Bulldog Basketballers Sweep First Homestand, Rock Three Opponents

The Burk Burnett Bulldog cagers opened their 1966-67 basketball campaign on the right foot, sweeping a three game homestand that began Tuesday, Nov. 22 with Olney and included wins over Jacksboro and Temple, Oklahoma, Nov. 26 and 29, respectively.

The latest win was a 61-22 triumph over the Temple Tigers, kingpins of Oklahoma's Rebel Conference, and was sparked by hot shooting and tough defensive work.

Jimmy Owen was hotter than the proverbial firecracker, as he split the twins for a cool 26 points, all from the field. Tall John Edwards joined him in the double figures column, with 13 points.

The Tigers were a game bunch, fine ball handlers, but were outgunned and outmaneuvered. They could not overcome the Bulldogs' height which controlled the boards. David Eruer, John Edwards and Steve Cozby garnered most of the first half rebounds, with Larry Johnson and Larry Bankhead clearing the boards in the later stages. The Tiger's Willie Kidd managed six points for his team's high point honors. The Tigers only scored a total of four points the whole last half.

Saturday, Nov. 26, saw the Bulldogs sock the Jacksboro Tigers, 36-20, in a relatively low scoring affair. In fact the Bulldogs had but 25 points entering the last quarter, while Jacksboro had only 10.

Once again Jimmy Owen had high point honors with 11. Tough defensive work held the usually hot shooting Tigers in check, allowing the win.

The preceding Tuesday, Nov. 21, the Bulldogs opened their season with a 56-36 whipping of the Olney Cubs, an old rival of the Bulldogs.

Owen was the high scorer, popping the net for 15 counters. Coach Stan Owen got good service from all of his boys in this first outing.

The Junior Varsity also swept the series, dropping Olney, 57-35, Jacksboro, 54-22 and Temple, 61-23.

Thursday night, Dec. 1, the Bulldogs are engaged in the first round of Pampa's Top O' Texas Tournament, as they take on Elk City, Oklahoma in a 7:30 p.m. encounter. Should they annex this win, they will meet the winner of the Pampa-Dumas game in Friday's action.

Following the weekend tournament, they journey to Lawton on Tuesday, Dec. 6, to challenge the high flying Eisenhower Eagles. Then on Thursday, Dec. 8, they return home to host the annual Burk Burnett Invitational Basketball Tournament. Brackets have not yet been drawn up for the three day affair, but probably will be in the next few days.

The Bulldogs are off to a good start and are certainly respected by other members of 4-AAA. However, it will be Dec. 20 before they open conference play by hosting Breckenridge. There will be a lot of good action in the meantime though, so we urge you to go out and support these young men.

Nuclear Science Symposium To Be Held Saturday

Science students from Burk Burnett High School will attend a nuclear science symposium for high school science students from an eight-county area of North Central Texas to be held Saturday, Dec. 3, on the campus of Midwestern University at Wichita Falls, it was announced Wednesday by Joe Salter, manager of exas Electric Service Company.

The symposium is being sponsored by Texas Electric Service and Midwestern University, and is expected to draw some 300 top ranking science students and 150 teachers from 27 high schools in the area.

Students attending from Burk Burnett will be John Strayhorn, Scott Taras, Charles Pitman and Don Sunderland. They will be accompanied by their instructor, Mr. Kent Reppond.

The program has been arranged by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, a research organization made up of 10 investor-owned electric utility companies in Texas, one of which is Texas Electric Service. The Foundation is engaged in a research program with General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation aimed at controlling the nuclear fusion for the generation of electric power. The Foundation also is sponsoring research in nuclear fusion at the University of Texas and Texas A&M University.

An outstanding nuclear scientist from General Atomic will appear on the program. He is Dr. F. Robert Scott, of the John Jay Hopkins laboratory of General Atomic. He is physicist in charge of plasma projection devices in the world's first and largest privately financed controlled fusion (thermonuclear) research program sponsored jointly by General Atomic and the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

The Symposium will be held in the new science building at Midwestern which has made its facilities, including closed circuit television, available for the day-long session.

Speakers in addition to Dr. Scott will include Dr. Travis White, president of Midwestern, who will deliver an address of welcome; and H. R. Drew of Fort Worth, executive vice president of the foundation who will discuss the atom and electric power.

HOW LONG IS A MINUTE?

Yes, how long is a minute — when you are waiting for the school bus to load its passengers — or to discharge them.

