This volunteer emissary of Christmas Cheer and good will is Russell Duvall, who, since 1950, has been making Christmas a more meaningful experience for youngsters of this area.

Duvall, a civilian employee at Sheppard Air Force Base, admits that he enjoys acting the part of Santa for the simple pleasure of bringing joy to children, especially to those who may not realize many of the good things at Christmas time. With warmth and conviction, Duvall says that "A child is a child, regardless of race, color or creed." He tries to bring joy to all.

Postal Workers To Serve Free Coffee, Cookies

Saturday morning of Christmas Eve, your Postal Employees will show their appreciation by serving free coffee and cookies to their customers.

"The people of Burkburnett cooperated magnificently and we have had the best Christmas season ever. It now appears that every piece of mail will be delivered before Christmas Eve. There will be no backlog of holiday mail still to be delivered Christmas Day," the Postmaster said.

Monday, Dec. 19 was the busiest day in the post office during the pre-Christmas rush. An estimated 25,000 pieces of mail were handled by post office workers.

According to postal officials December 19, 1966 was the busiest day since the Post Office Department moved into the present building Christmas, 1958.

"The use of ZIP Code and a pattern of early mailing helped us move more mail with greater efficiency than ever before," the Postmaster commented.

"Without the excellent public response we would not have been able to do the job alone."

Bearing Gifts Bulldogs Season Record Reaches 9-4, Junior Varsity Undefeated

The Burkburnett Bulldogs have run their season record to 9-4, plus taking the 4-AAA conference lead, as they won two of their last three basketball outings, including a district win. In the meantime the undefeated Junior Varsity kept up their red hot pace, running their record to 13-0.

The Bulldogs and J. V. both were victorious Tuesday, Dec. 13, at Olney. The Bulldogs unleashed a high stepping offense to crush the Cubs in a 69-37 onslaught.

John Edwards and David Bruer set the pace with 14 and 13 points, respectively. The Bulldogs took an early lead and were never seriously threatened by the shorter hosts.

The Olney 'E' made a game of it, as they gave it a good go before bowing out to the unbeaten J.V., 29-25. Jim Fleegar led Burk with a 12 point output.

The J. V. came home Thursday to host the first round of the Burkburnett B-team Tournament. In their opening night game they raced past the Notre Dame Knights, 40-28.

Jack Taber and Curtis Kufahl joined forces with 10 apiece to pace Burk scoring.

In other games, Iowa Park downed Hirschl, 37-35, Wichita Falls beat Vernon, 64-33, and Rider nipped Eisenhower, 46-44.

Friday night saw no tournament action as the Bulldogs and J.V. both traveled to Anadarko, Oklahoma. The Bulldogs learned why Oklahoma basketball is considered among the toughest in the country as they were ambushed, 50-36. John Edwards was high pointer for the Bulldogs with 15 points.

Coach Mike Bridges Junior Varsity got in its licks, though, blasting the Indians "B", 63-37. Jim Fleegar set a fast pace with 22 points.

Saturday morning, action shifted back to Euldogg field-house and the "B" tournament. In their second round game, Curtis Kufahl dropped in 11, as the J.V. dropped Iowa Park, 43-37.

Rider won their way into the finals by lacing Wichita Falls, 49-40. Notre Dame dropped Hirschl, 41-29, and Eisenhower bombed Vernon, 63-33.

In the afternoon games, Edwards' shower took consolation, 45-28, over Notre Dame, and Iowa Park ripped Wichita Falls, 50-32, for third place.

In the finals, the J.V., trailing by eight at the half, came storming back to take a 42-33 victory and the championship. Failing to get going against Rider in the first half, the J.V. proved to be a true winner, coming out battling and taking a well-deserved victory.

Jim Fleegar had 15 and Jack Taber 11 to lead scorers.

Tuesday night, Dec. 20, saw the opening of 4-AAA action, as the Bulldogs hosted the Breckenridge Buckaroos in what might have been called a mismatch in non-conference play, but none the less, took the lead in conference standings with a 68-33 pounding of the Greenies.

Bulldog reserves saw action early, but two regulars were leading the scoring attack. David Bruer layed in 13 and Jim

CHRISTMAS 1966

The traditions of Christmas — the tree with its lights, tinsel and decorations, the holly wreath on the door, the mistletoe and the colorful collection of Christmas packages, all contribute to the Spirit of Christmas.

