





"CONCEALED" WEAPONS

"That guy is so tough," runs an old gag, "that if he puts his hand in his pockets, he could be arrested for carrying concealed weapons." He couldn't, though, no mat-

ter how deadly his fists, because they would not be "concealed." In spite of the fabric covering the pockets, anyone could tell that his hands were there. For contrast, consider this case:

A man arrested with a gun in his pocket argued that it had not really been concealed, because it made a distinct and visible bulge.

But the court decided there was still sufficient concealment to make the man guilty of the charge. The judge said a mere bulge was not enough warning, to an ordinary observer, that the man was armed. It is this test - obviousness
