

A veteran is disqualified from receiving allowance if he leaves suitable work voluntarily, is discharged for misconduct, fails to apply for work to which he is referred or to accept suitable work offered or refuses to attend a free training course offered.

A self-employed veteran may submit a record of income and expenses if his net earnings are less than \$100 a month and receive the difference in his earnings and
