Safety Sunday Is Proclaimed For November 17

AUSTIN, Gov John Connally has proclaimed Sunday, November 17, "Safety Sunday" in Texas and called on all citizens to enlist in the fight for greater safety by considering their moral obligations to protect the sanctity of human life.

"It is essential that every Texan realize that safety for himself, his loved ones and his friends, as well as others is a matter of moral responsibility," the Governor said in his proclamation, while pointing out that "accidents continue to take a grave toll in our State each year."

He noted that in traffic crashes alone 3,367 Texans lost their lives and an additional 205,308 persons suffered painful injuries last year. The economic loss from these accidents is estimated at some \$793 million.

The purpose of "Safety Sunday," which is sponsored by the Texas Safety Association, is to focus public attention on the necessity for reducing accident tolls especially during the Fall and Winter holiday season. The Safety Association reports that previous experience indicates that accidents tolls increase sharply during this period.

Clergymen of all faiths are being asked to join civic leaders state officials and others in a united effort to prevent additional tragedy on the highways and in the homes of Texas by making Lone Star citizens more fully aware of their individual moral responsibilities for accident prevention.

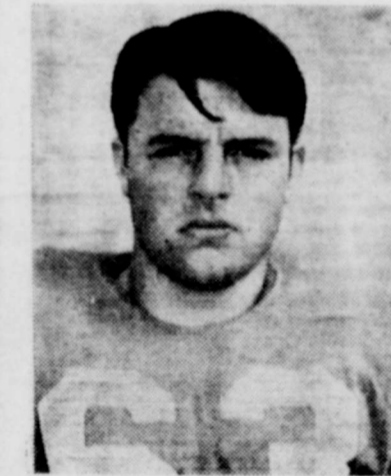

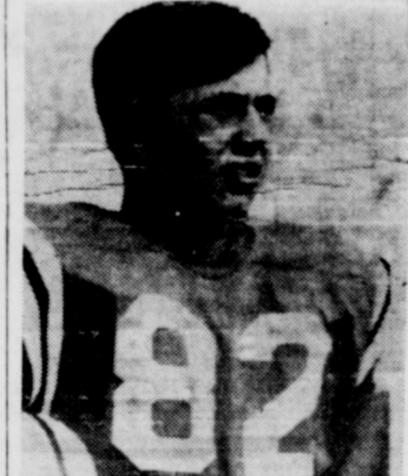

FIRST BAPTIST REVIVAL IS SLATED TO START SUNDAY

Beginning Sunday, November 3rd, the large and enthusiastic crowds thronging to the First Baptist Church at 4th and Avenue D, Burkburnett, will be drawn by a dynamic preacher, Hal Brooks, and a unique singer, Fritz Smith, the team leading that Church in its annual Fall Revival. Morning and evening services will continue through Sunday, November 10th. Sunday services are scheduled at 10:40 a.m. and 6:30 p.m.; morning services Monday through Friday at 10:00 a.m., and evening services Monday through Saturday at 7:30 p.m.

The 1st Baptist Church's pastor, Lamoine Champ, is well known in Burkburnett and popular for his zeal in supporting civic affairs and for his ministry for people of all faiths. Reverend Champ believes these crowds will also gather because of preparation on the part of his congregation, highlighted by organized prayer meetings and visitation programs directed by committee action.

The revival team is able, yet different from the usual. Hal Brooks, the evangelist is well known and versatile. At present Hal Brooks serves as pastor of North Richland Hills Baptist Church, Fort Worth. Under his 9 years of leadership, that church has grown to a membership of 1800. It doubled in membership the last two years, and has recently completed an extensive building program. Hal Brooks brings to Burkburnett enthusiastic emphasis upon total evangelism. His policy parallels that of the ever popular Billy Graham in that it develops the layman and uses him in a unique way. He brings to the Burkburnett pulpit as visiting preacher sound principles of maturity, instead of sensationalism. In fact his program and techniques are so down to earth and so

they are being copied by many Southern Baptist Churches, and the book he authored, "Follow Up Evangelism" is a best seller. Hal Brooks' background includes 16 years of preaching experience, teaching experience at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and at Georgia Baptist Assembly, and conducting over 350 revivals including 7 years of full time evangelistic preaching. He brings to Burkburnett the enthusiasm and fire of a "professional evangelist", tempered by the stability and compassion of a successful pastor.