It is a time of year when old acquaintances are renewed — a time for family reunions.

Sometimes in our effort to make this a bigger and better Christmas, we are inclined to let the material things of life overshadow the most festive holiday of the Christian world.

Let us pause and reflect on its true meaning — and in our mind's eye go back to the first Christmas — the birth of the Christ child in a stable in Bethlehem. Just what message should we draw from this momentous event? It conveys a dual message, as a famous clergyman once said. "The family that prays together, stays together," and it also in a dramatic way points out the attribute of humility.

And when man is on the threshold of nearly a half-million mile round trip to the moon, one should conjure the thought that a woman traveling 65 miles on the back of a donkey made the most significant trip of all time.

SURPASSING THE PYRAMIDS

Each of the world's civilizations has left evidence of skills that often baffle experts of today. Of a certainty, when the records of our existing civilization are brought to light perhaps eons in the future, here will be some genuine puzzlers.

For one thing, when the scientists of the future begin probing around in what is now the United, they will find some mysterious holes in the ground — perhaps a million of them. Some of these holes are thousands of feet deep. Of course, there is no mystery about them to those living in the present. They are oil wells.

Currently, there are about 588,000 of these wells, and they produce yearly 3 billion barrels of crude oil each year. An oil industry publication shows a picture of an assemblage of men and equipment beside the caption, "What It Takes To Drill An Oil Well." In the picture is a small army of men with tractors, trucks, tankers, drilling rigs and many highly specialized vehicles. It explains better than words why the cost of drilling a single wild-cat well may range from \$50,000 to some \$3 million. It may take a long time for the scientists of the distant future to figure out that the civilization of the 20th century ran on oil and that the ingenuity of the men of the petroleum industry surpassed that of the builders of the pyramids.

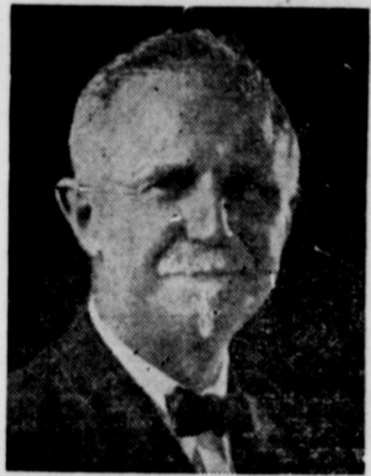

THE LESSON OF CHRISTMAS

Babson Park, Mass., December 22 — "And the angel said unto them, Be not afraid; for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy which shall be to all the people. For there is born to you this day in the city of David, a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord." (Luke 2:10-11)

Ever since the angel appeared to the shepherds on the hills outside Bethlehem, bringing the "good tidings of great joy," Christmas has been celebrated as pre-eminently the season of joy—the season of children's laughter and games, of presents, of family re-unions, of human warmth and light, of the manger with the star shining above it. But there are times—and perhaps the present with its armed clashes, its political unrest, and economic stresses is one of them—when joy seems hard to capture.

The Personality of Jesus

If Jesus was not God, He was certainly the most remarkable man who ever lived. For He left the impress of His name and personality upon the world in a way no other man has ever done. The whole period of life from His day to ours is stamped with His name—the Christian era. The civilization that spread across the world sprang from His teaching and is called after Him — Christian civilization. When we wish to describe moral virtues that exceed anything that pre-Christian man knew, we use the terms Christian charity, Christian justice, and the Christian ethic.

The personality of Jesus was so impressed on the world that its impact surpasses anything that anybody else has achieved. In short, it is unique. One is forced to the conclusion that the personality of Jesus was at least super-human. Yet this super-human being claimed to be even more than that. He claimed to be God. To reject that claim is to say in effect that the greatest personality that ever existed was that of a deceiver.

The Humility of the Manger

The story of Jesus began in a stable. It was a night when all the world was upside down, sang the message which would hold good for all time, that peace on earth would be to men of good will. Jesus set out to teach humility and He started most humbly.

Christmas is Universal

Jesus was born in the stillness of the night, and it has been traditional to associate His birth with silence—the silence of reverential awe and of hu-

mility. One of the most hallowed of our Christmas carols is called "Silent Night," and in his hauntingly beautiful "O Little Town of Bethlehem" Bishop Phillips Brooks wrote: "How silently, how silently the wondrous gift is given."

