Early Days Are Recalled At Old Timers Annual Christmas Party

History of Burkburnett from the early days to boom days was presented in the faces of the old timers gathered around the Christmas tree in Burkburnett last night for the annual old-timers party.

When the site was historic, as the town hall was originally built on the municipal light plant site donated to the town by J. G. Hardin.

Among those attending the party were Mrs. I. E. Hardin, whose husband was the first mayor and business associate of Hardin. In addition to the old timers, Hardin's philanthropic gifts to Burkburnett schools and churches, and his generosity lives on in annual grants which enable many parents to complete their college education.

Greeting guests at the door was Al Lohofener, former postmaster, who was among the members of the graduating class of Burkburnett High School in 1914.

The program began with a pianist, Miss Blanche Butler, who has given many hours to similar events in the 37 years she has been teaching music in Burkburnett.

Although he never actually lived in a dugout, B. O. Willis probably can lay claim to being the oldest native of Burkburnett, having been born in the family homestead on the banks of the Red River in 1897. His parents moved to Texas from Illinois in 1890 and had pretty well tamed their little frontier farm by the time he was born.

When two oil men got together over a cup of coffee, as Wilson and Ping Lundberg did Friday night, talk turns to the boom. Both men came to Burkburnett in 1920, at the height of the oil fever, and both have seen the oil rigs which once dominated the landscape gradually vanish.

To R. H. Henry, the boom days were when the retail merchant did not sweep the dirt out of his store aisles. He literally shoveled it out, so deep was the mud in the streets and so eager the customers to spend their money.

After the boom days came depression days. Will Teal and Hugh Preston, Sr., once friendly competitors in the home dairies, can remember the end of the boom in the '30s, when milk sold for 6 cents for two quarts and the farmer felt lucky to get 25 cents a bushel for wheat and 15 cents for oats, and customers left their milk bills.

Burkburnett has grown and diminished more than once since it was founded in 1906. Looking through its history, like lights on the Christmas tree, are people who have outlasted the feasts and the famines and have remained to add the strength of their many years to the community.

Tax Collections Are Reported To School Board

Collection of \$79,460 in current and delinquent taxes was reported to the Burkburnett school board at its regular meeting Monday night. This amount leaves a balance due of \$116,372, according to Dow Estes, tax assessor-collector.

The board voted to approve the expense of sending the high school student council sponsor and one student to the National Convention of Student Councils in Pennsylvania in June. The Burkburnett representatives will head a discussion group at the national meeting.

The board placed the investigation of the possible expansion of Southside Elementary School building on its agenda for Jan. 9.

ZIP Codes Add Zip To Your Christmas Mail

ZIP Code will help put ZIP in your Christmas mail.

This year, more than ever before, the use of ZIP Code is essential to efficient delivery of the more than eight billion pieces of holiday mail that will be handled by the Postal Service just before Christmas.

Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman today urged all residents of Burkburnett to make a concerted effort to include the five digit number in both the address and return address.

ZIP Code helps cut down the number of times a piece of mail must be sorted before reaching its final destination. This saves time in delivery and cuts down the cost of moving the mail.

"We expect a record-breaking mail volume this Christmas and will need all the help we can get," the Postmaster said.

"There are three easy ways in which you can cooperate with the Postal Service and at the same time assure that you get on-time delivery for your holiday gifts and greetings. You should shop early, mail early and use ZIP Codes."

ZIP Codes for addresses you use most often can be obtained from the ZIP Code directory in the post office lobby.

"Probably the easiest method of getting the ZIP Codes you need is to check the return address on the mail you receive from your correspondents. In most cases the proper ZIP Code has been included. Then you should transcribe the codes into your address book." Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman said.

"Remember, mail moves the country—ZIP Code moves the mail."

Helicopter Field To Be Built Near Iowa Park

Sheppard AFB—Air Training Command has approved a contract for building an auxiliary helicopter landing site three miles northeast of Iowa Park, the Sheppard Technical Training Center procurement office announced this week.

The contract was awarded to George B. Cox of Wichita Falls, low bidder in the amount of \$142,611. Included in the site will be 17 helicopter landing pads, 100 ft. square, made of concrete and asphaltic concrete.

This will be the third such site to be built for use by Sheppard's 3630th Flying Wing in the helicopter undergraduate pilot training program. The other two are located at Grandfield and Frederick, Okla.

Work on the site began Tuesday, Dec. 6, and is scheduled for completion by April 4, 1967. The project will be completed in two stages.

Stage one, to be completed by Feb. 3, 1967, consists of constructing a boundary fence around the auxiliary site, constructing a runway supervisory unit site with temporary power hook-up, and constructing eight helicopter landing pads.

Stage two is to be completed by April 4, 1967. It consists of constructing the remaining nine landing pads, building a fire station, and a road.

Bulldogs Defeat Childress, 42-41, To Take Third Place In Tourney

The Burkburnett Bulldogs defeated the Childress Bobcats, 42-41, Saturday night in a thrill-packed game for third place honors in the annual Burkburnett Invitational Basketball Tournament, highlighting the final night of three of the area's finest basketball action. The Wichita Falls Coyotes were tourney champs, downing Rider, 49-48.

