, washing machines, hot water heaters, electric dish washers, and a multitude of other household items come with liability certificates. These appliances can go on the blink, and sometimes they do. If you know just what your protection is, you can save a lot of money.

A soap dispenser in an electric dishwasher can jam. If you don't know the terms of your guarantee or don't bother about its duration, you may end up paying \$15 or \$20 for a home visit, plus the cost of labor and parts. Your guarantee would have covered it all. A color tube in a TV set has been known to blow out short of the usual year's warranty. This can mean as much as \$150 out of your own pocket if you haven't your certificate date on hand. An auto guarantee may run for two-to-five years or 24,000-to-50,000 miles, whichever is sooner. Many a man has simply forgotten that he might still have coverage, and he has laid out large sums for repairs or replacement. Manufacturers and reputable outlets give such certificates because they believe in the quality and durability of their products. If something goes wrong, it is their fault, not yours. And they are usually prompt to see that the wrong is righted. Take full advantage of this way of assuring top value for your outlay.

VETERANS

Questions - Answers

Q—My father received a small pension from the Veterans Administration until his death four years ago. My sister, through an accident that occurred when she was a child, is unable to earn a living. I would like to know if she is entitled to a pension as she has never worked and will never be able to do so?

A—The VA considers a "helpless child" as one who became permanently incapable of self-support prior to age 18. If this is your sister's case, you should submit medical evidence to the VA to support this claim. If the claim is upheld, she may be able to receive pension payments.

Q—If a veteran accepts a nonservice-connected disability pension while trying to prove that this disability was service-connected, will the VA deduct the monies that he has received from the nonservice-connected pension?

A—The fact that a veteran accepts a nonservice-connected disability pension while trying to prove that the disability is service-connected will in no way interfere with the proceedings of his claim. If the veteran should be granted service-connection, the VA will make the adjustments to make sure the veteran receives the greater benefits.

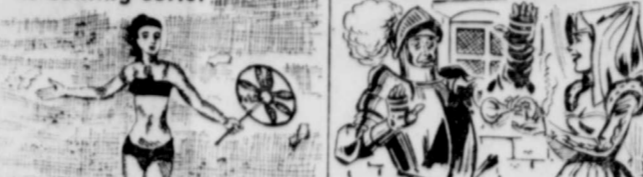
Q—I have a relative in a Veterans Administration Hospital. When I visit him, am I permitted to bring him food?

A—If you do, be certain to stop by the nursing station and let her check to see if it violates the patient's diet orders.

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Health and Safety Tips From AMA

ALLERGIES

About half of us are allergic to something.

Pollen in the air can trigger hay fever, certain foods may start hives. Possible allergens are countless—house dust, animal fur, feathers, cosmetics, bleaches, medicines, foods, pollen. Some people are even allergic to heat, cold or sunlight. And there is the classic case of the woman who was allergic to her husband.

Most common result of allergy are four illnesses—hay fever, asthma, skin ailments and digestive disturbances. Hay fever is an inflammation of the eyes and nasal passages. Asthma is a disease of the bronchial tubes of the lungs. Food allergies, a sensitivity to one or more foods, can affect the skin, the digestive tract or the respiratory system. Skin allergies cause itching, sometimes rash.

Reaction to an allergen varies with individuals. One person may be only slightly upset by eating an egg. Another could become violently ill from the small trace of egg in salad dressing. There still are many

unknown factors about the reason why someone suddenly becomes allergic to something. Allergic diseases are not usually fatal, but they cause untold discomfort and suffering. Although worry and stress might be a contributing factor, allergy is not an imaginary illness. It is very real to the sufferer.

Sometimes the allergen is known and can be avoided. Sometimes many tests by a physician are required to arrive at the true cause. Medical care is necessary in all cases for relief of discomfort and for protection against future attacks.

If you suspect you are allergic to something, see your doctor. Self-diagnosis and self-treatment not only are futile, they frequently are dangerous.

Your doctor often can prescribe medications that will relieve the discomfort. And sometimes he can provide treatments that will desensitize you, so that the allergen no longer causes illness.

NYLON CARE

Nylon rope on your boat trailer winch won't rot, but be careful of rust gathering on the winch sides and spindle. This rust can cut nylon. Occasionally remove the nylon rope from the winch. Carefully sand the spindle and sides and coat with a rust resistant paint.

be deferred following the application of chemicals until the grasses have become established and made considerable growth, the county agent says.

Annual weed control costs about two dollars per acre and in areas where rainfall exceeds 25 inches, forage production increases from 1,900 to 5,500 pounds per acre can be expected. In lower rainfall areas, the increase in forage production should be in proportion depending upon the range condition, says Haws.

Springtime is fishing time. If you plan to carry minnows on your next fishing trip, here are a few ideas that might come in handy, says county agent B. T. Haws.

Minnow pails with built-in aeration are the most satisfactory for carrying your minnows and keeping them alive. However, if pails without aeration are used, the water should be dipped and poured back at frequent intervals to pick up oxygen from the air, says Haws.

Cool water retains more oxygen and minnows consume less than in warm water. So, for long summer trips, putting ice into the container to hold the temperature around 55 degrees F. is generally a good practice. But the angler should gradually increase the water temperature in the pail to that of the pond before using the minnows. Sudden temperature changes make the minnows less active on the hook, therefore, less appetizing to that big fish lurking somewhere in the water.



"THE LIGHT WAS GREEN"

At busy corners all over the country stand familiar machines, designed to help automatic justice. We call them traffic signals, and they deliver a clear and simple rule of law; green means go, red means stop.

Unhappily, justice is far too complicated for total automation. The signals do help, but they cannot give a final answer. In fact, they are sometimes no more than a starting point in the process of telling right from wrong.

For example: A motorist, sued for knocking down a pedestrian, offered this defense in court: The light was green when I

entered the intersection, so I had a right to go through."

But the pedestrian too had started across lawfully, on a green light. The motorist was held liable for relying blindly on the signal, not giving the pedestrian a fair chance to complete his crossing. As one judge phrased it:

"A green light is not a command to go, but only a limited permission."

In another case a motorist was held negligent, again in spite of a green light, for colliding with an ambulance. Evidence showed that the ambulance had its siren on, that others heard it plainly, and that the motorist's window was down and his radio off.

Nor does a green light, beckoning in the distance, justify bad driving in an effort to get there before it changes.

One motorist, with that in mind, crowded close behind the car ahead of him. When the light changed to amber, the front car was able to make a proper stop. But the following motorist could not. Result: a bad crash for which the impatient driver was duly held liable.

Just as green doesn't always mean go, neither does red always mean stop. For instance, emergency vehicles are often given the right by local law to go through a red light.

Yet even this special right is not clear-cut. Thus it was held negligent for an ambulance driver to race through a red light at a dangerous corner, without sounding his siren, when there was no medical need for haste. The court held that even an

ambulance must respect the one bedrock rule that underlies all the rest:

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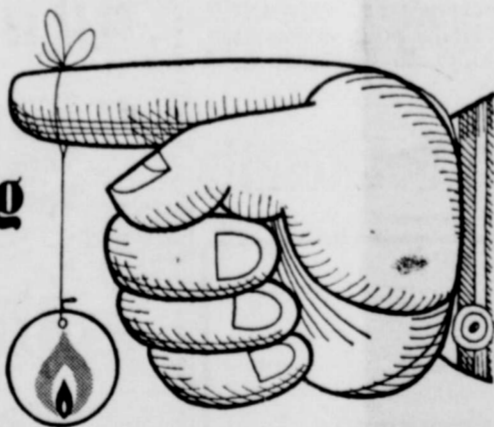

Basic Mix Makes Many Kinds Of Cookies



Basic Starlac Cookie Mix (Makes 20 cups)

- 10 cups sifted all-purpose flour

OATMEAL: Combine 1 slightly beaten egg, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 2 cups rolled oats, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 3/4 cup water. Stir to blend well. Drop by teaspoonfuls 2-3 inches apart onto well-greased cookie sheet. Bake in moderate (375°F.) oven 10-12 minutes or until lightly browned.

