Bulldogs Close Out '66 Season Against Breckenridge Buckaroos In 4-AAA Game Friday Night

"The Greenies are coming to town!" That statement used to strike terror in the hearts of football fans throughout Texas as they happened to be on the opposite side of the Breckenridge Buckaroos. The once-perennial powers of Class AAA, the Buckaroos, are hosted by the Burkburnett Bulldogs Friday in a 7:30 p.m. contest at Bulldog Stadium, the season finale for the locals. The green-clad visitors have fallen short of their legendary past this season, but they are a lot more capable than records indicate. They can beat a guy in almost any way imaginable. Leading the ground assault or the Bucks is one of the finest halfbacks in the conference, 180 pound Jimmy Frazier. He is well thought of in several quarters, mentioned by Bulldog Coach Bill Froman as "a real fine footballer." He is joined by fullback Tommy McCrary and halfback David Toliver, in giving the Lions a potent punch. Guiding the aerial fortunes is Ronald Bell, a boy who throws quite a bit, his prime receivers being end Ricky Pendleton and Toliver. The Buckaroos have a tough defensive club also. They led

the Vernon Lions for three quarters before a final period surge carried them under. They also lost a better game to Brownwood than score indicates, but their best game was probably their 29-7 win over Graham. Incidentally, Graham knocked off the Bulldogs, 9-7. The Buck's fullback McCrary is also a real good defensive linebacker and probably the spark-plug of that unit. The Eucks have a guard that they are proud of, in 175 pound Alford Noggle, a steady performer. The way the Bucks line up offensively is, Pendleton and Dennis Stephens at ends, Greg Webber and Dale Bridges at tackle, Terry Howell and Noggle at guards, Tom Wolfe at center, Bell at quarterback, Frazier and Toliver at halfbacks, and McCrary at fullback. The Bulldogs are coming out of a rugged game at Vernon, which saw them almost spring an upset. It was a costly game, as halfback and kicker, Dale Hoffman, received a serious knee injury and is out for the season. His kicking duties will probably be divided up between Tony Hodges, Jim Caddell, and John Edwards. The Bulldogs are without fullback Rusty Todd again, as his season also ended with a knee injury. However, Charles Hicks does a bang up job of filling in for him. Speaking of injuries, the Bulldogs got a lot of good service out of their big left tackle, Larry Johnson, at Vernon. Larry is hobbled to a degree, by a leg injury of his own. As said before, the redoubtable Hicks picked up good yardage against Vernon, scoring the only touch down and extra points of the game. Elsewhere, in the backfield we should see Tony Hodges at quarterback, Jim Caddell at left half, and Bill Roe, Lavell Renfroe, Jim there are Steve Cozby and John Edwards at ends, Larry Johnson and Rusty Hubbard at tackle, Bill Zimmerman and Jerry Harsh at guards, and Rudy Robinson at center. For 15 young men, this will be their last outing as "sons of the orange and black." Seniors suited out for the final game include: Tony Hodges, Rod Turner, Bill Roe, Lovell Renfroe, Jim Caddell, Dale Hoffman, Chuck Johnstone, Jerry Harsh, Denny Olmstead, Larry Johnson, Robert Prince, Rusty Hubbard, Marc Schroder, Ray Harrison, and Robert Hicks. *Hoffman not suited out due to injury. The Bulldogs desperately want to win this contest and finish their season like they opened it, on a win. We feel that pride, and all the good things that go with it, will pull the Bulldogs through—by two points.

Colored Citizens Meet With City Councilmen Monday; No Action Taken On Amendment Election

About a dozen citizens from the colored section of Burkburnett met with City Councilmen at Monday's regular meeting, to ask what action the City Council had taken concerning installing street lights, opening of more streets and hiring of a part-time patrolman for that section. Additional fire hydrants were requested and discussion of the location of sewer lines led to the discovery that many of these citizen's property was not located within the city limits of Burkburnett. Action on a request by Lone Star Gas Co. for a rate adjustment was tabled for study. Monthly payment to the building contractor of the Burkburnett Library was given the OK, bringing the total paid to date to \$32,968.00. A resolution of congratulation and appreciation was adopted by the commissioners on behalf of the people of Burkburnett, to S. L. Fower on his 95th birthday, for his contributions to the community. Mayor Lippard brought to the attention of the other Councilmen that no date had been set for a city charter amendment election which the Council had previously voted to call. The Council was petitioned on Sept. 8, by citizens to call an election submitting to the voters, amendments to the City Charter, which, if passed, would raise to seven the number elected to serve on the Council. The petition, signed by some 450 voters, was found to be not in proper legal wording, even though the wish of the signers was clearly stated. Plans

