Local Teenagers Rescue Diver From Stock Tank

A Fort Worth man wearing 50 pounds of scuba diving gear was rescued from eight foot of water last Saturday by three alert Burk Burnett youths.

The man, said to be Bob Short, a former resident of Iowa Park, was stricken with leg cramps while diving in a stock tank ten miles west of Burk Burnett. The mouthpiece of his diving gear was lost when he cried out for help.

Rusty Todd, age 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Todd, quickly put on swim fins and started searching for the victim. Finding him face down on the bottom of the pond, Rusty brought him to the surface where he was joined by Glen Gilbert, who aided in keeping the victim's face above the surface as they swam to shore.

The unconscious man was placed on his side and first aid was administered by Rusty, Glenn and a third boy, Bill Zimmerman who had been in a nearby tank at the time of the accident.

Glen is 16 years old, the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Gilbert. Bill, also 16, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Zimmerman.

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SOUND LOGIC



CLEAN RIVERS ATTAINABLE

There's a better way to solve the problem of river and stream water quality control than federal legislative mandate.

It can be done and is being accomplished by interstate compacts. For example, eight states in the Ohio Valley got together in 1948 and formed the Ohio River Valley Sanitation Commission when less than one per cent of sewage was being treated. Its objective was to motivate communities and industries "by persuasion where possible and by compulsion if necessary" to finance and build sewage and waste control facilities, along the 981 mile Ohio river and nineteen tributaries.

Local funds financed nine-tenths of the capital outlay for stream cleanup. On one tributary alone, the Kanawha in West Virginia, nine companies reported costs aggregating \$18 million to complete the first phase of a two-stage control program. By the end of last year 90 per cent of the industrial establishments had installed facilities that comply with the water quality requirements of ORSANCO.

On the main stem of the Ohio, treatment facilities in operation serve 99 per cent of the 3,700,000 population served by the sewer lines and those under construction will provide treatment for another 0.4 per cent. In the entire drainage district treatment facilities serve 93 per cent of the 11,400,000 sewer population — an increase of three per cent over the previous year, with additional construction in 1965 estimated to add another 1.4 per cent.

The logical way to clean up rivers is cooperation at the state, district and community level where the river flows.

One reason students cheat in school, according to an article by Nancy Bowden in the Farm Journal, is that the parents keep after the students to make good grades. This was the reason given in 62 per cent of the cheating cases students confessed to in a survey of 100 Virginia schools. Reason behind the increased pressures from parents for good grades is the desire to have their children go to college. So cheating has become big business — and a major concern in 70 per cent of the schools surveyed. Other reasons for cheating were: Pressure to conform and laziness.

Alan S. Boyd, Under Secretary of Commerce for Transportation says, "It is an ofused cliché but a truism nonetheless that transportation is the lifeline of our nation. It affects the cost of everything we buy. And it is generally agreed that the future of our nation will depend upon how well we all handle the job of integrating and coordinating the most advanced technologies into all segments of our transportation mix."

The Industrial Forestry Association notes that in the big timber country of Oregon and Washington, over 800 tree farms encompassing some 7 million acres are located west of the Cascade mountains.

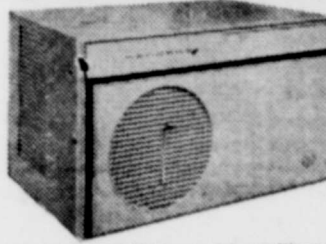

New Flower Service



A new way to send flowers to your Mom, Best Girl or just anyone you please has been introduced from coast to coast by Western Union. Called "Flowers-by-Western Union", this new inter-city service allows the sender to wire flowers on either a cash or charge basis for delivery by local florists in about 12,000 cities and towns, and their surrounding areas.

Here's how it works: The sender either goes in person to his local telegraph office or places his order by telephoning Western Union. The name and address of the recipient, a description of the floral piece, the sender's name and message and how much he wants to spend are then transmitted by wire to the telegraph office serving the destination city. There, the order is placed with a participating, qualified florist, who makes the delivery. Where several local participating florists serve an area or city, orders are rotated among them.

Senders of "Flowers-by-Western Union" pay only for the flowers plus telegraph tolls for transmitting the order.

This new, convenient service joins the growing number of Western Union special services that help make greeting and gift sending easier.