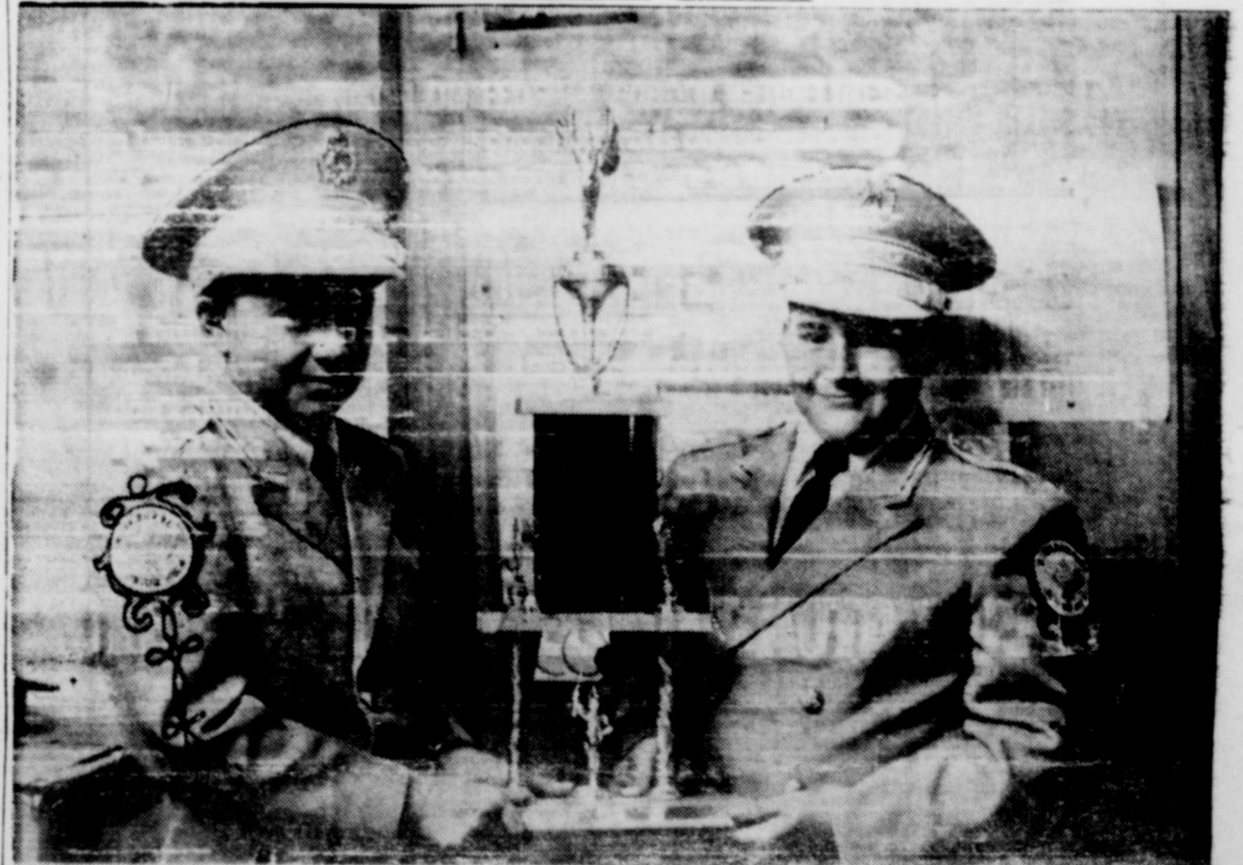

UNIVERSITIES JOIN FORCES TO GET OUT VOTE NOV. 5th

The University of Texas and Texas A&M have joined forces—at least until November 5th. Alumni and friends of both schools have formed a committee to get out the vote for Constitutional Amendment 3 on Election Day.

TSTA URGES PASSAGE OF AMENDMENT 9

AUSTIN—Passage of Amendment No. 9 in the November general election was today urged by Charles H. Tennyson, Executive Secretary of the 123,000 member Texas State Teachers Association.

Tennyson described Amendment No. 9 as "vital both for attracting new and promising individuals into the profession and for holding those experienced Texas teachers who find themselves discouraged by a retirement program which needs updating."

If passed, Amendment No. 9 would make it possible for each teacher in the state to contribute to the Teacher Retirement System on the basis of his full salary.

At present, and for the 31 years the system has been in existence, there have been constitutional limits on the salary which could be used as the basis for a teacher contributing toward retirement. The retirement system for other State of Texas employees does not have any such limitation. A constitutional amendment removed limitations for them several years ago.

"It's now been 12 years since a constitutional amendment raised the ceiling in the Teacher Retirement system. We can't keep upgrading Texas education if we have to wait half a generation between adjusting our teacher retirement system to economic changes. Eliminating the ceiling concept entirely will put Texas back in the race for getting and keeping the kind of teachers we want for our children," concluded Tennyson.

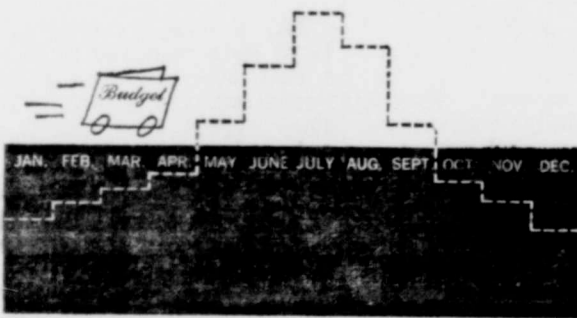

News From The County Agent

National Consumer Education Week is the first week in November. YOU are a consumer however, always compare the observe and study the items you purchase.

