## Slum Clearance—American Way

Local business leadership and know-how are helping to provide the answers in meeting the housing needs of the low- and moderate-income families in many communities throughout the nation. An excellent example may be found in the case history of Greater Cincinnati.

John W. Humphrey, chairman of the Board of Philip Carey Manufacturing Company, is spearheading the drive in the Ohio city for combined action by businessmen and civic, social and religious leaders to eliminate the housing blight.

Teaming up with city housing and code enforcement personnel, he made a first-hand survey of the deteriorating inner-city neighborhoods. He then called on local leadership to back an Action Housing program for the entire area, through the establishment of over-all, non-profit, umbrella-type housing development to work with neighborhood organizations to get feasible projects off the ground.

In describing the program he said, "Action for Greater Cincinnati is determined not to step around a single slum or blighted spot in our city and its environs. Every situation in time will be resolved with the neighborhood organizations participating in the corrective programs."

This local, private-enterprise-directed program of slum elimination demonstrates that when sincere leaders get together to solve a problem, they can find the correct answer.

## TAXPAYERS ASK I.R.S.

Q—I'm expecting a bonus this year at the office. Will it be taxable?

A—Yes, this will be taxable income and your employer will withhold taxes on it.

Q—The holiday job our son is taking may put his earnings over \$600 when it is added to what he made last summer. He's a full-time college student and I pay for his room, board and tuition. Could his earnings cost me the deduction I've been taking for him?

A—If your son is under 19 at year-end or was a full-time student during some part of each of 5 calendar months of the year and you provide more than half his support, his earnings will not cause you to lose the exemption you claim for him. Your son must file a return if he has gross income of \$600 or more. He should also file a return if his income was less than that but taxes were withheld from his wages. He cannot obtain a refund of these taxes unless he files a return.

Q—Do I have to report tip income to my employer?

A—If you have tip income of \$20 or more a month while working for any one employer then be sure you report it to this employer each month. Otherwise, you may be subject to a penalty of up to 50 percent of the Social Security tax on the tips.

Q—I am a farmer and I donated a young steer I raised to a church bull roast. How do I figure the value of this contribution?

A—Use its fair market value at the time of the donation as the amount of your charitable contribution. However, the costs and expenses of the steer incurred in the year of contribution must be removed from your deductible farm expenses.

Q—Can I spread over several years the profit I made on the sale of farmland?

A—Yes, you may be able to report your profit on the installment basis. Then you would only be taxed on that part of the profit you received in 1968. This installment method can only be used when you receive payments of not more than 30 percent of the selling price in the year of sale. If you receive more than 30 percent, the entire gain must be reported in the year of sale.

Q—My brother and I help support our mother. Who gets to claim her as a dependent this year?

A—Under the support test for claiming a dependent, the person who provides more than half the total support for the calendar year is entitled to claim the exemption. To determine whether you or your brother qualify, add up your mother's food, clothing, shelter and other items of support for the year. Then find out whether you or your brother supplied more than half of them.

If neither you nor your brother furnished more than this support but your combined contributions totaled over half of the support, then you may want to consider the multiple support agreement. Such an agreement enables one of you to claim your mother as a dependent providing certain conditions are met.

Be sure to check this provision of the law, as well as the other dependency tests, before you file your return next year.

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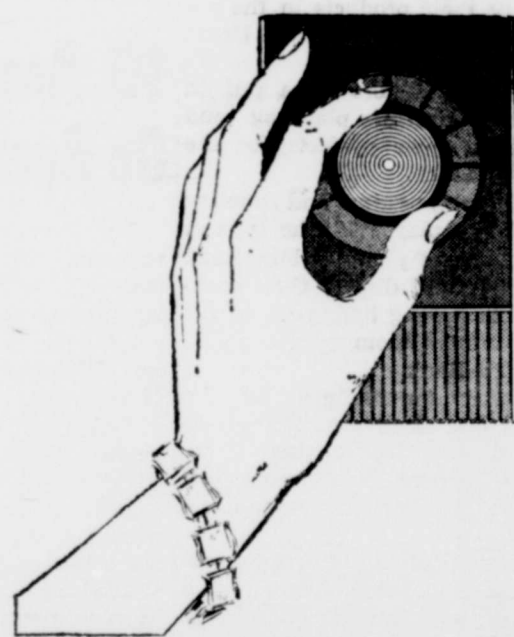
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**LEGAL NOTICES**