How long is a minute — when you are asked to stop by a youngster on school traffic control to let pupils cross at cross-walk.

A NEW KIND OF FARMING

A press release tells of a machine that places a thin layer of asphalt underground to prevent water from being lost in sandy soil before it can nourish crops. It was developed by soil scientists from Michigan State University and the American Oil Company and consists of a wedge shaped sweep on the end of a boom attached to the rear of a crawler tractor. As the 34-inch sweep is hauled along two feet below the surface, nozzles attached to the bottom of the sweep spray an emulsion of asphalt into the cavity made by its passage. The asphalt hardens instantly into a layer about one eighth of an inch thick, and the soil falls back onto the layer with a minimum disturbance of earth.

Use of this underground barrier will permit cultivation of millions of acres of land not now suitable to agriculture because it is too porous to hold the water it receives. Controlled experiments have resulted in significant increases in crop yields. An official of the Michigan State University's department of soil science says that under present economic conditions high profit truck crops such as tomatoes, cucumbers, cabbage, beans, potatoes, strawberries and similar produce could benefit best from the use of the asphalt barrier. The barrier costs about \$225 an acre to lay, and present indications are that it will last for at least 15 years, although some of the scientists working on the projects see no reason why it cannot last indefinitely.

Once again, industry and science have joined hands to help lick the toughest problems facing mankind — an adequate food supply.

Farmers Urged To Get Facts On Cotton Election

If you are a cotton producer, it will pay you to get the facts on the Cotton Research and Promotion order before you cast your vote in the forthcoming cotton check-off referendum, according to Carl Moeller, chairman Cotton Committee, Wichita County Farm Bureau.

"First, you should know that the current check-off proposal is vastly different from the original proposal discussed in 1965," Moeller said. "The program you are asked to vote on gives the Secretary of Agriculture complete power to decide how your research and promotion dollar is spent."

Moeller pointed out that all plans devoted under the law are subject to the approval of the Secretary of Agriculture. He can veto any plan for research and promotion by withholding his approval, Moeller added.

As a matter of fact, the Secretary is given complete budgetary control over funds collected from producers, the local farm leader asserted.

One section of the law, in effect, gives the Secretary absolute power to censor any advertising or promotional material that may be developed for cotton under the program.

The law as signed by the President says the Cotton Board authorized by the Act shall be selected from nominations submitted by eligible cotton producer groups, except that the Secretary of Agriculture may select board members from nominations made by producers in such manner as he may authorize if he "Determines that a substantial number of producers are not members of or their interests are not represented by any such eligible producer organization."

Members apparently could be replaced by the Secretary at any time.

"Cotton producers are asked by proponents to vote on a plan which requires them to foot the bill for research, advertising and promotion without requiring any contributions from the mills or other industry groups," Moeller said.

All groups would benefit from a successful program," the local farm leader reminded. "However, the mills would have 'first chance' at any benefits that may come from increased consumer demand for cotton."

"Everyone agrees that more research and promotion is needed for cotton, Moeller said. The real issue is whether we use the power of the federal government to collect funds from producers, he added.

"The best alternative is a voluntary program controlled by the people who pay the bill," Moeller said. "The machinery for such a program is available in the National Cotton Council and the Cotton Producers Institute."

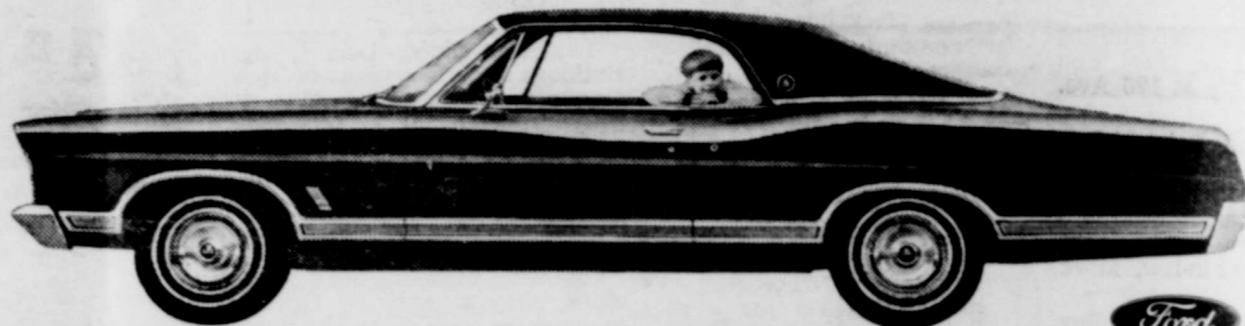

Christmas Postage Stamp Is Replica Masterpiece

A white envelope bearing the Christmas postage stamp is a masterpiece, Postmaster T. Zimmerman said today.

