When talking about public service, it is well to define exactly what we mean. Spurning profits and climbing on the public payroll, which must be supported by profits, with the notion that this automaically casts a person in the enviable role of working for the public good is sheer nonsense. We already have too many public servants riding the backs of the taxpayers in this manner. The young person who wishes to rent a genuine public service—a serrice that will be remembered long after the faceless members of a bureaucracy are forgotten-can do no better than enter business where, as men like Mr. Lilly have found. the horizons are limitless.

Naval officer and Director of Naval History, Rear Admiral Ernest M. Eller (Ret.), recently made a point that is often overlooked in our strife-torn land. "Unhappily," he observes, "most education and most panaceas for social ills like riots, slums, and crime stress mostly material solutions rather than those of the soul and character. We should not neglect the material solutions but unless we emphasize first of all the nobler ones of the spirit we will surely fail.

Admiral Eller then quotes the words of a young naval aviator written to his wife shortly before he lost his life in Viet Nam. In them lie the soul and the character of which the Admiral speaks. "I don't want my sons to have to fight a war I should have fought. I wish more Americans felt that way. I am not a 'war monger.' It will be me who gets shot at. But it is blind and foolish not to have the courage of your convictions. I will not live under a totalitarian society and I don't want you to either. I believe in God and I will resist any force that attempts to remove God from society no matter what the name.

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

The Big Fish Get Away Congress will soon face up to a unique problem: How to ensure that more millionaires will pay some Federal income tax. It's not a problem of fraud or evasion. Some millionaires do not have to pay income tax not have to pay income tax because the law as it now

Millionaires with investment and business income can do this better than salaried people. In fact, 381 persons with incomes over \$100,000 in 1967 cancelled out their entire incomes and owed no tax at all. Twenty-one of them had incomes over \$1,-

When the Treasury Secretary made these figures public, one Administration official labeled this as "inflammatory" and "not necessarily meaningful."

But the public thinks otherwise. Coming at a time when millions with modest incomes are being hit by a surcharge, an extra bite out of every pay-check, no wonder the Treasury and Congress are being bom-barded with protest letters.

Congress itself, over the years, has so modified and enlarged the tax law that the original ability-to-pay principal, which seems so apparent in the graduated rates, has been greatly distorted.

But the nation's small and independent business owners, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, strongly opposed this as dis-criminatory, and more important, a boomerang for average local taxpayers. With the advantage of "tax-exempt" municipal and state bonds taken away, the bonds would sell at higher interest rates, meaning higher taxes in the bond-issu-

ing jurisdiction. The new Administration has suggested, instead, that Cong-ress put a 50 per cent limit on total income exemptions. This would still hurt municipal bonds and average local tax-payers. The problem is sticky!

If Congress does nothing else, it could at least reduce the inequity by helping the working man. Boosting the \$600 personal exemption to \$1,200 as proposed by Representative Thomas Meskill of Connecticut would bring instant tax relief to mil-

lions with modest incomes. Then a family of four with an \$8,000 income would pay no more than a certain rich gen-

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
