Once the oil reaches Viet Nam, it is kept moving to its destination by barges, pipelines, trucks and aircraft. Oilmen and the military have created complete petroleum installations where nothing had previously existed but sand and jungle.

The American Gas Association notes that modern offshere drilling rigs, used in prospecting for natural gas beneath the sea, may be as big as football fields and cost \$10 million to build. 

WHO

This congregation is a group of Christians drawn together by the Spirit of Jesus Christ for worship and service. It is a free fellowship and service in that only those are members of it who freely choose to be such. To become a Christian is to become a member of Christ's Body, which is His Church, and be filled with His Spirit who draws us together. We deplore the division in the religious world today and pray for the time when all churches may unite upon the Bible foundation and find a new and deeper unity in Christ, that the death of our Lord may completely break down all our walls of partition, and that the world will believe that God sent Him.

We carry on our work and worship as we understand the Scriptures to teach. According to examples from the New Testament, we celebrate the Lord's Supper each Lord's Day. Our music is the praise of our lips without mechanical accompaniment. Many people who visit us say that the singing is one of the most inspirational parts of our worship. Our prayers, largely spontaneous, are designed to strengthen and not to be just part of the program. The proclamation of the Bible is given a prominent place in our worship because we believe that in Christian worship God always speaks, and we must be attuned to hear. Our giving is liberal and proportionate, and expression of the dedication we have to God who gave us all that we have and are. The entire worship program is planned, but not rigid and formal.

Entrance into this congregation is obtained by obedience to God's plan. Those not yet Christians are taught to believe in Christ with the whole heart, to repent of their sins, to confess their faith in Jesus and to be baptized into union with Him for the forgiveness of their sins and the reception of the Holy Spirit. Since only believers are baptized, we do not practice infant baptism. And as baptism instituted by Jesus and practiced by the early Church was immersion, we follow that practice today. This practice allows baptism to truly symbolize the death, burial and resurrection of Christ. This act becomes in the penitent believer, his death with Christ to self and sin, his burial of the former sinful self and his resurrection to a new life in Christ.

We do not exist merely for selfish purposes, but to follow Him who came to minister and give His life a ransom for many. We help at home and abroad in mission work and benevolence.

Our marching orders are the Lord's world-wide commission. Our desire is the building of His world-wide Kingdom. Our hope is the resurrection of the dead. For we preach not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake. For it is God who said, "Light shall shine out of darkness" who shined in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ. (II Corinthians 4:5,6).

Christ is our only Creed and the Bible our only Rule of Faith and Practice.





How well do you know the aristocrat of the fresh vegetable world - asparagus? With its short season many people don't get fully acquainted with this green vegetable.

Supplies at local markets are the most plentiful during April, May reports Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent. Even then, supplies are limited because asparagus is a highly perishable specialty crop. It must be harvested at the peak of tenderness or it is toough and fibrous.

When shopping for aspara-gus, look for closed, compact, green or bluish-green colored tips, says the agent. A wilted appearance or a spreading tip often indicates considerable time has elapsed since cutting. Avoid excessive amount of white stem, as it is likely to be tough and stringy.

Keep your asparagus cold and noist and prepare for serving as soon as possible.

One pound of fresh aspara-gus makes three to four serv-

ings.

Prepare the asparagus by bending the stalk so it snaps at the tender spot or cut above the white area. Wash well.