However you choose to regard the life of Jesus, you cannot help but note that it started in humility and in silence, but grew to embrace the whole world. Nor can you help but note that Christmas is the greatest feast or holiday of the year. It is the day we all keep in some fashion or other, though it is to be regretted that for so many it has lost its true spiritual significance.

The Silence of Bethlehem

The lesson of the manger is a difficult one for a stiff-necked materialistic world. The humility of the stable and the silence of Bethlehem are unacceptable to those who see life's sole purpose as the amassing of power and wealth or the attainment of personal success. The silence of Bethlehem on that holy night was not accidental. It was meant to teach us reverence for God, for His creation, for our fellow men. It was also meant to teach us that we must be quiet and listen or we will not hear God when He speaks within our own heart.

1 pound seeded raisins - 1/2 pound minced orange peel - 5 eggs - 1/2 pound brown sugar - 1 pound suet chopped fine - 1 teaspoon nutmeg - 1/2 teaspoon cloves - 1/2 teaspoon mace - 1 cup Cognac brandy - 1 pound currants - 1/4 pound flour - 1 pound stale bread crumbs - 1 teaspoon cinnamon - 1 teaspoon allspice - 1 teaspoon baking soda - pinch of salt & grated rind of 1 lemon.

Wash the dry currants, add raisins and mix well. All ingredients should be mixed together. Beat the eggs, add to them the Brandy, then pour this liquid to the mixture and add fruit.

Pack into greased pudding mold and steam for 6 hours. Steam for another 6 hours when ready to use. Serve with Cognac or hard sauce. This will keep for weeks if kept in a cool, dry place.

THE PSYCHOLOGY OF TOYS

Research by American psychologists, most of them with sons and daughters of their own, has furnished some interesting facts about the learning-function and the fun-function of toys—two processes which in the mind of the child are one.

One of the first tasks of the late Dr. K. Groos, in his psychological study of play and toys, was to examine parents' inklings and intuitions about children, toys and games in order to test the truths they contain. The next step was to put the test results into straightforward language to help both parents and toy-makers do what's best for the child.

Parents have long sensed something special happening when a youngster picks up a toy and weaves his own imaginary world around it—a "toy world" that is often so entrancing that the parent is drawn into it—like the old story about the father taking over his son's electric train, funny because it's so humanly true. Most fathers admit this, and according to a classic manufacturer of auto racers, Lionel, whose first model motor car came out in 1913,

fathers have always been attracted to racing toys.

These expertly engineered, excitingly designed tabletop toys satisfy parents' concern for quality toys that are fun and educational. At the same time they help develop a child's sense of responsibility in caring for his playthings. He learns that for long-lasting fun with intricate mechanical toys, he must do certain maintenance chores periodically.

Raceway sets, such as the Lionel Matterhorn with its precision-built cars, Alpine climb mechanism and loops, can last indefinitely if a child remembers these basics:

Clean all rails with ink eraser, and vacuum the track. Remove lint and dust around car axles, gears and motor. Clean pick-up contacts on car with alcohol or ink eraser. Apply grease to gears, oil to axles and gear shafts sparingly—and run car for a full minute at various speeds while keeping wheels off roadway. Clean loops of raceway with soft, lint-free cloth and check power cord for cracks.

These steps take only about 15 minutes, but can keep a set in shape for years.

Make A Christmas Yum-Yum Tree



There'll be more than just visions when it comes to sugar plum trees this Christmas. Fifteen thousand candy store windows across the country will blossom with posters of a tree that is destined to become as famous as Rockefeller Center's. It's a regular yum-yum tree, created in New York by artist Miyo Endo for Schraff's Candies, and candy is what it's made of.

Standing four feet high and shimmering with hundreds of chocolates, foil-wrapped cherry cordials, caramels, and jordan almonds, the candy tree is not only a joy to behold, but a treat to eat. Except for its cardboard nucleus, it's completely edible.

It took artist Miyo five days and five nights to create the original yum-yum tree, but you can easily make a smaller version of it to delight your own family this Christmas.

For a mantel decoration just cut a tree shape from heavy cardboard and coat it with soft fondant or simple syrup. Using a two or three pound box of Schraff's chocolates, cover the cardboard in a merry Christmas tree pattern. After the candy is secure, prop your tree on the mantel and lean it against the wall.