**ORDINANCE NO. 292**  
**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING PARAGRAPH ONE OF SECTION FOUR OF ORDINANCE NO. 252, COMMONLY KNOWN AS THE ELECTRICAL CODE OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, TEXAS, REGULATING ELECTRICAL WORK; PROVIDING A PENALTY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, TEXAS;**

That paragraph One of Section Four of Ordinance No. 252 be and the same is hereby amended so that it shall hereafter read as follows:

(1) Licenses: All persons, firms, individuals, copartnerships, or corporations, (excepting public telephones, telegraph and messenger call, light and power companies having a franchise granted by this City who are doing work on their own properties) desiring to engage in the business of installing wires, appliances, apparatus, electrical equipment, electrical signs, and fixtures for a profit as a master or contracting electrician shall, before doing such work, pass an examination by the City Inspector or the City Electrical Board, make an acceptable Surety Bond to the City of Burkburnett, Texas, and take out a license. The license shall be issued by the City and the fee therefor shall be fifty dollars (\$50.00) payable in advance for both Master and Journeyman and five dollars (\$5.00) payable in advance for Helper's license. Said license shall be renewable at a fee of twenty dollars (\$20.00) for Master, ten dollars (\$10.00) for Journeyman and two dollars (\$2.00) for Helpers per annum payable to the City in advance. Any license granted hereunder may be revoked at any time without notice or hearing on the part of the licensee, for the violation of any provision of this ordinance and without refunding any portion of the license fee paid. All present licenses are to continue through the current year without any further changes, and under their present bonds. All present licenses will be renewed at a fee of twenty dollars (\$20.00) for Master, ten dollars (\$10.00) for Journeyman and five dollars (\$5.00) for Helpers payable in advance. Said license shall be renewed at twenty dollars (\$20.00) for Master, ten dollars (\$10.00) for Journeyman and two dollars (\$2.00) for Helpers per annum, and may be revoked at any time by the order of the Mayor

and the City commission for the violation of any of the provisions of this Ordinance. The offending persons, firms, or corporations shall be prohibited from engaging in such work in the corporate limits of the City of Burkburnett for a period of one (1) year. All licenses shall expire December 31 of the year of issuance and no license shall be issued for more than one (1) year.

That any person violating any provision of this Ordinance shall upon conviction in a court of competent jurisdiction, be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00). The fact that improper electrical wiring within the corporate limits of the City of Burkburnett, jeopardizes the peace and health of the citizens of said City, creates an emergency, and this Ordinance is hereby declared an emergency measure on the grounds of urgent public need for the preservation of peace, health and safety of property; and the rule requiring the reading of ordinances on three separate days is hereby suspended, and this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and approval, and after same has been published.

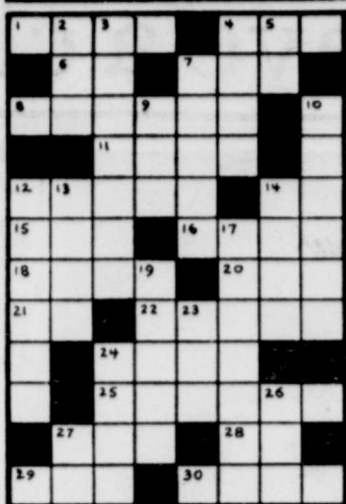

**diETING**

**A Sweeter Diet? Try It!**

Many a dieter still thinks that a weight-control diet means no sugar—no dessert—no fun foods. Not so, says a well-known nutritionist. To control weight, you've got to cut down—not out. Ice cream with lunch? Can do. Layer cake with dinner? Permitted. But, warns this specialist, the serious dieter must follow two rules:

1. Essential foods must be eaten every day. That means protein foods, fats, carbohydrates, minerals and vitamins.

2. Never go over your daily calorie quota. "Eat a little of everything," counsels this doctor. If there's enough variety in the daily menu, you're almost sure to get all the nutrients you need for health.

