"The challenge of wildcat oil and gas drilling was highlighted in recently released reports that show 89 per cent of 5,260 wells drilled in 1967 were dry holes," says the Ashland Oil News. "These were in areas where neither oil nor gas had previously been found. The average depth was 5,325 feet — more than a mile. Experience has shown that only two or three of every 100 wildcat wells are commercially profitable."

American industry has created 7.5 million new jobs over the past four years as reported by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. The figures from the Department of Labor average out to over 5,000 new jobs created every day. People employed in the civilian labor force number a record high of about 86 million.

In a Memo to Mailers issued by the Post Office Department, it was stated that more than 50 railroad cars carrying mail are destroyed by fire each year. A rash of burnings have also been recorded recently in Star Route trucks. Fires on mail transporters can be disastrous.

"Sixty per cent of Americans who drown do so be-cause they have fallen into the water accidently," says Mr. A. B. Murphy, national director of Red Cross Safety Services. "If they had been able to swim, they could have saved themselves.'

SECTION 1: Any person owning, occupying or controlling any lot or other land within the corporate limits of the city, upon which there is planted or growing any tree, hedge, bush or vine; or owning, occuping or controlling any lot or other land abutting upon any street within the corporate limit of the city upon which land there is planted or growing any tree, hedge. bush or vine, shall prune or train the branches or limbs of any such tree, hedge, bush or vine so that any of same projecting over any street, alley, sidewalk or public passageway