A chocolate yum-yum tree also makes a delightful hanging decoration to suspend over your buffet or dinner table. As a combination centerpiece/conversation piece, how sweet it is!

Tractor Starting Tips Are Offered

Tractors sometimes can be balky about starting in cold weather. According to County Agricultural Agent B. T. Haws, when starting in cold weather, use only partial throttle for best results. An open throttle draws in more air and increases compression. Use full choke only until first engine explosion.

For trouble-free winter starting, make sure your tractor battery is in good shape. It may need to be recharged—but if it has a low specific gravity reading or dead cells, better replace it. It's a good idea to rinse battery with soda water to remove grease, dirt and corrosion. Replace frayed cables and refill cells with clean distilled water.

Make sure your tractor generator is well lubricated—use a light, number 10 motor oil. Generators with sealed bearings should be checked every 1,000 hours of operation.

CATTLE LICE

Cattle lice occur widely in Texas. They reduce gain, and lower body resistance to other diseases. Normally lice infestations are light in the summer and fall, but increase during the cold season. Regular inspection of cattle is suggested. If lice are found, cattle should be treated with an approved spray or dip. Local agents can supply information on approved methods and chemicals.

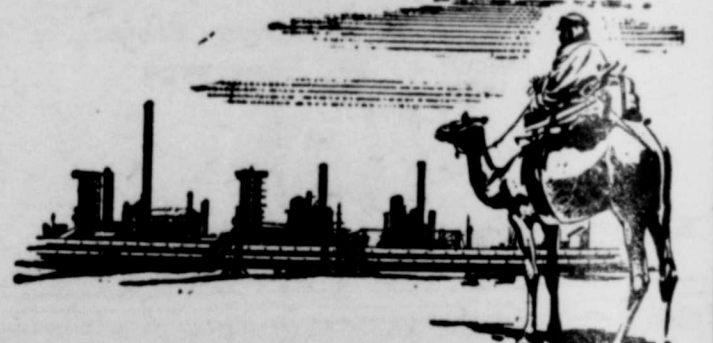

TREE FRESHNESS TEST

To test the tree before you buy, rub a finger across the butt. Stickiness is a sign of freshness. Bounce the tree on the ground several times. If the needles shed, the tree has begun to dry out. Next tug at the needles. If they pull off easily, freshness has gone. Patches of browned needles mean dryness has set in. A fragrant odor is a good sign of freshness, and healthy green needles are a good sign too.

