An excellent illustration of how local and national affairs can often be two sides of the same coin has come to light in Iowa. There a local power company has filed a complaint with state regulatory authorities against the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation for offering to provide electric service to four Iowa communities already being served by the investor owned company. The complaint is based on the Code of Iowa, which states: "No public utility shall construct or extend facilities or furnish electric service to the point of delivery to any consumer already receiving electric service from another public utility.

The local company has served the four communities in question for over 40 years. No complaints have been received from any of the four towns concerning rates or service. Electric capacity is presently and always has been adequate. The company is fully regulated by the Iowa Commerce Commission and the Federal Power Commission. If the federal government agency takes over the customers of this private company in these four communis, the company's facilities will be rendered useless, since the federal government would be duplicating exist-

With the arrival of cold weather, proper feeding of cows and calves takes on importance points out county agent B. T.

The production efficiency and comfort of a mature cow is not reduced by cold weather, provided she is full of forage, has a dry coat and is exposed to still dry air.

The temperature at a given level of feed intake where no additional feed is necessary to maintain body temperature is called the critical temperature. It is slightly above the temper-ature at which cattle begin to shiver.

A cow on a fasting diet or without any feed will reach the critical temperature at about 55 degrees Fahrenheit. A maintenance ration will lower the critical temperature to about 23






Auto Mechanics Class In Field Trip

The students of the Auto-mechanics classes, with their Instructor, Mr. Pace enjoyed a field trip to the General Motors Assembly Plant at Arlington, Texas. The students were guided through the vast assembly plant by Mr. Melvin Kiehn, Representative Manufacturing for the General Motors Corporation. The students saw, first hand ,the method and the process that the basic automobile goes through as it is assembled. The automobile starts out with only the frame, which is palced on the assembly conveyor belt, then each unit is added to the frame until all the power train and the brake lines are installed at the proper location on the frame. Then the frame is inverted and the other items that are needed are added as the frame proceeds down the assembly conveyor belt. Finally the body is installed with the other sheet metal comprising the front end of the automobile. After being serviced with gasoline, oil, water and freon for the air conditioner, the car is started and is able to move under its own power to the other stations on the assembly line. The entire vehicle is moved to a water spray booth where it is checked for water leaks. The students were also guided through the paint spray ing department. This Department was very neat and exceptionally clean, which is necessary for a good paint job. The students left at 6:00 a.m. and arrived at the Assembly Plant Sponsored by the local High at 9:00 a.m. We arrived home at 4:30 p.m., a tired and weary

Nor is it necessary to be poor to qualify for government anti-poverty handouts. "Human Events," the Washington tabreveals Beverly Hills, California, one of the country's most prosperous suburbs was recently granted \$82,875 in antipoverty funds because it was reported 435 poor families lived in the area. However, L. A. Times columnist Paul Coates claims he was only able to locate one man in dire straits-he was 2 months in arrears in his Playboy Club dues.

\$47,754 was allocated to Orinda, Calif., an area whose citi-zens average \$13,000 annual income. No actual poverty was found in Orinda so the money was spent for a city remedial reading program. To facilitate distribution of government welfare, the anti-poverty people are planning to establish "supermarket" organizations where full social services would be available under one roof: Unemployment compensation, Social Security, Vocational training. Family and child guidance, Medical and psychiatric services, and consumer advice. The sky's the limit on costs in this "market" since the taxpayer is






