A BILL TO HELP COUNTIES

Sharp reductions in the ad valorem tax rates of Texas counties will result from enacting bills now pendind in the House of Representatives. W. R. Nelson of Carthage, Panola County Judge and secretary treasurer of the Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association, said to-

The state wil assume the burden of retiring county and road district bonds issued for road building under one bill. The state also will assume the cost of further construction and improvement of all state highways, contingent on the counties furnishing right of way.

Judge Nelson believes the plan will permit reductions in county tax rate ranging from one fourth to one half in the majority of instances. If the state assumed retirement of \$1,-600,000 in road bonds of Orange County, the Ad valorem tax rate could be reduced by 63 cents on the \$100 valuation.

State assumption of \$592,000 in Throckmorton County's outstanding oad bonds would permit a tax reduction of 31 cents.

House bill No. 325, introduced by Rep. Harold Beck of Texarkana, creates in the state treasury a special county and road district highway fund to assume the bond burden. It allocates 25 per cent of revenues from the gasoline tax to the available school fund; 35 per cent to the county and road district highway fund; the remainder to the state highway fund.

Thus motorists who use county roads and highways will pay the cost of constructing and maintaining the roads, reducing the burden of ad val orem taxation on the farms and the homes and other property of the peo-

A BILL TO HELP COUNTIES

Sharp reductions in the ad valorem ax rates of Texas counties will result from enacting bills now pendind in the House of Representatives. W. R. Nelson of Carthage, Panola County Judge and secretary treasurer of the Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association, said to-

The state wil assume the burden of retiring county and road district bonds issued for road building under one bill. The state also will assume the cost of further construction and improvement of all state highways, contingent on the counties furnishing right of way.

Judge Nelson believes the plan will permit reductions in county tax rate ranging from one fourth to one half in the majority of instances. If the state assumed retirement of \$1,-600,000 in road bonds of Orange County, the Ad valorem tax rate could be reduced by 63 cents on the \$100 valuation.

State assumption of \$592,000 in Throckmorton County's outstanding road bonds would permit a tax reduction of 31 cents.

House bill No. 325, introduced by Rep. Harold Beck of Texarkana, creates in the state treasury a special county and road district highway fund to assume the bond burden. It allocates 25 per cent of revenues from the gasoline tax to the available school fund; 35 per cent to the county and road district highway fund; the remainder to the state highway fund.

Thus motorists who use county roads and highways will pay the cost of constructing and maintaining the roads, reducing the burden of ad val orem taxation on the farms and the homes and other property of the peo-