The special holiday stamp is a replica of a painting by Hans Memling, Flemish master of the Renaissance Era, now hanging in the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D. C.

The stamp, which is now on display at the Burkburnett post office, was designed from the central portion of Memling's oil painting of the Madonna and Child with Angels, which was painted on wood about 1480.

The Postmaster noted that the design of the stamp for the sending of greeting cards assures safe handling. That means cards will be forwarded if addressee has moved or will not be returned if there is a return address.

This is the fifth in a series of holiday stamps and the Postal Service expects it to be another big seller. The initial print order was for one billion, two hundred million stamps.

The Postmaster estimated that 100,000 of the stamps will be sold locally.

The stamp design was unanimously recommended by Postmaster General Lawrence F. Egan by the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee which passes on all stamps.

Big Debate at the Berlin Zoo



With some 12,600 specimens of 2,200 different species, the West Berlin Zoo, home for the two argumentative beasts in the picture above, is the biggest in Europe and ranks second only to the zoo in San Diego, Calif. Its Aquarium collection of 9,500 tropical fish, amphibians, reptiles and invertebrates from 1,320 species is the largest in the world. The zoo's Aviary resembles a tropical forest where only the instinct of the free-flying birds keeps them apart from the visitors.

Also free of iron bars are the separated open areas where the beasts of prey include lions, tigers, pumas and jaguars as well as the rare Persian and Clouded leopards of South East Asia that are now threatened with extinction.

The Berlin Zoo has successfully bred many species now fast vanishing from their natural habitat, thus helping to prevent their disappearance. Among them: the first orangutan ever raised in captivity; the three-toed Great Bustards; lemurs from New Caledonia; the first North American White Pelican bred in Europe; and the first Spectacled Bears of the Peruvian Andes to be reared in Germany. The rare Snow Owls in the Zoo's collection of birds of prey have raised several young each year since 1962. Also bred in Berlin are the scarce owl-faced Hamlyn's monkeys from the Congo and the black-and-white Guereza monkeys. Similarly thriving are the Zoo's East Indian Gaur oxen and the wild Banteng oxen from Java. The Berlin Zoo was founded in 1841.

Postmaster Urges Residents To Mail Christmas Packages Early; Offers Tips

Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman reminded Burk Burnett residents today that there are only 24 mailing days left before Christmas.

"While that may seem like a long time to most people, it is frighteningly short to those of us in the Postal Service," he said. "Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien has predicted that well over eight billion pieces of mail must be delivered between now and Christmas Eve, a new record."

"We are asking everyone to start thinking about their Christmas shopping and mailing now. If all the holiday mail were to hit the postal system at one time, it is obvious that we'd have difficulty delivering every piece on time."

The Burk Burnett post office expects to handle over 250,000 pieces of mail during the holiday rush the Postmaster said.

Mailing early and spreading the mail flow out along the entire pre-Christmas season is the key to better mail service at this time of the year.

Last year the public cooperation was "tremendous," according to Mr. Zimmerman. Virtually every piece of holiday mail was delivered before Christmas Day. This year with the volume because of the ing str...

—Be sure to have enough boxes, tape, string, and wrapping paper on hand.

—Wrap your packages well. Include sufficient padding. Remember, that your parcel may be shipped in a mail sack with a set of the encyclopedia riding on top.

—Include a card or piece of paper inside the package with your name and address and that of the person you are sending the parcel to in case the wrapping should be loose and come off. That way, you can be assured your gift will not wind up in the dead parcel office. Also, insert a list of the package's contents.

—Address your gifts and greetings clearly so that postal workers will have no difficulty in reading the destination. Use first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded if the recipient is moved. Cards that are erable will be on the envelope. Department special stamps you

Postal Savings Program Obsolete; Depositors Should Close Accounts

United States Postal Savings certificates totaling \$49,000, which are on deposit at the Burkburnett Post Office, are now earning little or no interest for five local depositors, Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman revealed today.

Nationwide, the Post Office Department is holding more than \$147 million in the now obsolete program which was discontinued by the Congress on March 28, 1966.