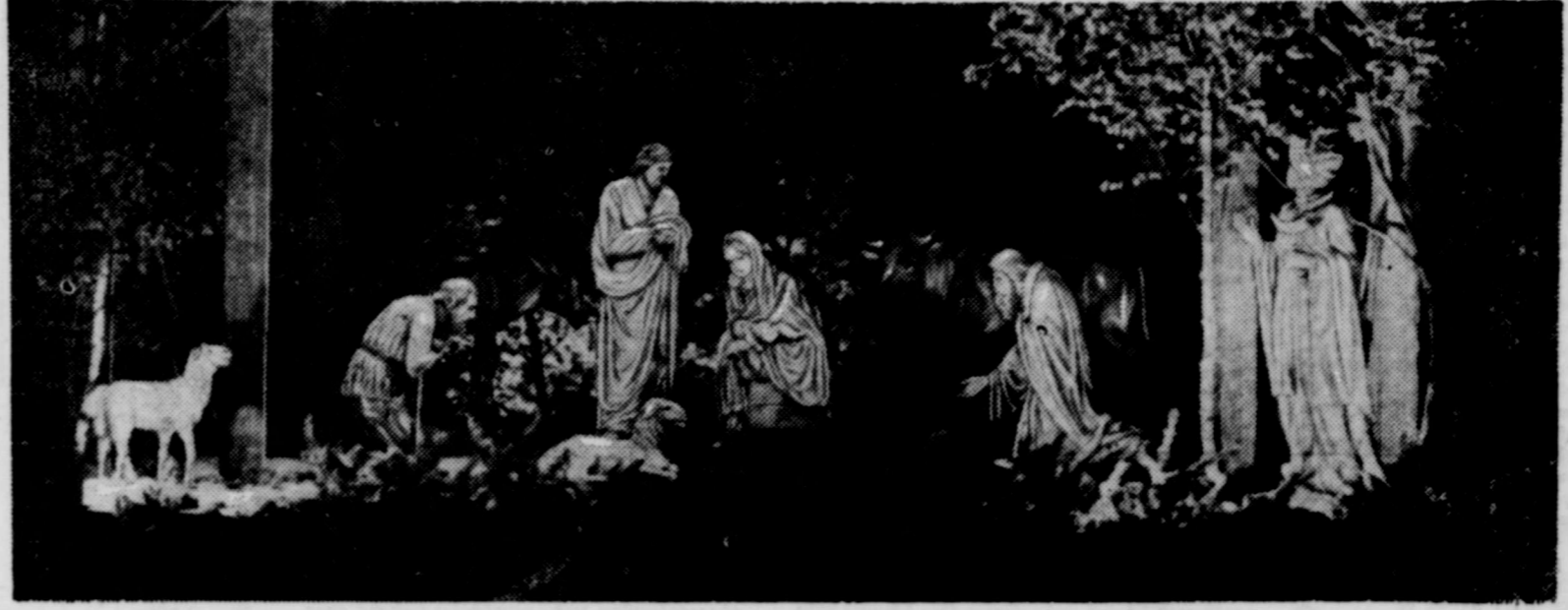

AROUND THE WORLD

In America, the favorite Christmas dish is turkey and dressing with traditional cranberry sauce. Other countries have their favorite foods. In Austria, for example, raisins, currants, chopped figs and dates are made into a cake called Fruchtbrot and served hot.

Czechoslovakians serve baked carp with spicy sauce on Christmas Eve. In Denmark, the Christmas meat is goose. Plum pudding and mincemeat have long been favorites with the English.

In Sweden, the main dish at dinner is roast pig served with bright red apple in its mouth. Goose is also a favorite Christmas meat. Instead of turkey, the Norwegians serve such meat dishes as roast ribs of pork, pickled pork or barbecued young pig.

Popular in Poland is chopped meat rolled in cabbage served with vegetables and sour cream. It is called golumpki.

Hungarian families serve cakes in the shape of horseshoes and filled with poppy seeds or walnuts. Flat hard cakes in the shape of beasts, birds or fish are traditional in Holland.

Germany has many traditional Christmas foods, not the least popular of which is the Christmas cake called Pfefferkuchen. Characteristic of France is the truffled turkey and black pudding. The first course of the Finnish Christmas dinner is dried codfish served with boiled potato and cream sauce.

Regardless of the foods served or the tradition back of various dishes, Christmas dinners everywhere abound with good cheer and good fellowship.



It was the night of Christ's birth in Bethlehem. Outside the stable of the inn where the Holy Family had taken shelter for the night, a group of people had gathered. Among these were the shepherds who had come to worship the Babe. All of them were bearing gifts for the Child.

There was a young girl in the gathering. She joined the group to find out what had brought them here. When she heard their story and knew that the young child born this night had been called the Saviour, she too wanted to go in and worship.

HINTS

for a Happy Holiday



Plants received as Christmas gifts will last longer with proper care. Foliage plants should be watered when top of soil is barely moist to touch, then only enough so that soil is moist. Feed plants about once a month and do not overheat them. Glossy leaved plants need an occasional sponging off with lukewarm water. Keep sun-loving plants in a sunny spot and out of drafts.

To make an attractive "last minute" Holiday table decoration, fill one or two hurricane lamps with ornaments, place evergreen twigs or holly leaves around them and add a few ornaments to the greens. Or use a candle and a piece of plastic foam. Stick twigs of evergreens, holly, etc., into the foam and wire cones, clusters of berries into the greens.

If you buy a "living" Christmas tree this year for transplanting later, do not keep it indoors more than a week, or the tree will dry out in the warm, dry air of the house. The tree should not be loaded with too many heated lights. Deal with a reliable nursery and purchase freshly dug trees with large root balls. Follow their directions carefully to transplant.

For an extra festive touch to your Holiday punch bowl try adding decorative ice instead of regular ice cubes. Freeze water tinted with red or green food color; freeze for at least 24 hours, whole fruits such as lemons, grape bunches, etc.; fill ice cube tray 3/4 with cooled boiled water. Freeze, then top each cube with red and green cherry halves, or fresh cranberry and mint sprig, then add more water and refreeze.

For prettily wrapped packages that can be enjoyed the year round, wrap lids and bottoms separately, so the tops can be removed without destroying the effect. Use bright remnants of satin, calico, chintz, mitering the corners, and securing the edges inside lid and box with glue. Trim with lace, braid, ribbons, fake flowers, other scraps from the sewing box.