One wives tale goes. "The more you buy, the less each unit costs" The wise shopper, however, always compares the net weight with the price.

Larger packages are not always less expensive, according to Thelma Wirgas, county home demonstration agent. In some cases the larger package may be more expensive than small ones. Net weight will reveal how much actually is inside. For example, is the big loaf of bread really bigger or does it just contain more air so that it looks bigger? The label will reveal that information, says the agent.

Label reading also is important on odd shaped bottles. It's hard to tell how much it holds; and therefore, the smaller bottle may actually appear larger. The actual cost in dollars and cents, however, should not be the only factor influencing how much the consumer will buy. Do you have enough space to store the goods?

Think also of your family's needs, reminds Mrs. Wirgas. If the product will not be used within a reasonable period of time, it would not be economical for the homemaker to buy such an item in larger quantities even if the actual monetary cost were less. Food spillage and waste would out-weigh the savings.

Quantity buying can help to cut the food budget if it is planned in accordance with the needs and wants of the family and in relation to the storage space available.

Wichita County Home Demonstration Clubs and other organizations are observing special meetings and studies to help them to be better consumers.

Hams are being featured in many grocery stores—but before you buy, do you know ham? Thelma Wirgas, county home demonstration agent, gives these pointers in buying ham. Test your ham I.Q.

1. Should you cook ham before eating? No not necessarily.

There are two types of ham: fully cooked ham, and those which need to be cooked after purchase. The fully cooked ham, indicated by the label, needs no further treatment. It has been heated during processing.

In cook-before-eating hams the temperature reached in the processing was not high enough to actually cook the meat. Any ham not labeled "fully cooked" or "cooked", or "ready-to-eat" must be cooked before eating. Which part of the ham offers the best value? The butt half of the ham has a smaller percentage of bone and other waste—but the price is higher than the shank half. Center slices have little waste and higher price tags.

3. What is meant by label reading "ham", "ham, water added," and "imitation ham"? Moisture is added during the ham curing process. When hams are shrunk to original fresh weight the label reads "ham." If the products has 10 to 10 percent added moisture, the label will read "ham", water added." "Imitation ham" has more than 10 per cent moisture added.

COUNTY H-D AGENT NEWS

The period of November 22-28 has been designated by President Lyndon B. Johnson as Farm-City Week in the United States. Theme for this year's observance is "Tomorrow's Food and Fiber—Everybody's Business."

Based on October 1 conditions, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service reports pecan production in Texas this year should total 50 million pounds; 47 per cent above last year and 27 per cent above the 1962-67 average. The Nation's pecan crop is expected to reach 181.3 million pounds, 22 per cent less than last year and 13 per cent below average.

Phosphorus and potassium can be applied well ahead of planting with little reduction in availability, advises B. T. Haws, county agent.

Phosphorus in fertilizer soon converted to new forms in the soil and does not move, unless the soil is disturbed by plowing or discing. Phosphorus is also held by soil particles and does not move except in sandy soils low in clay and organic matter. Therefore, such soils would be an exception for

potassium application too far, in advance of planting time.

The big question about fall and winter fertilization concerns nitrogen. Haws says losses and reduced availability of nitrogen will vary with soil properties, temperature and moisture conditions.

Ammonium nitrogen is held by clay particles and generally remains near where it is placed in the soil. Therefore, nitrogen in the ammonium form should be used but not until soil temperature is down to 50-55 degrees F. When the soil temperature is above the 50-55 degree range, soil bacteria convert ammonium to nitrates at an accelerated rate and losses could occur.

Nitrates are mobile and move with soil water. This means they can leach from a very sandy soil in areas of heavy winter rainfall. Still another possible loss is through denitrification. This takes place in soils that stay extremely wet for long periods of time.

Total enrollment in the Texas A&M University College of Agriculture amounts to 2,413 students for the fall semester compared to 2,213 a year ago.