As of April 27, 1966, Postal Savings were discontinued, and no deposits were accepted by the Post Office Department. Certificates whose anniversary dates have been reached since last April 26 have earned their final interest payment. Those whose anniversary dates fall between now and next April 26 will receive interest until their next anniversary dates, but they can be cashed at any time and a proportionate amount of interest will be paid. After April 26, 1967, no interest will be earned by any Postal Savings accounts, Postmaster Zimmerman said. The Postmaster suggests that

all Postal Savings depositors close out their accounts as soon as convenient so they can put their funds to more productive use. He also reminded depositors that U. S. Savings Bonds paying a current rate of 4.15% interest, if held to maturity, are an excellent investment for both safety and income.

On July 1 of next year, remaining funds in the program will be turned over to the Treasury Department. There they will be deposited in a trust fund, where they will remain available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received.

FARM BUREAU NEWS

The Cotton Committee of the Wichita County Farm Bureau will be responsible for educational activities on the cotton check-off proposal to be voted on the forthcoming referendum, according to J. W. Tole, president of the local County Farm Bureau.

Carl Moeller of Electra is chairman of the Cotton Committee.

Tole stressed that it is important for every producer to understand the provisions of the cotton proposal before voting.

"Everyone agrees on the need for research and promotion in cotton," Tole said. "The only issue is whether to use the power of the federal government to collect funds from producers for a research and promotion program over which the producers have no control."

The local farm leader said the proposal under consideration would give the Secretary of Agriculture:

(1) Complete veto power over any and all plans developed under the program.

(2) Complete control over the budget. Thus, the \$1.00 a bale would be under his total jurisdiction.

(3) Complete authority to select the cooperating group that would carry out research and promotion projects.

(5) Authority to censor advertising that might be developed to promote cotton.

Tole reminded that there are other factors that should be considered by producers before voting.

—Only cotton producers are being asked to contribute to the research and promotion fund although cotton mills would have the "first chance" at any fringe benefits that might come from increased consumer buying.

—A check-off program for cotton would set a dangerous precedent for other commodities. Several other commodity groups are already asking Congress for such a program. An extreme result would be that a diversified farmer would be forced to pay into a government-collected and controlled fund to promote all his commodities —Some in competition with each other.

—Agricultural research is the proper role of government. It would not be fair to expect the producer to shoulder this burden since experience has proven that it is the consumer and not the farmer who benefits mostly from increased farm productivity.

Tole suggested that the best alternative to a government-controlled research and promotion program for cotton would be a voluntary program controlled by the producer who pays the bill. He added that machinery for such a program is already available in the National Cotton Council and the Cotton Producers Institute.

