### Renwar No. 6 Oiler Completed for 197 Bbls.

Renwar Oil Corp. No. 6 State Tract 105, Aransas County producer in the West Fulton Beach Field in Copano Bay, was completed for a 24-hour flow of 195,37 barrels of 41 gravity oil through a 5-32-inch tubing choke from 40 perforations at 7,932-37 feet in 5½ inch casing which was set on bottom at 8,292 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 611-1. Tubing pressure was 1,600 pounds.

Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 7 State Tract 40-B, producer in the Fulton Beach Field Copano Bay, was completed for a 24-hour flow of 141 barrels of 42 gravity, pipeline oil.

Production was through an 8-64-inch choke from 42 perforations at 7,125-32 feet in 5½ inch casing at 7,190 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 950-1.

Sun Oil Co. No. 2 State Tract 75, in Copano Bay, has been completed from a new oil pay sand in the West Fulton Beach Field.

The well was potentialized for 182.75 barrels of 42 gravity pipeline oil daily through 11-64 inch choke from 56 perforations in the K-3 South Sand at 8,298-8,312 feet. Total depth is 8,550 feet and 5½ inch casing is set at that depth. Gas-oil ratio was 1,012-1 and tubing pressure was 770 pounds.

### COURTHOUSE BOND ELECTION LOSES BY 2 TO 1 MARGIN

The Commissioners Court met this week to canvass the votes cast in the bond election which was held in Aransas County, Saturday, Oct. 16, for funds to build a new courthouse.

The election lost by a vote of nearly two to one; there were 233 votes cast against the bond and 119 for it.

In Precinct No. 1 there were 110 votes cast, 47 for the bond and 63 against it; in the Aransas Pass precinct there were 7 votes for the bond issue and five against it.

Precinct No. 2, courthouse, there were 111 votes against the bond and 41 for bond.

Precinct No. 3, Fulton, cast 47 against and 19 for.

Precinct No. 4, Lamar, 6 against and five for.

### LOCAL P-TA'S HAVE JOINT MEETING

The discussion disclosed that in case of an emergency several Boy Scouts have ham operators licenses for radios, and that 27 members of the Emergency Corps have their blood typed but there is a need for a number of others to be typed and registered with the Corps in case of need.

The panel recommended that the P-TA sponsor a first aid course, to be taught by a Red Cross representative; that they would be prepared to co-operate in case of a disaster in the community. It is hoped that other service organizations, Lions Clubs, Rotary Club, Woman's Clubs, etc., will take some action along these lines.

Mrs. J. D. Griggs gave a short talk on the Texas Congress Birthday, and an offering was taken for this at the close of the meeting.

A social in the cafeteria followed the program and everyone enjoyed punch and birthday cake and the fellowship together. Large golden candles and a bouquet of golden mixed flowers decorated the table. The cake was iced in blue and gold, the P-TA colors. The social chairman from the three P-TA's cooperated.

One hundred and twenty-five attended this meeting.

During the business session that preceded the meeting the Rockport P-TA voted to send the president or alternate and one delegate to the state convention in San Antonio Nov. 16-19. President announced that eight officers and committee chairmen are taking the procedure course. The carnival will be held on the school grounds beginning at 6:30. Everyone is invited to come and eat as there will be sandwiches, hot dogs, coffee, drinks, candy, etc. The band concert has been eliminated and will be held at a later date. Mrs. Sorenson's third grade won the attendance prize.

### MYSTERY MALADY STRIKES BIG TREE

A mystery malady has struck Texas' most famous tree.

The stately live oak in the center of Goose Island State Park—estimated to be nearly 2,000 years old and generally regarded as the largest of its species in existence—is suffering from a disorder that has driven life from several of its huge branches.

Mrs. Mary Juergens, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, said today she has been advised that Norfleet G. Bone of Austin, a landscape architect, will visit Rockport in the next few days on behalf of the Texas State Parks Board to examine the tree's dying limbs.

The condition of the tree, she said, was reported to the Park Board last month.

"The people here feel that the tree has been attacked by some type of insect," Mrs. Juergens said.

The Goose Island park is a 157-acre strip of land bordered by Aransas and St. Charles bays about 10 miles northeast of Rockport. Each year, the tree is visited by thousands of sightseers.