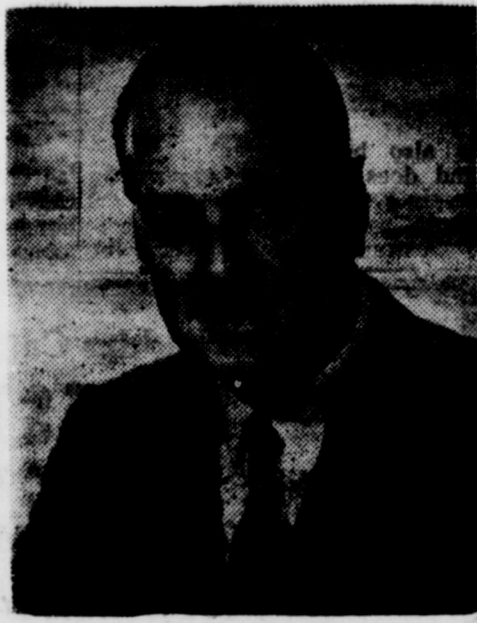

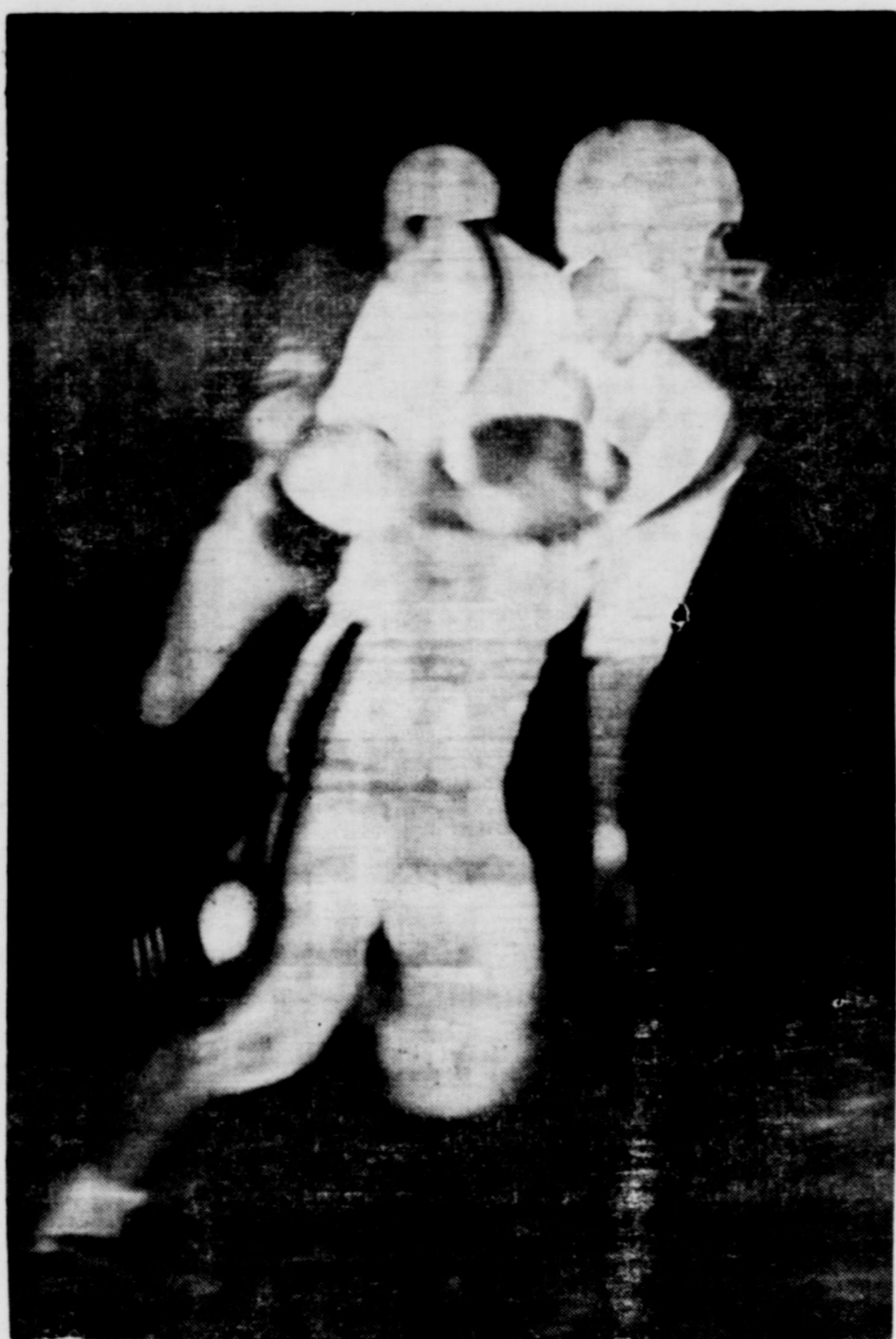

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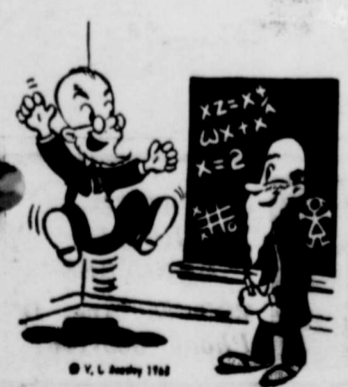
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NIXON ON LOCAL CONTROL:
