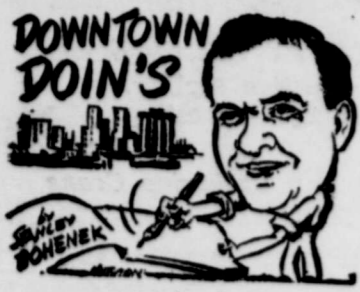

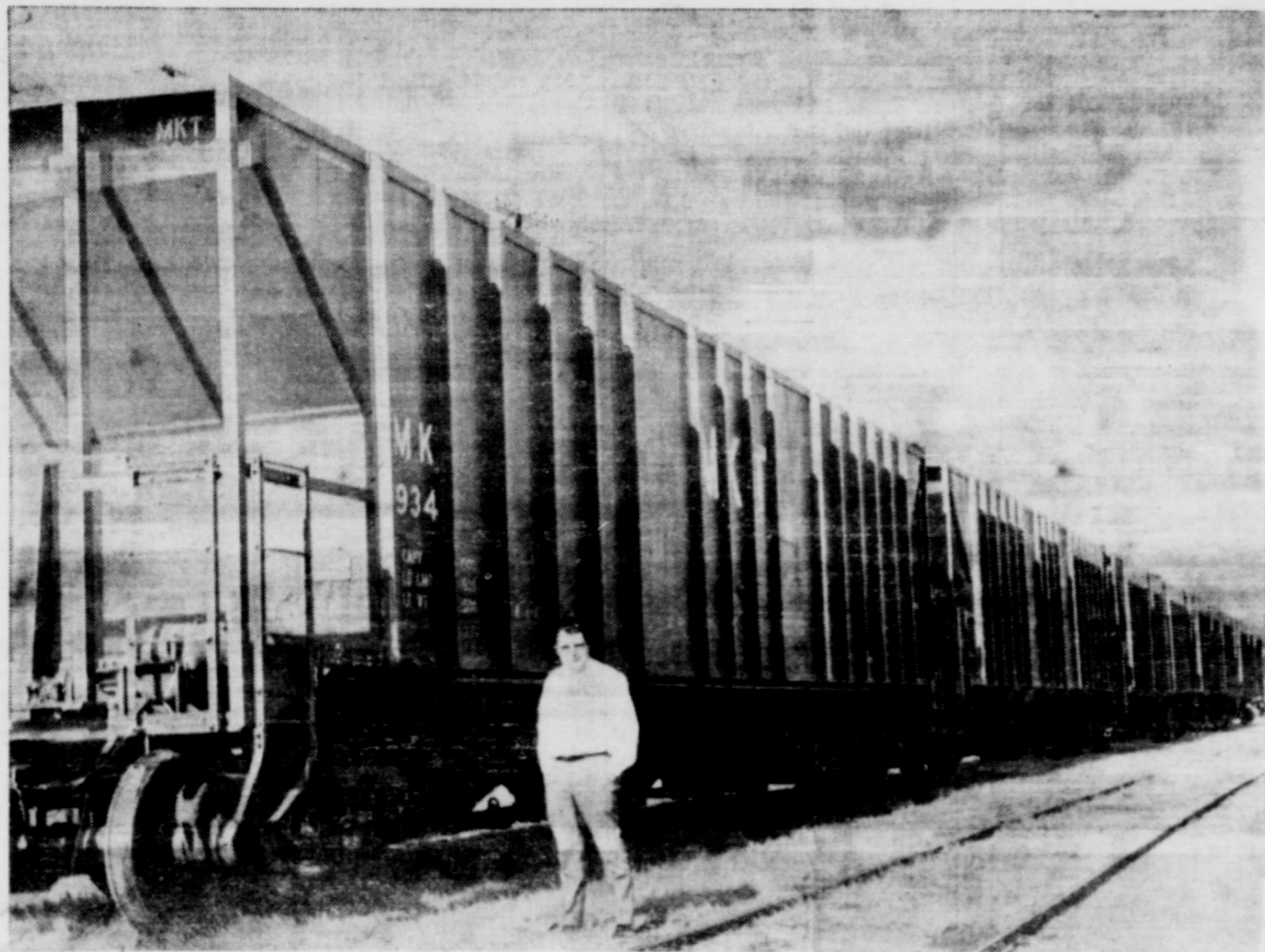

Ronnie Martin In 'Beef Trust'

USS KITTICAW HAWK at Sea (FHTNC) Dec. 9 — Boilerman Third Class Ronnie R. Martin, USN, son of Mrs. Harold D. Cain of 307 Mistletoe, Burkburnett, Texas, and husband of the former Miss Ella J. Chavis of Sherman, Tex., participated in operation "Beef Trust" aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk off the coast of Southern California.

The last major First Fleet exercise of the year, the eight-day exercise involved 28 ships & 31 air squadrons, including four Canadian units.

Designed to prepare U. S. units for the conditions encountered in Southeast Asia and throughout the Western Pacific the exercise consisted of missile firing exercises, bombing practice, close air support and anti-submarine warfare.

Cruisers and destroyers fired their guns at the San Clemente Island Range and at a target hull the ex-USS Jesse Rutherford, while guided missile ships tested their batteries against drone aerial targets in the Pacific Missile Range.

Carrier and land based aircraft flew strikes against the San Clemente Island Range, while the entire task force guarded against two U. S. submarines playing aggressors.

Private Jerald Wayne Stark, son of Mr. and Mrs. Troy Ogden, 208 Mimosa, Burkburnett, Tex., is home spending Christmas leave with his parents. Jerald recently completed six weeks of combat infantry training at Camp Pendleton, California and will be assigned to the First Marine Division in Vietnam during January 1969. Private Stark enlisted in the Marines under a special program, "The Remedial Medical Enlistment Program." This program permits a young man who has a minor medical defect to enlist in the Marines. After enlistment he reports to a Government Hospital where the defect is corrected. After he is certified fit for full duty he then attends Marine Recruit Training. While undergoing Marine Recruit Training, Private Stark qualified to wear the Marine's sharpshooting Rifle Badge.

 - Section 8: Railroad East to Expressway, Tidal Street north to Third St.
 - Section 9: Railroad west to west end of 5th Street. From 5th street North to city limits.
 - Section 10: Preston Street west to city limits, Charlotte Road north to City Limits.
 - Section 11: Railroad east to city limits, Third Street north to Ninth St.

Traffic Toll Of 33 Predicted For Holiday Period

AUSTIN—A warning that 33 persons may die in traffic accidents in Texas during the Christmas and New Year's holiday periods was issued today by Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

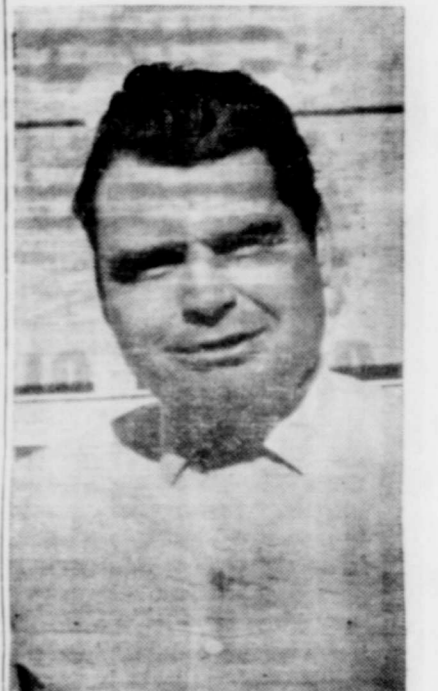
Speir said the DPS will activate a special "Operation Motorcade" in an effort to remove unsafe drivers from the roads and lower the holiday traffic death toll. As part of this program, all available DPS officers will be on duty during the two holiday periods. In addition, Speir noted that the Department will make full use of radar helicopters and VASCAR as enforcement aids to officers.

"Operation Motorcade will be in effect from 6 p.m. Tuesday, December 24 to midnight Wednesday, December 25, and from 6 p.m. Tuesday, December 31 to midnight Wednesday, January 1," Speir said. "DPS Statistical Services estimates that 19 persons will be killed in traffic accidents in the state during the Christmas period, with 14 fatalities estimated for the New Year's period," he said.

VASCAR, which stands for "visual average speed computer and recorder," is a computerized device carried in some Highway Patrol cars which enables the patrolman to accurately clock speeders moving in any direction, even while the patrol car is in motion.

A REPORT ON POLLUTION

How is the war on air and water pollution progressing? As yet, no one can pin down an answer to that question in absolute terms. But, one thing is certain. The forces gradually being mobilized to fight pollution are far larger than generally suspected. A growing percentage of the earnings of industry are being earmarked for the anti-pollution battle.

At the moment, the nation's oil companies are spending \$1 million a day for air and water conservation, according to the head of the American Petroleum Institute, Mr. Frank N. Ikard. He reports that U.S. petroleum companies have spent more than \$1 billion on conservation measures in the past three years—measures designed to improve the overall quality of environment. Air pollution is but one phase of the industries efforts. Equal attention is being directed to management of mineral, land, wildlife and scenic resources.

One of the toughest problems has been controlling automotive exhausts. In this, substantial progress has been made and more is just over the horizon. The goal of petroleum and automotive companies is to eliminate pollution entirely.

In other areas of the antipollution war, the oil industry is also exerting a decisive influence. It is placing heavy emphasis on the development of processes and facilities to remove sulfur from heavy fuel oils—a major factor in air pollution. An encouraging aspect of the industry's air and water conservation program is that the industry is not waiting until the many gaps that exist in scientific knowledge regarding air pollution and its possible effects on health are removed. It is going ahead on the basis of present knowledge.