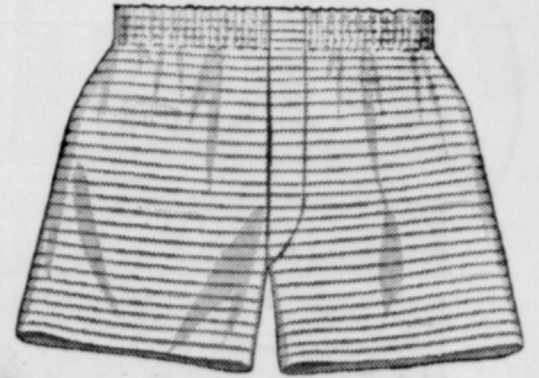

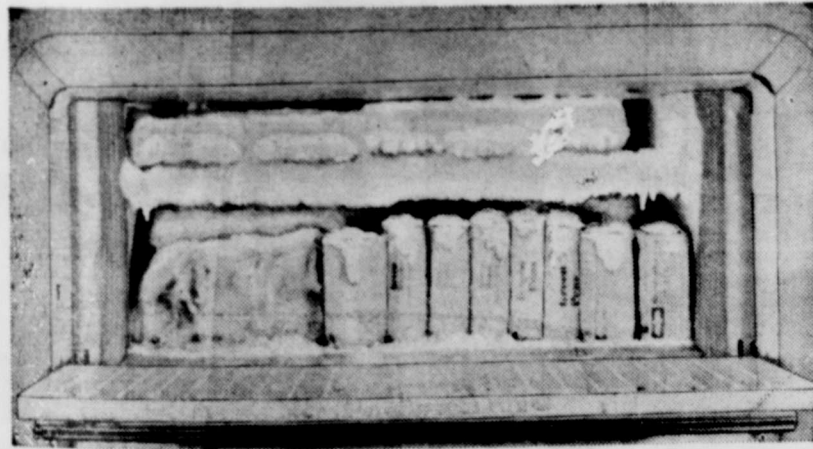

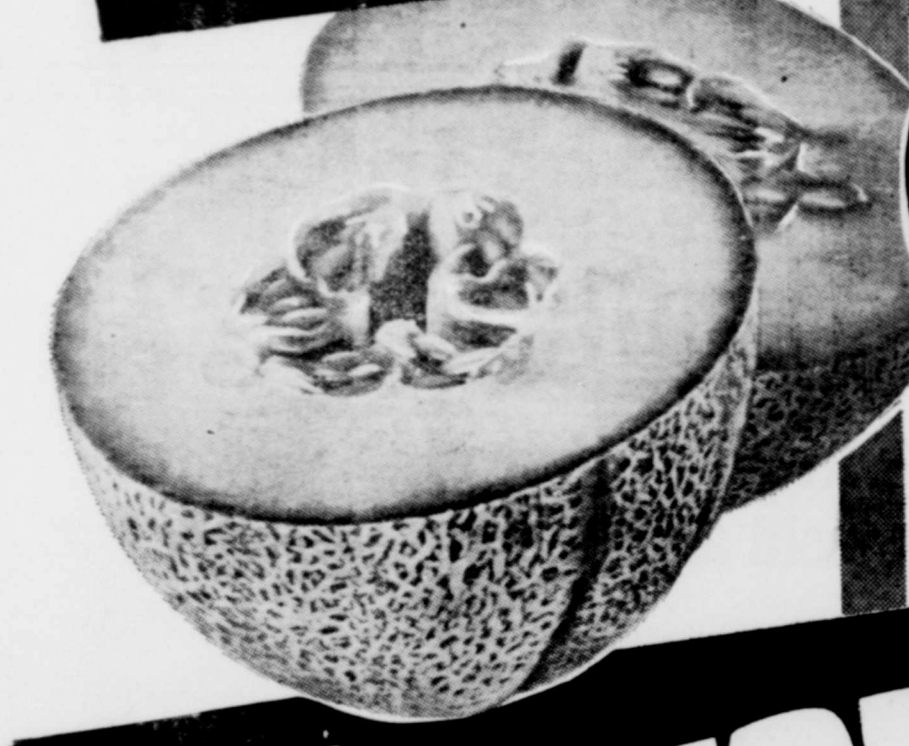

BRIGHT IDEAS

FOR SPACE SAVERS

A little imagination can transform odd nooks into practical alcoves. A decorative scalloped cornice conceals fluorescent tubes which provide light for a tiny sewing center. Lighted niches in back wall illuminate the work surface.

