



Babson Park, Mass., June 2vnen you buy almost any standard article - from a wrist watch to a yacht-there is an implied guarantee that the product is as represented. That is a basic fact of purchasing overseen by the Federal Trade Commission. But usually a new, or even a more costly second-hand. product brings with it a specific guarantee or warranty not only to help clinch your sale but to it if anything goes wrong.

Keep Your Guarantee And Sales Slip

Even though the liability of a company or store for any defectiveness in the goods bought most before he gets home. The certificate may kick around his thrown out with the newspapers. Or a housewife may keep her guarantee on the kitchen shelf, intending to hold onto it for the year or whatever its length of duration. But often,

So, the first thing to do when you are given a guarantee or warranty on any article is to put it-with the accompanying sales slip-in one spot specifically assigned for such papers. A manila folder in a desk drawer or on an out-of-the-way shelf is probably the safest and best place. Questions - Answers

Q-My father received a small pension from the Veterans Administration until his leath four years ago. My sister, hrough an accident that occured when she was a child, is mable to earn a living. I would ike to know if she is entitled o a pension as she has never worked and will never be able

A-The VA considers a "helpless child" as one who became permanently incapable of selfsupport prior to age 18. If this s your sister's case, you should submit medical evidence to the VA to support this claim. If the claim is upheld, she may be able to receive pension payments.

Q-If a veteran accepts a nonservice-connected disability pension while trying to prove that this disability was serviceconnected, will the VA deduct the monies that he has received from the nonservice-connected

A-The fact that a veteran accepts a nonservice-connected disability pension while trying to prove that the disability is service-connected will in no way interfere with the proceedings of his claim. If the veteran should be granted service-connection, the VA will make the adjustments to make sure the veteran receives the greater

Q-I have a relative in a Veterans Administration Hospital. When I visit him, am I permitted to bring him food?

A-If you do, be certain to stop by the nursing station and let her check to see if it violates the paptient's diet orders.

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
