We wonder if it has ever occurred to you to wonder what the most secure agency or instrument of government is. If the CIA or the National Security Council, or the Atomic Energy Commission crossed your mind, you're guessing in the wrong side of town, The Supreme Court wins, kands down.

When the Court is in session, it hands down decisions every Monday, sometimes several of them. Yet there has never been any advance "leak" as to what a decision was going to be, nor, for that matter, is it ever known in advance what cases will be decided. Obviously it would be worth fabulous amounts of money to some persons if it could be learned in advance what certain rulings would be. But the record of the Court is above reproach, and whatever else one may think or mutter about its findings, it does make those findings in admirable secrecy.

Secrets circulate the corridors of the Pentagon with the speed of an atomic reactor. Unidentified spokesmen stand in every doorway at the State Department and the White House.

A lot of Federal agencies and departments could do worse than to study the Supreme Court's security system. It works.

Of course, if we were party to some of those decisions of the Court we want to keep them secret too.

With fruit stands overflowing with fresh, juicy peaches at a good price, it's high time you treat your family to a fresh peach shortcake. Thin, crisp, golden circles of flaky pastry (the kind made with solid all-vegetable shortening that you use for pies) layered with sweetened peaches and whipped cream, make a truly superb dessert. Crisco's home economists, who developed this recipe, say you can also make small pastry rounds for individual desserts.

PEACH SHORTCAKE (Makes 10 servings)

5 cups sliced pared peaches (about 3 pounds)

purpose flour

1 cup firmly-packed light brown sugar ½ cup lemon juice 31/3 cups sifted all1½ teaspoons salt 1¼ cups Crisco shortening 7 to 8 table spoons

water Granulated sugar 11/2 cups heavy cream*

Combine peaches, brown sugar and lemon juice; chill 1 hour. Combine flour and salt in bowl. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse meal. Sprinkle with water, toss with a fork and press into a ball. Divide dough into 4 parts. On lightly floured surface, roll out each part into an 8-inch circle; trim edges using an 8-inch round plate. Place on baking sheets and sprinkle generously with gran-ulated sugar; prick with a fork. Bake in 425° (hot) oven 15 minutes, or until golden brown. Remove and cool on racks. Whip cream with 1 tablespoon granulated sugar until soft peaks form. Stack pastry circles on large serving plate, topping each with peaches and whipped cream. Serve shortcake with any remaining peach syrup. Or, use 2 envelopes (2 ounces each) whipped topping mix, prepared as directed.

tion to mark this occasion included employees and officials of the companies involved in the design and manufacture of the china as well as represent-atives of the White House Historical Society and the executive mansion service staff.

The First Lady felt it particularly fitting that those persons involved with the American-designed and Americanmade dining service should be among the first to view it in its permanent home in the executive mansion. Guests included representatives of Tiffany & Co., New York; Castleton China, New Castle, Pa.: Commercial Decal, Mt. Vernon, N. Y.; and INTERPACE, Parsippany, N. J., parent company

The new presidential service, purchased by the White House Historical Society for the peo-ple of the United States, consists of 216 place settings of ten individual pieces per set-

Original designs for the White House state service were by Van Day Truex, and the paintings of flowers for decorations were by Andre Piette, both of Tiffany & Co.

Most unusual item in the china service is the entree plate, which also doubles as a dessert plate. The center decorations for these plates consist of individual representa-tions of the state flowers of the fifty states and the District

Basic decorative design of all pieces is a radiating and

vaulted pattern of pure gold dots over the rim areas of the plates and on the outsides of the hollow pieces, such as cups, cream soups and bowls. Each piece is edged with a scalloped gold band adjacent to a band of pink-orange. Wildflowers of the Southwest United States are also featured in the rim designs of the service plates, dinner plates, rim soups, cups and bowls.

The large service plates de pict a flying American eagle and shield in plate center. The eagle design was adopted from a state service acquired for the executive mansion by President James Monroe.

Manufacture of the new service required six months at the Castleton plant, utilizing skills of more than two hundred employees in form decorating and firing the v



Husky Tower Joins Western Sights



Calgary, Alta.—The highest structure of its kind in North America—the 62-story Husky Tower—has been added to famwestern attractions for

visitors. The view of the Canadian

Rockies is spectacular from the revolving restaurant and observation terrace at the top of the Tower. The restaurant, seating 210, revolves completely once each hour. The 626-foot concrete and

steel reinforced structure looms over Calgary, western Canada metropolis nestled on the prairies just east of the Rockies.

Husky Tower joins such other popular attractions as nearby Banff National Park, Lake Louise and Jasper Na-tional Park. The \$3½-million Tower is named for the Husky Oil Com-

pany which produces, refines and markets gasoline and other products in the western prairie and mountain sections of the United States and Canada. Some 3,000 cubic feet of con-

crete were used for the new sixmillion-pound Calgary land-mark. It is 94½ feet across the eight-foot thick base upon which the Tower rests 20 feet below ground level. The diam-eter is 66 feet at ground level and the walls are a foot and a half thick. The shaft decreases to 31

feet across at 450 feet; the walls narrow to 10½ inches thick. The top of the Tower "pod" varies from 78½ feet to 89 feet across just under the "bubble" skydomes in the roof.

Two elevators whisk 25 persons at a time from ground to top in a minute and three sec-onds. There are 762 steps from top to bottom.