For the children when you serve the traditional egg nog to grown-ups: A bowl of Fruit Nog, made with milk, eggs, and vanilla ice cream, topped with scoops of orange sherbet and served with short colored straws. Festive, delicious, and good for the youngsters.

For an unusual gift, especially attractive to a girl of almost any age, why not a small Christmas tree decorated with "beauty gifts," such as tiny bottles of perfume, an atomizer, hair spray in purse size, a pretty sleeping cap, eyebrow pencil, eyeshadow, perhaps purse size lipstick, nail polish. Cotton balls in color, along with small ornaments will help decorate the tree.

Why not create your own special Christmas tree this year? Cut a small, well-shaped tree of almost any variety, with or without leaves. Make up "snow" by blending very small amount of water and Ivory Snow, added a little at a time in your largest mixing bowl and beating until very, very dry. May require several bowls of "snow" depending on the size of your tree. Start at top and apply snow to branches and leaves, rounding up to resemble real snow. When thoroughly dry, drying at least overnight, decorate as any traditional tree. Colored lights or colored spotlights are especially effective with this tree.

For attractive "made at home" gift containers, spray cardboard tubes from wax paper, aluminum foil, rolls of paper toweling, round cereal boxes, with red, green, gold or silver enamel spray paint, purchased at hardware or variety stores. These can be decorated while paint is still wet with small color flecks, sequins, etc., or after drying with the new contact tapes.

Serve something simple the day before or after the Christmas feast. Perhaps mugs of hot soup or oyster stew, small sandwiches and salad. The rich foods of the Holiday feast will be enjoyed more for having eaten the plain foods the day before.

NAMING CHRISTMAS

Christmas means both prayerful worship and festive merry-making. The holy meaning of the day is expressed in its name.

The Latin name for Christmas translates as the Feast or Birthday of Our Lord. The English Christmas means the Mass of Christ, a meaning which is closely paralleled by the Dutch "Kermis". In Germany it's "Weihnacht", or sacred night.

Origin of the Christmas Card

The Christmas card originated from the "school pieces" which were popular in the early nineteenth century. Elaborate pen-fountain, forming scrolls and designs, were usually the basic pattern. School boys carefully prepared these to point out the progress they had made in chirography and composition. The first Christmas card proper is said to have been placed on sale in 1843. It was printed lithography and colored by hand. Possibly 1,000 were sold. Cards for Christmas really caught the fancy about 1862.

If the flame burns bright and the light shines clear, Good-luck will be yours throughout the year.

Bake in hot (400°F.) oven 1 hour and 30 minutes or about 15 minutes per pound. In a small saucepan, mix well jelly, mince meat, and port wine. Cook over medium heat until mixture boils; stir occasionally until jelly is melted. (This will yield 2-2/3 cups sauce.) Remove ham from oven and unwrap carefully. Return unwrapped ham to rack in roasting pan. Lower oven temperature to slow (325°F.). With sharp knife score ham in a diamond pattern. If desired, secure a cherry half with a whole clove or food pick in each diamond. Spoon 1/3 of the mince meat sauce over ham. Return to oven; bake about 45 minutes or until glazed. While baking apply 2/3 cup sauce in two applications. Heat remaining mince meat sauce and serve with ham.

Rich and poor Pilgrims worship together in the fourth century church of the Nativity. There is a high mass, during which the image of the Christ Child is carried from the church through the Mandelbaum Gate.

The ceremonies come to a climax before three adjacent shrines. The Altars of the Nativity, The Wise Men and the Manger. Outside, Christians from many lands will sing, as angels sang nearly 2,000 years ago; "Glory To God In The Highest", and on earth peace and good will toward men.

Christmas Card History is Cloudy

It is generally believed that the first card designed as a Christmas greeting, was done in England by J. Horsley in 1843. Actually the search for "first" is still going on. Although it bore no specific greeting, The New York Historical Society, some 30 years before the Horsley card, sent to members and friends of the society a product of ST. NICHOLAS, which bore a Christmas poem both Dutch and English. In 1932 Carl W. Drepper covered in a Pennsylvania "Beadsheet" issued about 1842 by John M. Wolff, a Philadelphia printer. The sheet featured a reproduction of C. C. Moore's "The visit of St. Nicholas" and carried a greeting "A Merry Christmas and A Happy New Year". The first commercial Christmas card business was in 1863 in an English firm.