Turn a small room into a handsome den. Collections or trophy displays are lighted by concealed 20-watt fluorescent strips mounted on ceiling. Lamp with 100-watt bulb has oval shade to fit compactly on small built-in desk and furnish perfect study light.

Counter top for arranging flowers and tending plants encloses a small sink. Circular shelves are back-lighted by a concealed Sylvania 20-watt fluorescent tube placed vertically. A ceiling fixture gives alcove general illumination and highlights the attractive blooms.

Many Area Young People Working At Sheppard AFB This Summer

SHEPPARD AFB—One hundred twenty five young people from the Wichita Falls area will be working at Sheppard AFB this summer under the President's 1966 Youth Opportunity Campaign, according to Fred Davenport, Sheppard Air Force Base Civilian Personnel Officer.

Through the assistance of the local Texas Employment Commission office staff, who accepted applications and screened the youth for eligibility in the program, more than 60 boys and girls were placed in SAFB summer jobs this past week. The remainder of Sheppard's quota will be employed by Friday, June 10, Davenport announced.

The Campaign, through which 1,000,000 youths found jobs last summer, was set up to meet what President Johnson called "the most serious situation ever" for youth, ages 16 to 21, seeking summer employment. The program has a three-fold purpose: to give youths the opportunity (1) to work, (2) to learn good work habits and to learn about the world of work as preparation for deciding upon an occupation, and (3) to earn money. In many cases, the money they earn will determine their ability to continue their education.

Mrs. Irma Nixon and Miss Mary Carr, Civilian Personnel Project Officers for the YOC Program, reported supervisors are enthusiastic about the program. "Based on last year's program, in which 51 youths participated at SAFB, supervisors found these young people were interested, industrious, and made definite contributions to employing organizations," they observed.

Mrs. Nixon and Miss Carr explained that future work habits and attitudes toward work will be influenced by the training which the youth receive this summer. In addition to training in specific tasks, they will receive guidance in how to qualify for permanent jobs, how to develop acceptable work skills and human relationship

skills, positive attitudes toward work, appreciation of a job, and how to seek employment. The extent to which the participating supervisors and trainees work together to achieve the objectives of the program will determine whether the 1966 Campaign will provide meaningful work experiences for youth in this community.

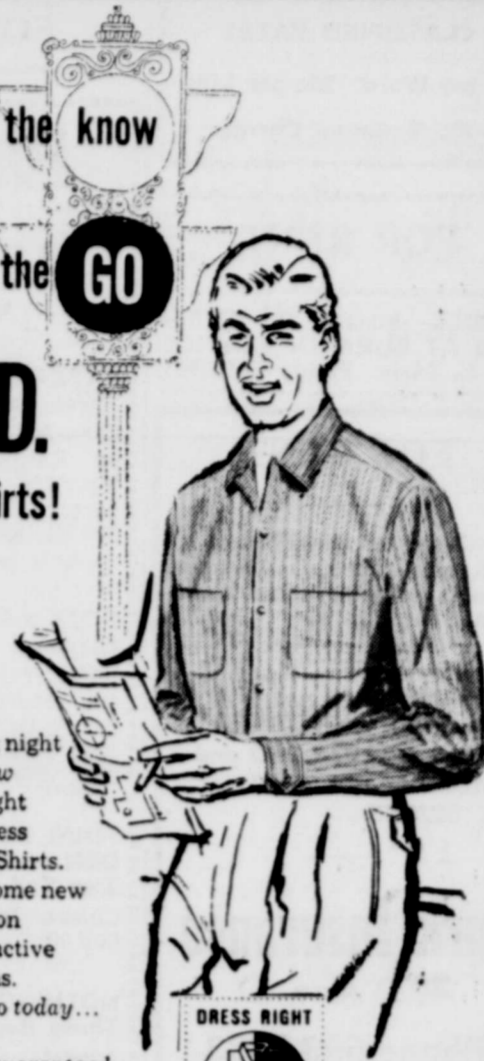