State Health Officer Discusses Good Posture

Austin, Tex. — Guilty of pretzel posture? Does your body profile look like the bent part of a capital "D"? Then harken to the words of State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox as he explains that good health and appearance have their starting point in good posture. Here's how you, too, can obtain the stance of a Grecian god or goddess, as the case may be: Hold your head high and pull you chin in until your eye level is parallel to the ground. Pull your shoulders back and make the shoulder blades form as near a flat surface as possible. Raise your chest up and push it forward until the buttons strain. Draw your abdomen up and in, and when you breathe make sure it's your chest that rises and falls rather than the abdomen. Flatten the lower part of your back, tucking the buttocks as close under the hips as possible. Tip your back down. Hold your knees straight but not stiff. Put your feet parallel, with the weight evenly balanced.

A good posture can be had without stiffness or strain, so don't exaggerate. Some people feel it is more comfortable to walk, stand, or sit in a slouchy position, drooped over like a wilted weed. In your vain attempt for more comfort in daily activity, don't forget that the true secret of good posture is to keep the body well balanced throughout the day.

The old saying has it that "there's a place for everything," and Dr. Cox says that goes for the human body. Each organ has a specific space in which its function is performed. The vital organs—heart, lungs, abdomen, etc.—tend to be cramped when the body is slumped over. Cramped lungs cannot deliver a full supply of oxygen; circulation is slowed up when the heart is cramped; and a cramped stomach impairs digestion.

"Remember," the doctor cautions, "true comfort and true relaxation comes with good posture."

In street parlance that means "straighten up, friend, you'll feel better."

SERIOUS LEGAL PROBLEMS INVOLVED IN HOME PURCHASE

With "National Home Week" being observed September 20-26 many people are now thinking at least casually about the purchase of a new home. Those who become seriously interested should proceed cautiously when making a deal, as many important legal problems are involved in such a transaction.

For the average person, the buying of a home is the largest single transaction of his life. It is also, in most instances, the most permanent or longest term investment he will ever make. Whether or not he bought wisely will be determined by his ability to resell without difficulty, or to enjoy the use of the premises without annoyance or interruption.

Possibly the first legal problem you will meet will be when you are asked by the seller or his agent to sign a contract of sale or earnest money contract. In connection with the latter, you will be asked to deposit a sum of money which would be forfeited in event you do not fulfill the contract. Although no forfeit money may be required with the former, you may still be legally liable for damages if you renege. Be sure, therefore, that you know exactly what your obligations are.

The next legal problem would probably be to determine the status of the title to the property. Many persons become confused during this stage, thinking that securing possession of an Abstract or Title Insurance Policy will afford them complete protection against title defects. This is not necessarily true in either case.

Keep in mind that an abstract is merely an outline of public records on the tract. Any person may purchase an abstract covering any piece of land, whether he owns it or not. A Title Insurance Policy indemnifies you only up to a certain maximum sum of money, and contains various exceptions to the specified coverage.

Following this would be the problem of transferring the title from the legal owner to you, as purchaser, in such manner that no legal question might later arise concerning your sole and exclusive ownership.

Incidental to your title problems is that of ascertaining what restrictions exist upon the lot you are buying and upon the neighborhood generally. Municipal zoning ordinances and restrictive covenants placed upon the tract by previous owners or developers of the subdivision may prove a protection or a hindrance, according to the plans you may have for future use or improvement of your property.

Other legal questions may arise in arranging the method of payment for the house. The fact that most people need years in which to complete such payment makes this a matter to be considered carefully.

These are some of the major legal problems you are likely to encounter in purchasing a home. Of course, a number of others may arise in some cases due to peculiar individual circumstances. A free pamphlet containing useful information on legal and other problems involved in buying a home has been prepared by Texas lawyers. Rockport Garden Club Met In Johnson Home

The Rockport Garden Club met in the home of Mrs. Travis Johnson for their regular monthly meeting, Thursday morning of last week.

Mrs. Roy Hinton spoke on planting bulbs for spring flowers. She had several kinds of bulbs on display with a picture of the flower of each in their natural color. She also had some sand, peat moss and bone meal which she uses for fertilizer. Mrs. Hinton said a gladiolus bulb is not a true bulb but comes from the iris and that a long season of blooming can be obtained by planting mixed sizes of corms, as the large corms usually bloom first. They may also be planted every few weeks during the summer.

An interesting subject was the Easter lily which should be planted in this area from the middle of September until the last of October. They should be planted in a sandy loam with leaf mold and bone meal worked into a loose soil. These bulbs should be taken up and transplanted every three years; this should not be done until the entire top is dead. It was reported that Mrs. Bertha Harper has over 300 Easter lilies in her garden. All bulbs need to be fed immediately after blooming.

Miss Fannie Oertling told "How to guard against bulb rodents. She said that setting out traps and planting castor beans were both good but an old cat was the best trap she had found. She said they will sit for hours in cold weather,

waiting for the mole to appear. Mrs. Charles Picton said she had the cats for anyone wanting them.

