Veterans File Six Claims For Compensation Here

Claims from six Aransas County veterans have been taken by Charles H. Redding, Jr., Corpus Christi field representative of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission, and a field office is set up here every two weeks to serve other veterans.

Redding is at the courtroom in Aransas County Courthouse every other Wednesday morning from 9 to 10 o'clock, and said he expects soon to begin making the trips weekly.

He serves as an agent for the Veteran's Administration in handling Title 5 of the GI Bill of Rights. Under this readjustment allowance, a veteran is entitled to \$20 a week for a maximum of 52 payments, based on length of service, Redding explained. A veteran who goes into business for himself may make a claim for the difference in what he makes and \$100 per month.

Veterans who have not found work but are available for employment may apply for claims, bringing with them their original discharge papers, certificates of service or separation letters or authenticated photostatic copies of those papers.

The veteran must be unemployed or earning less than \$23 per week, registered for work at the United States Employment office and available for employment allowances, he may continue to receive payment.

A veteran may file his claim at any time prior to two years after the end of the war or two years after his discharge. Any state unemployment compensation or workman's compensation received will be deducted from the readjustment allowance.

A veteran is disqualified from receiving allowance if he leaves suitable work voluntarily, is discharged for misconduct, fails to apply for work to which he is referred or to accept suitable work offered or refuses to attend a free training course offered.

A self-employed veteran may submit a record of income and expenses if his net earnings are less than \$100 a month and receive the difference in his earnings and \$100.

Redding also accepts claims under the state unemployment act.
