Bulldogs Journey To Childress To Battle Winless Bobcats In 4-AAA Action Friday Night

The Burk Burnett Bulldogs set out on a long dangerous journey Friday, as they invade the lair of the Childress Bobcats for a 7:30 p.m. 4-AAA Conference clash.

The journey is a lone one in miles and can be dangerous, for when you corner a wounded cat, you may get clawed. These Cats have been wounded six weeks in a row, losing every game they've played, and have nothing to lose. They run off a basic wing "T" formation, with a flip-flop toward the wing man. What that amounts to is that the Bobcats try to utilize the speed of their wingback and halfback positions manned by Gary Smotherton, 160, and Joe Hardison, 145, respectively. The Bobcats are directed by a small man at quarterback, John Baker, 130, a lad who is expected to throw a lot.

"Any team who is behind a lot tries their best to develop a passing attack," Coach Bill Froman stated, "So we expect them to throw a lot."

Probable receivers for Baker's aerials will be ends Steve Wells, 155, and Mike Petty, 155, along with halfbacks Smotherton and Hardison, Larry Moore, 160, provides the Bobcats fullback punch. The three biggest men

on the line are Jack Smith, left tackle, Jim Don Rothwell, center, and Elton Shires, right tackle, all 180 pounders.

The Bulldogs have a few offensive changes from weeks past. Both starting guards, Bill Zimmerman and Jerry Harsh are out with injuries. Starting at left guard will be Butch Wood, 180, and at right guard, Lanny Walker, a tough 170 pound sophomore. Otherwise, the line is as was.

In the backfield, Jim Caddell, a rangy 180 pounder, replaces Dale Hoffman at left halfback. The Bulldog offense is paced by one of the top ten passers in AAA, in Tony Hodges. Hodges rates high in percentage and yardage. His prime receiver is rated in the top twenty in the state, being 6'5", 170 pound end John Edwards. Steve Cozby, end and halfback Bill Roe and Caddell are also good receivers.

At fullback is one of the state's leading scorers, 162 pound Rusty Todd, who has 10 touchdowns.

The defense is sparked by Larry Johnson, Caddell, Rudy Robinson, Steve Cozby, Butch Wood and Walker, who did an outstanding job in his first start last week.

All in all, it looks like a Bulldog victory—by a bunch.

Kings Travel To Tulsa To Play Leading Oilers

Burkburnett's Kings, glowing over a 27-19 victory over Odessa - Midland last week, prepare for their stiffest challenge in making the December Texas Football League playoffs.

The Kings will play the league - leading Tulsa Oilers Saturday at 8 p.m. in Tulsa. A victory would go a long way toward sending the Kings into the playoffs. A win would also ease a ruffled ego, suffered in a 24-22 loss to the Oilers three weeks ago.

Tulsa is undisputed leader with five wins and a tie. The Kings are tied for third place with Pasadena at 3-2. Sherman-Denison is 4-2, riding in second place. Dallas and Midland-Odessa are the tailenders at 1-4 and 0-6-1 respectively.

The two top teams in the final standings will play for the league title Dec. 3.

If the Kings can get by Tulsa this week they can nail down second place by beating Sherman-Denison the following week, then stopping Pasadena in the final game of the season.

Coach E. J. Webb reports his team in top condition after the final quarter win against the Comets. The club has added some new talent in recent weeks and Webb said the Kings would be better prepared for the Oilers than in their first meeting.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 17 accidents on rural highways in Wichita County during the month of September, according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

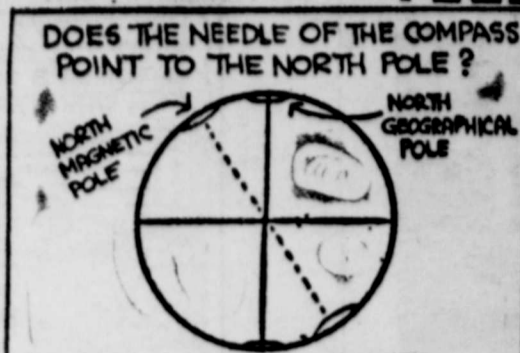
These crashes resulted in 10 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$8,925.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1966 shows a total of 127 accidents resulting in one person killed, 78 injured, and an estimated property damage of \$76,608.00.

From past experience, the month of October signals the increase of traffic accidents in Texas due to shorter days and longer nights. The increased hours of darkness will hide dangers otherwise visible during the daylight hours.

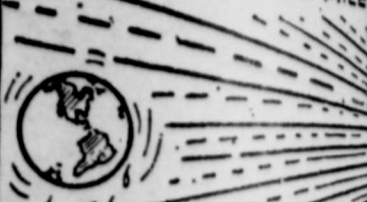
The Sergeant listed some factors why driving is more hazardous at nighttime than in daytime. (1) Reduced road visibility prevents drivers from seeing hazards. (2) It has been longer since most drivers have slept and the resulting fatigue increases perception reaction time. (3) More drinking drivers will be met. (4) It is easier for drivers to become confused in traffic and to panic. These factors in varying degrees coupled with high speed cause accidents that would not occur in daytime.

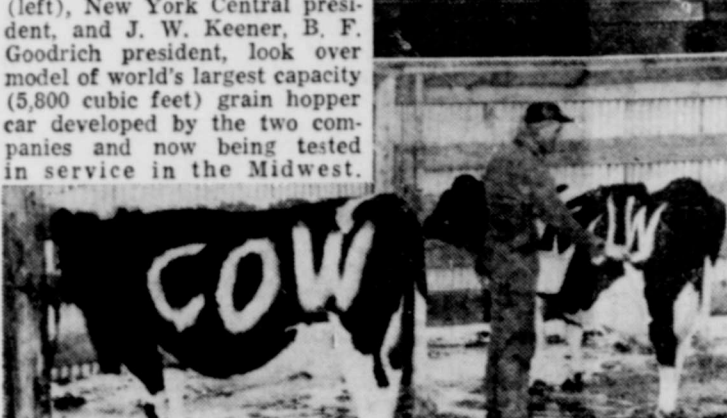