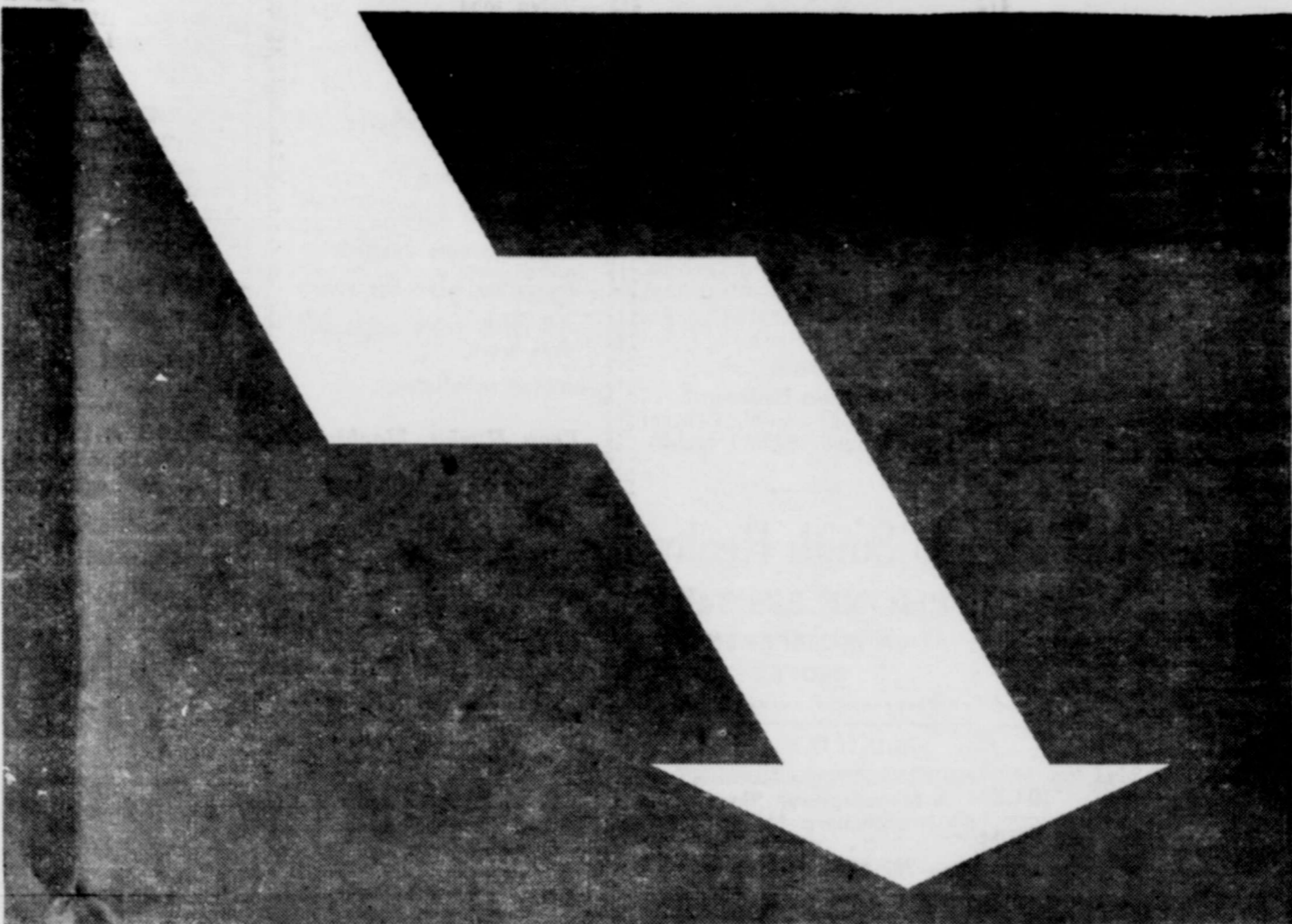

Southwestern Bell announces \$6 million rate reduction for Texas Telephone customers

Second Voluntary Reduction For Texans in Two Years

At a time when prices for most goods and services are continuing their upward spiral, Southwestern Bell has announced a voluntary reduction in rates that will result in annual savings of \$6 million for Texas telephone users.

Included in the reduction are both Long Distance rates and a series of miscellaneous telephone charges.

Lower Rates on Long Distance Calls Between Cities in Texas

Reductions in intrastate (calls within Texas) Long Distance rates become effective January 1, 1967.

With the reduction, most station-to-station calls over 56 miles in distance will have lower rates, varying from 5 to 15 cents for three minutes, depending on the distance. Reductions are even greater for calls over three minutes.

In addition, all intrastate station-to-station calls which are made after 8 p.m. and all-day Sunday will get the lowest night rate—a maximum charge of 80 cents, plus tax, for three minutes. At present only station-to-station calls which are prepaid (charged to the number placing the call) and credit card calls get this low rate.

This is the 10th reduction in Long Distance rates for Texas telephone users since the end of World War II.

One-Time Color Charge, Other Rates to be reduced

Texans will also enjoy savings on other telephone services.

These include the one-time charge for telephones in color (from \$7.50 to \$5). This is also the second reduction in the color charge in the past two years.

The original color charge was reduced from \$10 to \$7.50 on April 1, 1965.

And a new Residence Service Charge will benefit most residence customers who will be arranging for new service and additional service requiring installation. At present, there is a Service Connection Charge on each item of equipment installed. The new flat-rate, one-time Residence Service Charge will enable residence customers to have two or more telephones installed for the price of one.

There will also be a reduction in the monthly rate for amplifier telephones (presently ranging from \$1.25 to \$2). The new charge will be \$1. Amplifier telephones are primarily used by persons with hearing impediments and at noisy locations.

Customer Cooperation Helps Reduce Long Distance Rates

Technological developments continue to play an important part in keeping the cost of telephone service at a reasonable level. But much of the credit for making possible the reductions in Long Distance rates goes to Texas telephone users.

Without the cooperation of our customers in placing their calls by number, using Area Codes, and the taking advantage of Direct Dialing where it is available, it would not have been possible to achieve the operating economies that have made possible these reductions.