A DAY TO REMEMBER

"Keep the Home Fires Burning" — a poignant World War song — uplifted home front morale while the dough-boys fought to make the world free.

Some returned. Others met their final appointment with destiny at Flanders Field. And when the last blows were struck and the papers signed — Armistice Day was proclaimed by President Woodrow Wilson.

The day not only honors the war dead, but also reminds us of the horrors of war. Yet, even the name of the "war to end wars" had to be changed. It became World War I to differentiate it from World War II.

The day was changed to Veterans' Day in order that a grateful nation could pay its respects to veterans of all wars. A national holiday was proclaimed.

Another November 11th approaches. On that morning some people may pause between 11:00 — 11:02 to pay respects to the men and women who paid the supreme sacrifice to keep America free. Others may just forget.

So, let us pause a few seconds to review what President Wilson said in his first Armistice Day proclamations: "To us in America the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations."

Daily Brain Twisters

Just reading the headlines in the newspapers for one week is enough to make a Solomon throw up his hands. Each day you are faced with headlines about a major war in Viet Nam. You may have a son in it, and you don't know what to think.

Next comes inflation. Different interests blame the other fellow for rising costs. Financial authorities state, it is essential to restrict easy money policies. Then, we read that the country needs two million new housing units every year and is only getting 1.5 million and that high interest rates are retarding building.

Next, the individual is urged to restrict his spending to cool down the economy, while full employment is urged to provide jobs. And to top the confusion, it is generally forecast that taxes on individuals and industry must be raised to bail out the official spenders. As a private citizen and taxpayer, you help foot all the bills.

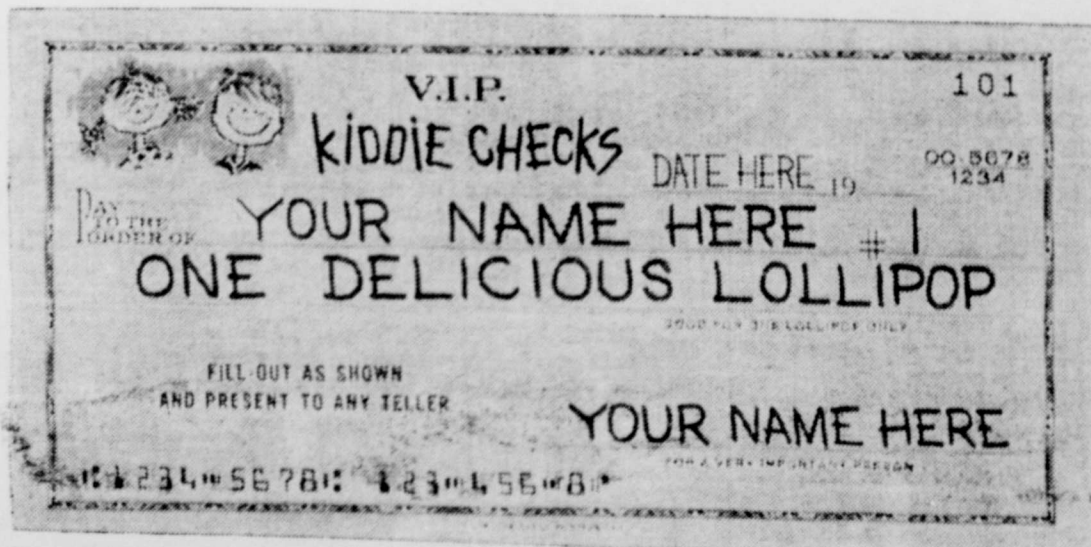