For a sweet at the end of a meal lets you leave the table satisfied. Then you won't be tempted to snack, or to overeat at the next meal. A teaspoon of sugar measures only 18 calories—and even a 100-calorie dessert may not swamp your daily quota.

A diet counselor suggests: "Watch your fats and oils: they have twice as many calories as sugar... Flavor vegetables with lemon or herbs... Try a vegetable souffle instead of rice... Learn to lose weight slowly—take off the ounces and you'll take off pounds."

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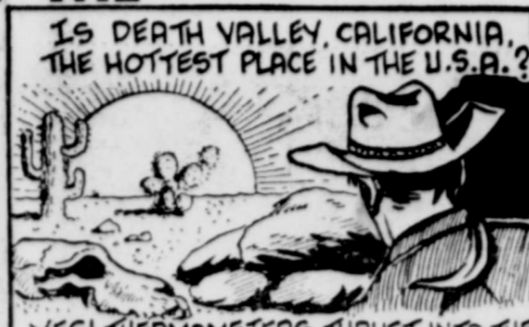



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LEGAL NOTICES

ORDINANCE NO. 293

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE VACATION, REMOVAL, REPAIR OR DEMOLITION OF ANY BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES WHICH IS OR THREATENS TO BECOME A PUBLIC NUISANCE, OR WHICH CONSTITUTES A FIRE HAZARD OR OTHERWISE DANGEROUS TO HUMAN LIFE OR WHICH IN RELATION TO EXISTING USE CONSTITUTES A HAZARD TO HEALTH, MORALS, SAFETY OR GENERAL WELFARE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, AND PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT, INSPECTION, DEFINING WHAT IS DANGEROUS, DECLARING A PUBLIC NUISANCE, SETTING UP STANDARDS, PRESCRIBING DUTIES OF BUILDING COMMISSION, CITY INSPECTOR AND FIRE CHIEF OR FIRE MARSHAL, PROVIDING FOR ABATEMENT OF BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES CONSTITUTING A MENACE TO PUBLIC SAFETY AND FOR THE ASSESSMENT OF THE COST OF VACATION, REMOVAL, REPAIR OR DEMOLITION AS A MUNICIPAL LIEN AGAINST THE PREMISES, PROVIDING FOR ADMINISTRATIVE APPEAL, PROVIDING A FINE FOR VIOLATION, PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, in the City of Burkburnett, Texas, there exists or may in the future exist, buildings or structures which are dilapidated, unsafe, dangerous, unsanitary or which constitute a fire hazard or otherwise dangerous to human life or which in relation to existing use constitutes a hazard to health, morals, safety or general welfare of the people of Burkburnett, and which are a public nuisance thereby creating a situation that must be remedied.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT:

SECTION I. DANGEROUS BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES.

All buildings or structures of any nature that are found to be dangerous structures or buildings or dilapidated buildings or structures, buildings or structures calculated to increase the fire hazard, that injure, hurt or harm individuals or that may hurt or annoy the lands, tenements, hereditaments of another or which endanger life or health or violate laws of decency or obstruct the reasonable and comfortable use of property or are subversive to public order, decency or morals and which have any one or all of the following defects, shall be deemed "dangerous buildings or structures."

(a) Those which, exclusive of the foundation, show thirty-three percent (33%) or more of damage or deterioration of the supporting member or members or fifty percent (50%) of damage or deterioration of the non-supporting enclosing or outside walls or covering.

(b) Those which have been damaged by fire, wind or other causes so as to have become dangerous to life, safety, morals or the general health and welfare of the occupants of the people of the City of Burkburnett.

LEGAL NOTICES

(c) Those which have become or are so dilapidated, decayed, unsafe, unsanitary or which utterly fail to provide amenities essential to decent living that they are unfit for human habitation or are likely to cause sickness or disease so as to work injury to the health, morals, safety or general welfare of those living therein.

(d) Those that have light, air and sanitation facilities which are inadequate to protect the health, morals, safety or general welfare of human beings who live or may live therein.

(e) Those having inadequate facilities for egress in case of fire or panic, or those having insufficient stairways, elevators, fire escapes, or other means of communications.

(f) Those which have parts thereof which are so attached that they may fall and injure members of the public or property.

(g) Those which have a foundation that is not so free of holes, cracks, buckling, crumbling and defects as to support adequately the dwelling structure.

