Local commercial fishermen in the Rockport and Fulton area are up in arms, objecting to House Bill 928, introduced by Harold Parish in the present session of the legislature

Coaker, commercial fishermen of the region met with Parish and sports fishing interests in the region and agreed to introduction of a bill calling for closure of Mesquite Bay to all fishing, and to its establishment as a fish sanctuary, where no fishing of any kind was to be permitted.

# **Radar Buildings Should Be Ready** Says General

The thickness of outside walls shall be not less than as given

Brick walls shall be not less than 12 inches thick, except that small one-story buildings with floor areas of 750 square feet or less may have walls 8 inches thick.

Reinforced concrete walls may be three-fourths of the thickness of brick walls, but in no case less than 8 inches.

Hollow building tile may be used as filler walls provided such walks be supported on reinforced concrete beams and footings, and by adequate reinforced concrete or brick pillars or columns spaced not more than 16 feet apart; walls to be not less than 12 inches thick. Small one-story buildings of less than 500 square feet floor area may have walls of 8 inch hollow building tile. By the term "hollow building tile" is meant: Tile made from clay.

Solid stone walls shall be 4 nches thicker than brick walls for like construction.

All exterior walls, party walls, and division fire walls shall have parapets extending at least 24 inches above the roof, and said parapets shall be at least twelve inches thick, except where eightinch walls are permitted as above, in which case parapets may be eight inches thick. Where the roof is a gabled roof said parapets shall not be lower than the highest point of the gabled roof.
SECTION 4. FRAME BUILD-

ING IN FIRE LIMITS: The following frame structures are permissable in the fire limits:

a. Temporary one-story frame buildings for the use of builders, such temporary building to be removed immediately upon the completion of the main structure.

b. Wooden fences not over 8 feet igh without roof or cover. SECTION 5. ROOFS: All buildings or structures hereafter constructed in the fire limits shall

a greater extent than 10% of the roof surface, except in conformity with this ordinance, and in no instance shall more than one permit be issued each existing building in any one year.

SECTION 6. REPAIRS AND ADDITIONS: Any existing building within the fire limits which may hereafter be damaged by fire, decay, or otherwise, to an amount greater than 50% of its present value, exclusive of the foundation, shall not be repaired or rebuilt, but shall be removed.

Extensions, remodeling, or additions to existing buildings shall not be considered as repairs, and shall not be permitted except when conforming with Section 3 of this ordinance.

SECTION 7. ARBITRATION: Whenever an application for permit to repair any existing building already located within the fire limits is made by any person or firm, and the City Council and the applicant disagree on the extent of repair to be made, and a permit is denied by the designated City Secretary, then the City Council shall appoint a competent and disinterested person, and the applicant shall appoint a competent and disinterested person, which said two persons so appointed shall select a third member, and these said three persons shall appraise the building, examine the plan of ment of materials and labor to lows: be used in the repairing or rebuilding of said building, and make a signed written report of their findings to the City Council. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to operate a motor vehicle upon the streets, alleys and ways within the City Limits of Rockport, Texas, in excess of the following speeds:

a. Upon all alleys or public ways the speed limit shall be 15 miles per hour.

b. On and upon all streets within the City Limits, except where a different rate of speed is provided by this Or. dinance, the speed limit shall be 30 miles per hour except at such times and under such conditions as a person of ordinary prudence, driving a motor vehicle under like cir-cumstances, would drive at a lower rate of speed.

III All Ordinances, or part of Ordinances, in conflict herewith are hereby specifically repealed.







Mrs. H. T. Bailey, resident of Rockport for 66 years and the town's oldest member of the fairer sex, will celebrate her 89th

She was born Sallie May Hodges on the Pettus Ranch in Bee County at the home of her grandfather, John Freeman Pettus, for whom the town of Pettus was later named.

At the age of 15 her family moved to Goliad where she attended Brooks College and lived until she married Henry T. Bailey in 1891.

A reception was given for the young couple when they arrived in Rockport, at the home of the groom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Bailey at the Bailey Hotel, well known hostelry at that time, and connected by a long wharf to Bailey's Pavilion, equally well known as a community center and Young Bailey was working with his father in the publication of the first newspaper in the county, "The Transcript."

Mrs. Bailey soon entered into the social, civic and religious life of the community.

The most active organization at that time was the King's Daughters, a philanthropic group devoted to helping the sick and destitute of the town and caring for underprivileged children. Trained nurses were not available so to these women fell the task of sitting up with the sick, dividing the day and night into shifts, and making shrouds for the dead.