The Bulldogs' victory was an ironic example of history repeating itself. With three seconds to play, the Bobcats had taken a 41-40 lead on two free throws by Ike Hughes. Taking the ball to the head of the circle, Jimmy Owen launched one of those "I hope it does" shots and split the twines with the winning shot, making it 42-41. Exactly one week earlier, in tournament action at Pampa, the selfsame teams met for the consolation finals, finding Childress ahead 51-50 with three seconds remaining. It was the same Jimmy Owen who pumped in the winning bucket to pace a 52-51 Bulldog win. Another interesting note was added by the recollections of a longtime Bulldog follower. It seems that not too many years ago, Burkburnett and Childress met in a basketball game which went down to the wire, the final and winning shot of the game being pumped in by a young fellow by the name of Owen. That man, Stanley Owen, is now the head coach of the Bulldog basketball team. So, you see, history does repeat itself.

David Breuer was the high point man for the night with 11, while Owen garnered 8.

The Bulldogs were bumped into the third place contest by the red hot Rider Raiders, 52-35, experiencing a cold second half. David Breuer did manage 14 points for high honors for the Bulldogs.

In the first night's action, the Bulldogs could not get unhitched and just barely pulled out a 46-44 win over a far inferior Vernon Lion team. Breuer led things with 13 points.

All of the favorites, with the exception of the Bulldogs, fell in the first round of play. Top seeded Lawton was the victim of a 52-51 Coyote upset, while second-seeded Duncan was ambushed by Rider, 50-49. Childress also joined the uprising, shooting down the lanky Eisenhower Eagles, 51-45.

Friday night saw Lawton edging the Eagles, 50-49, Duncan stampeding past Vernon, 62-23, the Coyotes beating Childress, 52-47, and the Bulldogs loss to Rider.

Saturday, Eisenhower smashed Vernon, 82-30, Duncan socked Lawton, 54-32, for consolation, the Bulldogs won third from Childress, and the Coyotes beat Rider, 49-48, in the final seconds.

Meanwhile, the undefeated Junior Varsity, looking for some tough games, entered the Nocona Indians tournament, defeating three varsity outfits in a row to take the championship. They rocked Notre Dame, 56-37, Nocona, 57-55, and Archer City, 37-34. Jim Fleggar was high point man all three nights with 24, 28 and 15 points, and

was named to the All-Tournament team.

Thursday and Saturday, the Junior Varsity hosts a B-team Tournament in Bulldog Field house. There will be a lot of good action in this one, also, so go out and see the games if possible.

There will be no tournament games Friday, as the Varsity and Junior Varsity travel to Anadarko, Oklahoma. At present, results had not been received on the Olney ball game played Tuesday in Olney.

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WHERE WILL IT STOP?

A new grocery store has opened in Brooklyn. In itself that would not be news, but this is a different kind of grocery store. It has been sponsored by the U. S. Office of Economic Opportunity and represents the opening of a new front in the poverty war. The grocery store in question is a nonprofit cooperative, which will use antipoverty funds to enter into competition with private enterprise.

According to Barron's, the National Business and Financial Weekly, government poverty funds are being used as the starting point for what amounts to a whole new retail distribution system — a system which will be patterned after the cooperative outlet that has just opened in Brooklyn. In the words of Barron's, "All will use federal antipoverty funds to set up shop in competition with private enterprise. . . . Already on OEO's payroll are some 20,000 'aides,' operating out of 1,000 Community Action Centers. They are spreading the co-op gospel door-to-door, even as they begin to form the actual units."

These federally sponsored cooperatives will not be confined to grocery stores. They will spread into all manner of goods and services. They will confront the tax-paying retail distributors with subsidized government competition on a scale that could well undermine the mass distribution system that, as a partner to mass production, has done so much to raise the American standard of living to its present eminence.

Government entering business on this broad new front poses a threat to the basic principle of private property rights that could be revolutionary. The head of a national independent business organization expressed the deep concern of many when he wrote the director of the War on Poverty and asked, "how far do you intend to go in using the fruits of free enterprise to promote socialistic concepts?" On the answer to that question may depend the future of the American economic system as we have known it — a system in which the taxpaying, private enterpriser has been the main source of support for government.

WHEN THE SPIRIT DIES

Historians tell of a great Indian Chief who resided with his tribe in the Wallowa mountains in northeast Oregon. He was leader of the Nez Perce Indians and was known as Chief Joseph. As the white man moved into his beloved land, he resisted their encroachment with a skill and a stubbornness born of desperation that gained him the admiration of friend and foe alike. He was finally placed on a reservation where he died in 1904.

Of late, there has been some question whether he actually died in 1904 or at some later date. To one historian, the question is irrelevant because Chief Joseph, "From the time he was incarcerated . . . and not permitted to return to Wallowa after the defeat of the Nez Perces by the U. S. Army . . . he was just existing, his spirit had gone. The great men we tell of in history had died." In short, when Chief Joseph was deprived of his freedom, he no longer desired to live.