(h) Those which do not have a floor, exterior wall and roof that is so free of holes, cracks and loose, rotten, warped or protruding boards as to protect the occupants of the dwelling or dwelling unit reasonable from weather elements and from danger of collapse.

(i) Those buildings or structures existing in violation of any provision of the Building Code of the City of Burkburnett or other ordinances of the City of Burkburnett.

SECTION II. STANDARDS FOR REPAIR, VACATION OR DEMOLITION.

The following standards shall be followed in substance by the City Inspector, Fire Chief and the Board of Commissioners, acting in its capacity as Building Commission under the terms of this ordinance, in ordering repair, vacation or demolition:

(a) If the "dangerous building or structure" can reasonably be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of this ordinance, it shall be ordered repaired.

(b) If the "dangerous building or structure" is in such a condition as to make it dangerous to the health, safety, morals or general welfare of its occupants, it shall be ordered to be vacated.

(c) In any case where a "dangerous building or structure" is fifty percent (50%) or more damaged, decayed or deteriorated from its original value or structure, it shall be demolished, and in all cases where a building or structure cannot be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of the terms of this ordinance, it shall be demolished. In all cases where a "dangerous building or structure" is a fire hazard existing or erected in violation of the terms of this ordinance or any ordinance of the City or Statutes of the state of Texas, it shall be demolished. Included in the term demolished in this ordinance is the cleaning of the property and removing all debris and trash.

SECTION III. DANGEROUS BUILDINGS.

LEGAL NOTICES

All "dangerous buildings and structures" within the terms of Section I of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be public nuisances and shall be repaired, vacated or demolished as hereinbefore and hereinafter provided.

SECTION IV. DUTIES OF THE CITY INSPECTOR AND FIRE CHIEF:

(a) Inspect or cause to be inspected, when necessary, all public buildings, schools, halls, churches, theaters, hotels, tenements, or apartments, other multi-family residences, commercial manufacturing buildings for the purpose of determining whether any conditions exist which render such places a "dangerous building or structure" within the terms of Section I of this Ordinance.

(b) Inspect any building, wall or structure about which complaints are filed by any person to the effect that a building wall or structure is or may be existing in violation of this Ordinance.

(c) Notify in writing, by certified mail, the owner and all other persons having an interest in said building as shown by the City's Tax Roll, or any building found by them to be a "dangerous building or structure" within the standards set forth in Section I of this Ordinance, stating that (1) the owner must vacate or repair, or demolish said building or structure in accordance with the terms of this notice and this ordinance;

(2) the occupant or lessee must vacate said building or structure or may have it repaired in accordance with the notice and remain in possession; (3) the owner or other persons having an interest in said building or structure, may at his own risk, repair, vacate, or demolish said building or structure or have such work or act done, provided that any person notified under this subsection to repair, vacate or demolish any building or structure shall be given such reasonable time, not exceeding 60 days as may be necessary to do or have done, the work or act required by the notice provided for herein.

(d) Set forth in the notice provided for in Subsection (c) hereof, a description of the building or structure deemed unsafe, a statement of the particulars which make the building or structure a "dangerous building" and an order requiring the same to be put in such condition as to comply with the terms of this Ordinance within such length of time not exceeding sixty (60) days as is reasonable.

(e) Report to the Board of Commissioners in its capacity as Building Commission any non-compliance with the "notice" provided for in Subsection (c) and (d) hereof.

(f) Appear at all hearings conducted by the Board of Commissioners in its capacity as Building Commission and testify as to the conditions of "dangerous buildings."

(g) If deemed necessary, place a notice on all "dangerous buildings" upon a judicial determination, reading as follows: "This building has been found to be a dangerous building by the City Inspector and Fire Chief. This

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notice is to remain on this building until it is repaired, vacated or demolished in accordance with the notice which has been given the owner as shown by the Tax Records in the City Tax Office. It is unlawful to remove this notice until such notice is complied with."

SECTION V. DUTIES OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS ACTING IN ITS CAPACITY AS BUILDING COMMISSION.