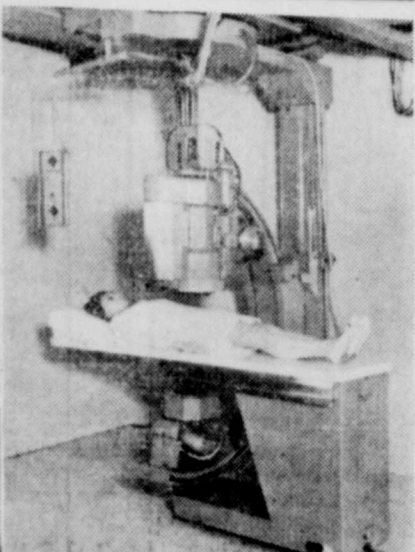

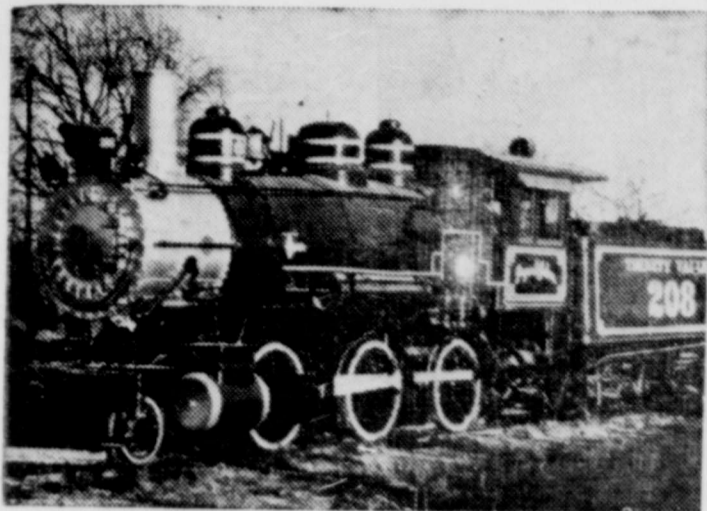

So college students have flocked to Cuba with the expenses picked up by the Castro government. Three men, one of them a Yale professor, in the past few months, went in to North Vietnam, and according to all reports even made anti-American speeches over radio Hanoi.

Now, of course, on their return, it could have perhaps been expected that a U.S. marshal or two would be down at the port to greet them.

But at the last report, they are still walking around free as birds, and presumably echoing the communist line as they learned it in Hanoi.

It perhaps should be in order at this point to comment extensively on these most peculiar situations.

Free Enterprise and The Golden Rule

IT is difficult to say what a man is worth who can guide a great enterprise to success. There are few men with such capacity. The directors of most companies offer top salaries and bonuses to the men they want, because that is the only way to get top quality men. When high emoluments are freely offered to a man he can hardly be criticized for accepting them, any more than popular actors or singers can be criticized for accepting the rewards that are freely offered them. Less highly gifted management would undoubtedly result in fewer jobs, poorly paid jobs, or no jobs.

Furthermore, wise managers, owners and labor will share their success with the public in the form of lower prices. This will widen the market and make possible greater success for the company, those who own it and those who labor in it. The best and most equitable way to distribute the benefits resulting from more efficient means of production, is in the form of lower prices benefiting all the people. But where labor, management and owners demand it all, and exclude the public from participation in it through lower prices, their selfishness will result in a smaller degree of success than the company otherwise might achieve.

Fairness as well as self interest demands that the public receive a part of whatever savings can be made by the introduction of more efficient means of production. Lower prices and ever widening markets mean an expanding prosperity for all segments of the population. Any attempt to shut out the public from sharing in industrial and technological advance, by demanding that all possible benefits be paid to labor, management or owners, is self defeating and will retard a general advance in the standard of living for all people.

And so we come right back to the golden rule: "Whatever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them." The religious precepts and maxims which the saints and the prophets of all ages have enunciated and which are better set forth in the Old and New Testaments of the Bible than in any other place are, after all is said and done, the best rules by which to govern our conduct. 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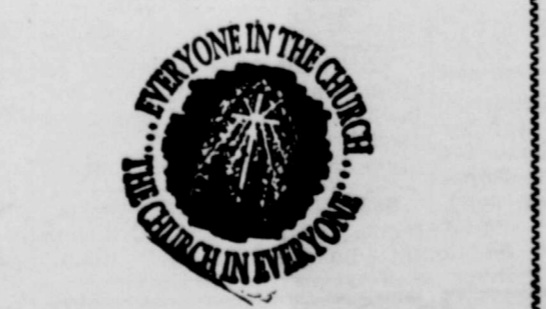
