Like many pioneering ventures, the space program has had its share of critics who point to the billions of dollars that are being spent to put a man on the moon as an unjustified waste of resources. They say why send a man to the moon when we have so far failed to even solve rudi- States is heartening news for a mentary earth problems. The truth is, of course, that the nation deeply troubled over the fairs actually should be regard. C. M. Hagler, director of testspace program and many of our earth problems are interrelated.

By sending a man to the moon, we are paving the way to solution of earth problems. This was made dramatically clear by Mr. Robert Anderson, president, Commercial Products Group of the North American Rockwell Corporation. He declares, "There is a growing realization that in the stored-up and developing technology of the areospace and defense industries there is an asset of tremendous potential value to the American economy . . . it is our space program that is providing the greatest stimulation to the best scientific minds in our country . . . They are finding far broader applications today than the primary mission of putting a man on the moon.

Specifically, Mr. Anderson points out, there is a new and rising trend in the United States to make use of the technological resources of the largest electric-electronic-aerospace corporations to find solutions to such public problems as poor housing, congested mass transportation, air pollution and inadequate health, education and wel-fare. Under the stimulus of the space effort, science and technology have opened the door to advances that may literally tip the scales in the struggle of man to keep ahead of the problems that have rushed in on our civilization with the approach of the twenty-first century.