(a) Upon receipt of a report of the City Inspector and Fire Chief as provided for in Section IV, Subsection (e) hereof, written notice by certified mail is to be given to the owner, as shown by the Tax Records of the City, to appear before said Commission on a date specified in the notice to show cause why the building or structure reported to be a "dangerous building" should not be repaired, vacated or demolished in accordance with the statement of particulars set forth in the Inspector's and Fire Chief's notice provided for herein Section IV, Subsection (d).

(b) Hold a hearing and hear such testimony as the City Inspector and Fire Chief and the owner or any other person having an interest in said building as shown by the Tax Records of the City, shall offer relative to the determination of the question of whether the building or structure in question is a dangerous building.

(c) Make written finding of fact from the testimony offered, pursuant to subsection (b) as to whether or not the building in question is a "dangerous building" within the terms of Section I hereof.

(d) Upon a determination that the building or structure in question does constitute a "dangerous building" within the meaning of Section I hereof, to issue an order based upon findings of facts made pursuant to subsection (c) commanding the owner of any other person having an interest in said building as shown by the Tax Records of the City to repair, vacate or demolish any building found to be a "dangerous building" within the terms of this ordinance.

(e) In the event the owner fails to comply with the order provided for in subsection (d) hereof within thirty (30) days, the Building Commission shall report the fact of non-compliance to the Office of the City Attorney; the City Attorney may file an appropriate action for injunction in the District Court of Wichita County to compel said owner to abide by the Commission's order or take whatever legal action the City Attorney deems expedient to enforce the order.

(f) If at the expiration of thirty (30) days from a final judicial determination that a building or structure is to be demolished and same has not been destroyed, it shall be demolished at the expense of the owner thereof by the City or its contractor. The materials of such building shall be sold and the net cost of the demolition shall be charged to the owner, and, if any balance remains, it shall be held for the owner or any other parties entitled there-

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to. If the cost of the demolition exceeds the value of the materials of such building, such excess shall be charged as a lien upon the real property on which the building is situated.

(g) The City Attorney may file suit in a court of competent jurisdiction in Wichita County to satisfy the lien acquired pursuant to Section V, subsection (f) hereof which may be accomplished in the original suit.

SECTION VI. ABATEMENT OF BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES CONSTITUTING A CLEAR AND PRESENT MENACE TO THE PUBLIC SAFETY.

Notwithstanding all other provisions of this ordinance, nothing herein shall be deemed a limitation on the duty of the City of Burkburnett to summarily order the demolition of any building or structure where it is apparent that the immediate demolition of such building or structure is necessary to the preservation of life and property in the City of Burkburnett.

SECTION VII. PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS.

(a) The owner of any dangerous structure or building who shall fail to comply with any notice or order to repair, vacate or demolish said building or structure, such notice or order given by the authority of the Building Commission shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not exceeding TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00) for each offense and each day the violation continues shall constitute a new offense.

(b) The occupant or lessee in possession of any "dangerous building or structure" who fails to comply with any notice or order to vacate such building or structure and fails to repair such building or structure, given by authority of the Building Commission, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not exceeding TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00) for each offense and each day the violation continues shall constitute a

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new offense.

(c) Any person removing the notice provided for in Section IV, subsection (g) hereof shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not exceeding TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00) for each offense.

SECTION VIII. WHERE OWNER ABSENT FROM CITY.

In cases, save those that constitute a clear and present danger as defined in Section VI, where the owner is absent from the City, all notices or orders provided for herein shall be sent by certified mail to the owner and all other persons having an interest in said building, as shown by the Tax Records of the City of Burkburnett, Texas, to the last known address of each and a copy of such notice shall be posted in a conspicuous place on the building or structure in question. Such mailing and posting shall be deemed sufficient notice for the Building Commission to hold its hearing.

SECTION IX. SAVINGS CLAUSE.

It is hereby declared to be the intention of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Burkburnett, that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this ordinance are severable and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional,

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such constitutionality or invalidity shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or sections of this ordinance.

SECTION X. EMERGENCY.

The fact that the present ordinances and regulations of the City of Burkburnett are inadequate to properly control "dangerous buildings or structures" in the City of Burkburnett creates an emergency for the immediate preservation of the public business place, property, health, safety and general welfare of the public which requires that this ordinance shall become effective from and after the date of its passage and publication and it is accordingly so ordained.