The artificial security of the reservation, where he was guaranteed three meals a day, was no substitute for freedom. Is there not a lesson in the story of Chief Joseph for all of us? We place a high value on material security — so high that we are permitting ourselves to be enmeshed in an intricate web of restrictions, taxes and welfare programs that one day may make us all inmates of a vast reservation. Can our spirit accept incarceration any more than that of the Indian Chief, who could not live without freedom?

Congressman Wendell Wyatt of Oregon says, "Inflation is creating new classes of poor faster than any poverty program can help them." He also contends, "An increase in taxes . . . will not cure our problem unless accompanied by a decrease in spending."

According to a forecast made by the Edison Electric Institute, by 1970, the nation's investor-owned electric utility companies expect to almost double their power-producing capabilities of 1960.

Michigan Governor George Romney warns, "Both free collective bargaining and price competition in the marketplace are dying in our major primary industries and are being replaced by the arbitrary exercise of presidential power. Government policies on wage negotiations now favor big union demands excessively. Industry takes it in the neck while government permits inflationary wage settlements, then climbs down industry's throat when compensatory price action are taken."

Combine butter, evaporated milk, sugar and salt in saucepan over medium heat. Bring to a boil. Cook 5 minutes, stirring constantly. (Start timing when mixture starts to "bubble" around edges of pan.) Remove from heat. Stir in marshmallows, chocolate pieces, orange peel and vanilla. Stir vigorously 1 minute (until marshmallows melt and blend.) Stir in coconut and raisins. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto a buttered cookie sheet. Cool.

bracts and the dark green foliage can provide attractive colors for your Christmas decor throughout the holiday season. In order to get full benefit from the poinsettia plant, there are several requirements which must be fulfilled, says Everett Janie, Extension landscape horticulturist at Texas A&M University.

The poinsettia will do best when placed in a sunny location and protected from sudden temperature changes frequently caused by drafts, heat vents, or opening doors. Night temperature should not drop below 60 degrees F.

Proper watering techniques can do much to prolong the life of the poinsettia. Due to the low humidity in most homes and the large leaf surfaces on the plant, the water requirements are relatively high. The soil ball should not be allowed to become so dry that the leaves start to wilt.

On the other hand, the soil must not be kept saturated with water as this cuts off the oxygen supply to the roots resulting in loss of feeder roots. Frequently, the pots are covered with an attractive foil to enhance their appearance. Be sure to check if the drainage hole in the bottom of the pot has been stopped up with the foil. If it is covered the excess moisture cannot drain out and the soil remains waterlogged.

About three weeks after the plant has been received, it would be a good idea to fertilize with a complete fertilizer such as a 5-10-5 using one level teaspoon per six inch pot. Apply the fertilizer over the surface of the soil and water thoroughly. Seldom more than one application is needed; however, this application may be repeated at three-week intervals until the colored bracts fade and drop.

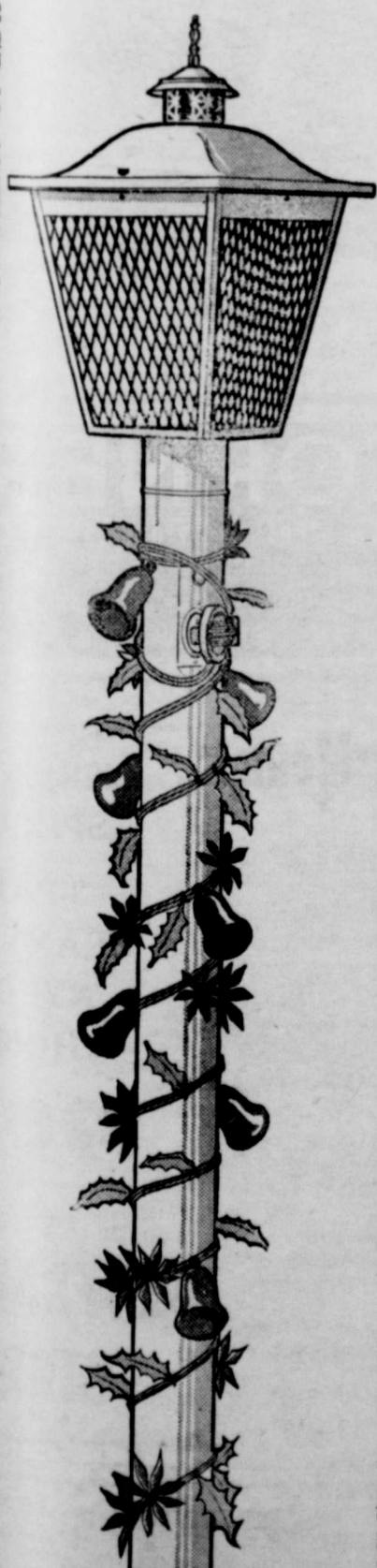
