

Americans often fail to realize the heavy demands they place on the availability of goods and services. Take for example, the future availability of a product discussed recently by Texas Governor John Connally - petroleum. " . . . During 1965," he said, "the United States A cowshed on the Kenneth Kirkalone consumed each day more petroleum than was consumed in the entire world at the close of World War II. only 20 years ago."