CHRISTMAS in Other Lands

CHINA

In China, the Christmas festival is called Sheng Dan Jieh, or the Holy Birth Festival. The Christmas Tree is called the Tree of Light. No candles are used but many paper flowers, chains and other paper ornaments are used for decorations.

DENMARK

Christmas dinner in Denmark centers around rice cooked with a whole almond buried inside. A prize is given to the one in whose portion the almond is found. Also on the Christmas dinner menu is usually found roasted goose, stuffed with prunes and apples, red cabbage, potatoes and currant jelly. Dessert is usually apple cake covered with whipped cream, fruits and nuts.

GREECE

Special loaves of bread are baked in Greece for Christmas. Each loaf is marked with a cross on top. Hidden inside is a silver coin. After the house has been sprayed with frankincense, the parents of the household break the bread into small pieces, one for the patron saint, one for the house, another for the domestic animals and the remainder is divided among the family. Each portion is dipped in wine and eaten. The one finding the coin will be considered the prosperous one for the following year.

LIMA, PERU

Christmas in Lima, Peru, is observed as a church holiday. Services are held and a religious procession is staged in the city. Christmas Eve is a time for merry-making with music, festivals and joyousness. Many of the merry-makers are masked for this celebration.

SPAIN

Almost every home in Spain traditionally stages a Nacimiento, or Christmas Crib. Children dance around singing songs of the Nativity. Song, dance and laughter are features of the Yuletide in Spain.

SWEDEN

Christmas gifts in Swedish homes are wrapped in paper and sealed with red sealing wax. The name of the one to receive the gift is written and a dedication or poem about the gift is added. This is known as Julklappan. All gifts are placed in a basket by the tree which is usually decorated with the Swedish national flag.

VIRGINIA, U. S. A.

Negoes in Virginia had a Christmas custom of their own. A sheet was placed over the dining room table with a few boxes used to keep the sheet above table level. Names on paper were pinned to the cloth. During the night, gifts were secretly placed under the names pinned to the cloth. On Christmas morning, the sheet was raised by its corners, revealing the presents underneath.

PUERTO RICO

Children of Puerto Rico expect Santa Claus to come flying through the air like a bird. Instead of stockings for gifts and goodies, the children make small boxes which are placed on roof tops or in the courtyard. Gifts are dropped into them as Santa flies through the air.

HAWAII

It is thought in this new state that Santa Claus travels by boat. In the morning, Hawaiians attend church. During the day there are games and sports. Christmas dinner is eaten out of doors.

PHILIPPINES

An offering of flowers is not unusual in the Philippines at Christmas. A happy greeting is "Buena Pasqua." Christmas is a religious celebration with many plays and dramas called "pastores" about the life of Christ.

Denmark First Country to Offer Christmas Seals

Christmas Seal sale is an annual institution and offers at the Christmas season an opportunity for all to aid in the fight against tuberculosis.

The idea was originated in Denmark by a postal clerk named Einar Holbeil in 1903. It was his idea that a special Christmas stamp could be issued to be placed on mail in addition to regular postage. The funds from this sale were to be used to build a hospital for the children of Copenhagen.

In 1904, with the help of King Christian and other prominent citizens, the first Christmas seals were printed and sold at regular post offices in Denmark. Each had a portrait of the Queen of Denmark, encircled by a wreath of roses. Printed at the top was the word, Jelum, a Danish word for Christmas. The date of issue was printed at the bottom.

Two years later Norway adopted the plan. In 1907 a Danish immigrant to the United States became interested.

As a result of combined efforts of a number of prominent Americans the first stamps were placed on sale December 7, 1907 at the post office at Wilmington, Delaware. The design was simple: a half wreath of holly and a cross with "Merry Christmas" at the center and "Happy New Year" at the bottom. In 1919 the double-barred Cross of Lorraine was selected as the permanent emblem. A new design is selected each year, featuring the cross of Lorraine.

In the early years the American Red Cross sponsored the sale of these seals. In 1920 the National Tuberculosis Association began to carry on the Christmas Seal sale alone, as it has done ever since.

More than 3,000 organizations are affiliated with the National Tuberculosis Association. Since 1907 the disease has dropped from first to seventh as a cause of death in the United States. 45 countries now sell the seals.

