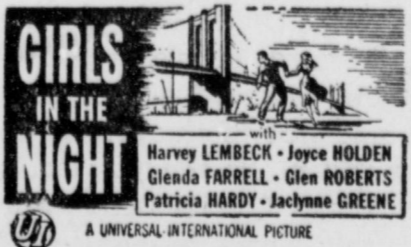

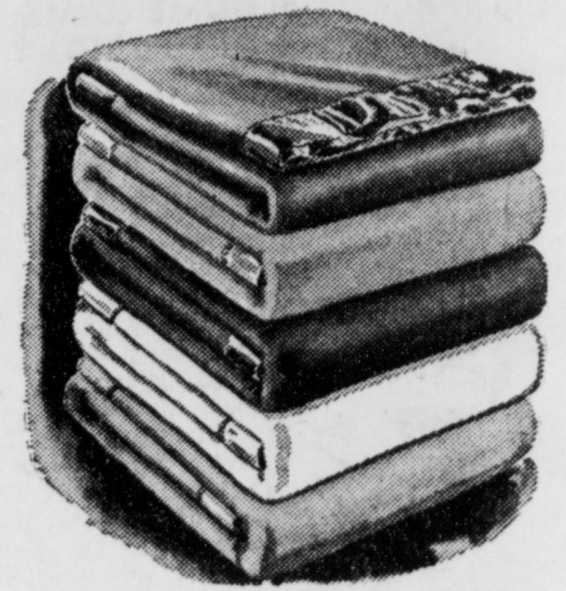

Draft Boards Have College Test Blanks

Austin, Texas. — Application blanks to take the first of the fourth series of Selective Service college qualification tests on Nov. 19 are on hand at Texas draft boards.

College or university students can also pick up bulletins of information about the tests at board offices. Lieut. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, deputy state Selective Service director said.

The Nov. 19 test is scheduled to be given in 43 Texas communities on 51 college and university cam-

pus. Applications for the test must be postmarked no later than midnight, Monday, Nov. 2.

Applicants for the test will mail applications to Educational Testing Service in self-addressed envelopes which will be given to them at local boards with information bulletins and application blanks.

To be eligible to apply for the Selective Service test, the student must (1) intend to request deferment as a student, (2) be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction, and (3) not previously have taken it.

Colonel Schwartz pointed out

that it is not mandatory for local boards to defer students even though they make scores equal or better than the criteria outlined in Selective Service regulations.

At the same time, he said that a total of 7,014 students are currently deferred by Texas draft boards for scores on draft tests, class standing, and for other reasons. Only 228 have the mandatory deferment required by law.

The deputy state draft director urged students whose academic year ends in January to take the November test so they will have a test score on file at their boards before the end of their academic year.

DEER BONANZA

On January 31, 1952, near Crockett, Houston County, the Texas Game and Fish Commission released the first of one hundred wild deer in the county's piney woods. They were to serve as brood stock in an ambitious restoration program. It was the largest of its kind ever attempted. Almost 500 landowners voluntarily offered 100,000 acres for the restocking plan and they signed contracts to give the deer complete protection for not less than five years. About 14,000 acres of the Davy Crockett National Forest was added by Uncle Sam.

SHOOTING HOURS TO BE DEFINED

Austin, Tex. — Texas hunters from border to border are going to have sunup and sundown hours pinpointed for them.

The executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission said H. S. Dunham, chief United States meteorologist in Austin, will prepare a time table for sunrise and sunset covering representative parts of the state.

Dunham is arranging with sta-

tions at El Paso, Amarillo, Wichita Falls, Texarkana, Beaumont, Brownsville, and Austin to obtain the data. When it is compiled, it will be distributed to all Texas public information media.

The executive secretary said the exact sunrise and sunset time is vital since beginning and ending of daily shooting periods for most major species hinges on the official time. This arrangement is designed to inform every Texas hunter so that he may hunt within the legal time.

Night Traffic Hazards Are Many and Varied

"Night must fall, but must countless pedestrians in Texas fall with it?"

That question was asked today by Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association, and service advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation as he discussed the importance of the Night Traffic Hazards program currently sponsored by the Texas Safety Association and the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Colonel Tilley said, "that from October through March, one-third of all pedestrian deaths occur between 5 and 8 p.m., hours that are usually dusk or dark during these months. He blamed a combination of darkness and carelessness.

"Unfortunately, we can't change the laws of nature," he said. "Darkness is here to stay. But we can do something as far as human nature is concerned. Many pedestrians meet their deaths in night traffic because of their own thoughtless walking habits."

He warned pedestrians that it is difficult for motorists to see them at night and urged them to observe the following safe walking rules:

1. Always walk on the sidewalk. If you must walk on roads that have no sidewalks, walk on the left shoulder of the road facing traffic. Wear light colored clothing or carry a flashlight or a piece of white or reflectorized material.
2. Always assume that the driver can't see you. Never cross a street or highway unless you are absolutely certain you have ample time to reach the other side in complete safety.
3. Cyclists are in pretty much the same boat as pedestrians in the night traffic picture," Colonel Tilley said. "Like pedestrians, they also are at a great disadvantage in any encounter with a car. So it's just good common sense for them to be constantly on the defensive. Here are some tips for safe cycling at night:
 - "1. A good headlight and tail light (or reflector) are musts.
 - "2. Add more visibility by trimming your bike with white striping or some type of reflectorized material.
 - "3. Wear light colored clothing or something trimmed with reflectorized material.
 - "4. Ride on the right side of the road, with traffic.
 - "5. Obey all traffic laws."