There were four new members and one visitor present at the meeting. Mrs. Johnson invited the ladies into the dining room after the business meeting where the Halloween motif was carried out in the decorations. Mrs. Charles Picton poured coffee.

**The Home Grounds**

(By Mrs. Emma H. S. Reese)

House cleaning is very timely, now, and surely yard and grounds cleaning is an important part of homemaking. If we follow the suggested plan of having our ideal home planting in mind at all times, we can make real progress each year toward it, in addition to the routine chores of cleaning and planting. Often a neighbor will give you just the shade tree, shrub or handful of rooted slips or seedlings you want for a certain spot in your yard.

We can at least make sure that our own yard and flower beds are cleaned of rubbish and old foliage. The Chamber of Commerce, City Council and Garden Club are all combined to help in cleaning up and beautifying our town. Vacant lots are being cleared as well as homes. Great progress is being made in this way, and much interesting being shown.

At a meeting of the Rockport Garden Club, at the home of Mrs. Travis Johnson on Oct. 15, Mrs. Roy Hinton gave a paper on "Bulbs, their planting and care" which gave many helpful and timely hints for our local gardeners. She showed colored pictures of the bulbs in bloom, and specimens of the bulbs themselves; also samples of the sandy loam, bone meal and other supplements. She stated that good garden soil and rotted manure, was a good growing medium for many varieties. It is best to plan kinds that we know do well in this locality, but one may experiment successfully. If gardeners constantly compare notes as to progress, and exchange material whenever possible, we profit by the experience of one another, to the gain of all concerned.

Most of the varieties mentioned may be obtained locally, as well as garden supplements such as peat moss, insecticides, etc.

Miss Fannie Oertling gave a talk at the same meeting on "Control and prevention of rodent enemies of bulbs" in which she stated that gophers could be driven off or killed by flooding the burrows with water, or forcing in sulphur fumes. Moles and mice will often leave or die if castor bean seeds are placed in the burrows. Dusting the ground around the holes with powdered sulphur or DDT helps to drive away these enemies, also the family cat is most effective, if she is a good hunter.

The following are good varieties of bulbs to plant at this time that may be obtained locally: Amaryllis, hyacinth, lily tulip, many varieties of narcissus, ranunculus, snowdrops, and anemones.

Gladioli, begonias and some varieties of iris may be grown if directions are carefully followed. It is sometimes best to change the location of bulbs often, but some make themselves at home and come up year after year with a minimum of attention.

It is helpful to get the advice of the dealer or nurseryman who provides the bulbs, seeds, plants or shrubs, as the method of planting and care is so important to success.

A number of annual seeds may be planted at this time, for spring and summer bloom along with and following the bulbs, and some for the present season in this climate.

Trees and shrubs should be moved when dormant, probably a little later on, but most may be pruned and shaped now.

Pests are very evident now, and should be prevented wherever possible. Snails, which attack much green foliage, care little for sprays

Candy and gum wrappers, paper sacks, even sacks and boxes of garbage, to say nothing of empty bottles and tins, thrown into private property and necessitating gathering up and removal, add much to the expense of keeping up neat and pretty yards, lots and streets. A little thought would help this in each family. Often persons who enjoy beauty and neatness are careless in this respect out of doors.

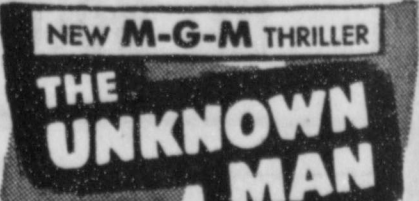

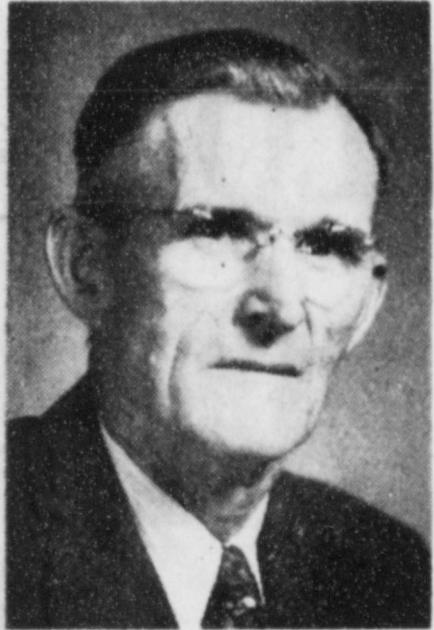

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

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### HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From Your State Capitol

Austin, Tex.—Eyes of all the nation were focused on Texas during President Eisenhower's visit.