Gift Wrap

The smallest gift will look impressive in a gaily wrapped package. Use shelf paper, scraps of material or odd ends of wallpaper. To tie your package use strips of cloth cut in ribbon widths with pinking shears, or bright colored yarns. Pack your gifts in unusual containers — such as flower pots, small basket, decorated oatmeal boxes, coffee cans or paper plates with bright seals.

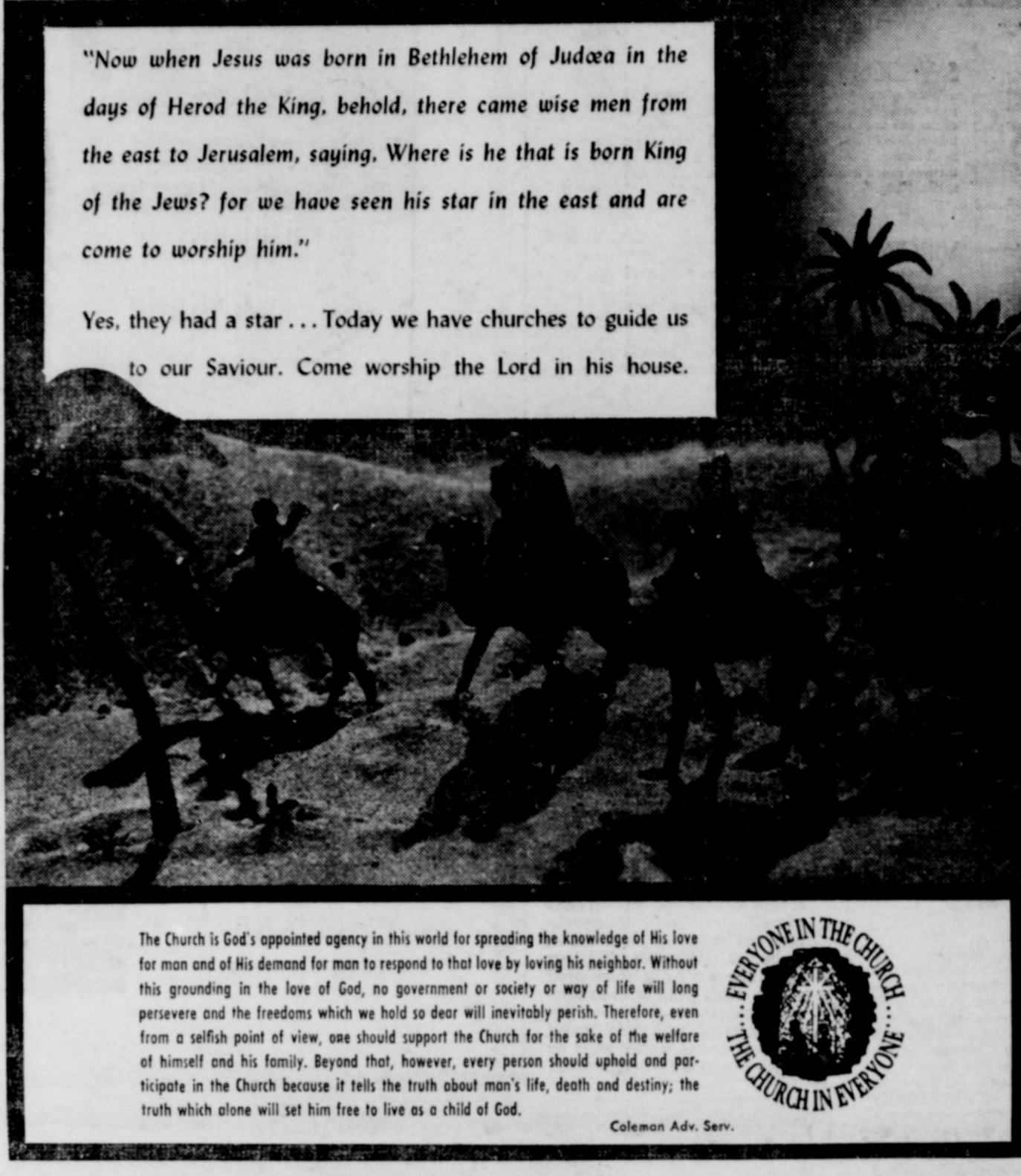
