While chicken livers are browning, place garlic cloves in the oil, cooking until soft, then mash with a fork into the oil. Heat together saffron, salt, chicken broth and clams with juice; pour over rice, bring to a boil. Transfer to the casse-role, stirring to blend ingredients. Place shrimp and artichole hearts over the top. Cover casserole. When guests have arrived complete cooking the paella in the oven (350° F.) for 20 to 25 minutes or until all liquid is absorbed. 

### MORE THAN LAWS NEEDED

Industralized and urbanized America has dazzled the world with its material gains. But, as a publication of a major oil company points out, the gains have often meant the loss of other things. Briefly, the Student Savings Plan operates as follows:

accounts.

These accounts are maintained separately from any other accounts the students may have at the bank.

Wednesday of each week during the school term is "Bank Day." Deposits are accepted only on Wednesday at the Schools; however, deposits can be made at the First National Bank on any day, including summer vacations.

It is reported by the 1965 Gallup Audit of Church Attendance, that church going in the U.S. A. is at its lowest ebb in ten years. In 1955, 49% of the adult population attended each week. This has declined to only 44% this past year.

Other facts revealed as result of querying 8,000 persons five times during the year are: women are found to be more likely to attend than men. Percentage of attendance was higher among those with college training than those with high school or grade school; and among those 30 years and older than among adults in their 20's.

A nation's morality is closely paralled with it's church attendance. The down trend in church attendance, and the up trend in atheism in America appear coexistent.