Entering the state by plane, the president proceeded to Sharyland, baronial home of Governor and Mrs. Shivers near Mission.

Next on the program was a 65-mile drive to Falcon Dam, where Mr. Eisenhower was met by the Mexican ambassador to the United States.

Crossing the international border, the president met President Adolfo Ruiz Cortines of Mexico on the steps of Nuevo Guerrero's municipal palace.

The two presidents reviewed a festival in the plaza below the palace.

Later Mr. Eisenhower and Sr. Cortines lunched together at Falcon Dam, then proceeded to the dedication ceremony, where both made speeches.

After the ceremonies, President Eisenhower drove to Laredo and took a plane for Washington.

President Eisenhower, incidentally, is the second Chief Executive of the United States who has ever visited the Lower Rio Grande Valley. Warren G. Harding spent two weeks fishing in the Gulf of Mexico off Port Isabel in November, 1920, while he was president-elect.

Eisenhower's visit with President Cortines of Mexico marks the fifth meeting between presidents of the United States and Mexico since 1912. Previously President Taft met Diaz at Juarez, in 1912; Roosevelt met Avila Camacho at Monterrey in 1942; Truman met Miguel Aleman in Mexico City in 1947 and Aleman and Truman met in Washington in 1948.

Behind all the pomp and excitement of the Eisenhower visit to Texas a political struggle was going on as three factions sought the favor of Texas voters.

These were the Republicans, the Shivers or Conservative Democrats, and the Adlai Stevenson or Liberal Democrats.

National Republican Chairman Leonard Hall concluded a visit to Texas after exhorting his party's members to whoop up their efforts.

"If you work hard," he said in a speech at Houston, "it will not be long before we find as many Republicans in Texas as we find in New York."

Meanwhile, Sam Rayburn, a leader of the so-called Liberal Democrats, doubted that the Republicans were getting anywhere very fast in Texas.

He expressed himself at San Antonio as being glad that Hall had come down this way, and:

"I hope they send all their big shots down here because I would

**LETTER TO THE EDITOR**

**A SUGGESTION CONCERNING ROCKPORT'S WATER SUPPLY**

The average resident of Rockport, both its men and women, have their hands full caring for families and earning a living. Like busy people of other localities they turn the actual operation of local government over to elected officials whose duty it is not only to provide adequate facilities commensurate with accepted American standards but also to save those facilities against any possible contingency.

It might be pertinent at this time to point out, and emphasize that one of the basic utilities of Rockport is subject to serious curtailment or complete stoppage. We refer of course to our water system and our utter dependence on distant generating plants and vulnerable power lines. In the event of severe storm or enemy attack the first thing to go out is power and no power means no water for Rockport has made no provision for supplemental sources of energy.

All of our water is obtained from deep wells which must be pumped, and this done by electric motors. When the current goes off, the pumps stop and within a short time so does the water. Just because we have been fortunate so far lets not lull ourselves into the delusion that we always will be. We believe it wise to prepare ahead of time for possible emergency, especially so when the solution is relatively easy and inexpensive. One simple answer lies in the fact that both the City of Rockport and Aransas County already own several tractors which can be converted to adequate power plants by the addition of a few extra parts. Were these parts purchased and stored for emergency use ahead of time, Rockport need never fear a water shortage. Any necessary data needed for the conversion of these tractors for the purpose named can be obtained from the manufacturers without cost. Personally we believe that this is the right thing to do.

**Begin Baiting Traps for Deer**

Austin. — Crews down on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge have been baiting preliminary to the regular trapping season, according to the Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission.

He said the traps have been placed on a new line this year in the hope of reaching new herds of deer. The old line was abandoned because of the poor luck recently. Cottonseed cake is used for bait.

Only one hundred thirty-three deer were taken from the Refuge last year. This was an all time low. The most deer ever taken in one season totaled almost seventeen hundred.

The 1953 catch is scheduled for transfer to newly established wildlife restoration and game management areas, mostly in northeast Texas.

Trapping of the big game is handled by Commission crews under a working arrangement with the Federal Government which controls the area.

**Fines Hit Pollution**

Austin.—The Assistant Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission reported 94 pollution cases were prosecuted during the twelve month period ending August 31.

Fines totaled \$9,243.75 and court costs amounted to \$198.95, making a combined sum of \$9,442.70.

The largest number of cases in any one month was 17 listed for July.

The Assistant Executive Secretary said the cases ranged from cases involving industrial firms to those against individuals.

He said game wardens work with local authorities in detecting pollution of public waters and added that most firms cooperate to avoid lakes and streams. Some companies have spent hundreds of thousands of dollars to install pollution control plants.
